We regret to announce the death of our townsman, Mr J M Adair, bookseller, which took place on Monday last at his residence in King Street. Mr Adair was the eldest son of Mr R Adair, Maryport, and over 20 years ago he entered upon business in this town in succession to the late Mr William Wilson of Distington. Mr Adair was of a pleasant and genial disposition, and was highly esteemed by all who had the pleasure of his acquaintance. Few men had better knowledge of his profession. He was a great reader himself and something of a book collector too, and his extensive knowledge of books ancient and modern was always at the service of his customers and friends. He was known as one of the very best and most humourous of Cumberland dialect readers. Mr Adair took a great interest in the Whitehaven Volunteer Life Brigade of which he was first officer for some years. For some time past his health had failed him, and he was confined to his room and then to his bed for some weeks. He was 46 years of age.

The rapid increase of trade that followed the farther development, a few years ago, of the natural resources of the west of Cumberland, happily called into action the enterprise of men who before, in Whitehaven, had no opportunity of displaying abilities which now are being successfully exercised by them. Foremost amongst such men in Whitehaven are John J Peile of the Scrap Iron Works, and William Allan of the Engine Works at Corkickle.

Mr Allan's establishment, the Corkickle Engine Works, is situate on premises formerly occupied by Mr Brocklebank, shipbuilder, and is in every respect, as far as we were able to judge, and from the information we could gather, a first-class shop. It is the only works of the kind in Whitehaven. Before its establishment in 1858, much of the engine work required in Whitehaven and the district, if done at all in the neighbourhood, was done at Lowca Iron Works. Since that date, we believe, the Lowca Company has turned its attention more particularly to work of a larger character, and being on friendly business terms with Mr Allan, the two works successfully, as the phrase goes, "work together."

Upon entering the premises, near to the entrance to the engine department, the visitor notices, first, three or four hardy sons of Vulcan working at the anvil and the smiths' fires, and, farther on, in one corner, a steam boiler, resting on a brick bed about 18in high, with ashpit in the centre. The boiler itself looks for all the world like a porter boiler on a footstool. It is 6 feet high, and 3 feet in diameter, and is filled with 60 iron tubes, 2 in. diameter, standing vertically, and being each encompassed in the bottom of an iron chimney, which conveys the smoke into a brick chimney. A small pipe, with brass cock attached, supplies the boiler with water from the town's main. Close to this very compact boiler is a boiler-maker's furnace for heating

plates, a punching and clipping machine for the manufacture of steam boilers and ship tanks, and a set of plate-bending rolls.

The engine department consists of a spacious room about 100 feet long, 30 feet wide and 12 feet high. The office and store room are at the top of the room, and at the bottom of it is a vertical high-pressure six-horse power engine, made by Mr Allan, and a perfect model of mechanism, so simple and compact is it. Across the room runs a line of shafting, with numerous and various-sized drums, pullies, &c, for driving lathes, which are kept busily employed in cutting and polishing round shafts, piston rods and other iron or brass work. At the top of the room stand a bench, with five or six vices, pattern-makers' benches &c, and every convenience for carrying on an extensive trade. We must not forget to notice a 12 in. horizontal oscillating high pressure steam engine which Mr Allan is making for Brocklebank, shipbuilder, to be used for sawing timber, driving grindstones &c. When finished it will be the only engine of that description in this neighbourhood.

On Saturday Mr H J Whiteside, deputy coroner, held an inquest at Mr Henry Gill's, The Canteen, at Whitehaven, to inquire into the cause of the death of David Allison, aged 20 years, a labourer, belonging to Whitehaven. Richard Butler deposed that the deceased had been working on the Furness Railway near Millom, lifting the top soil off and putting it in some wagons. The wagons would be some six feet from the soil. He jumped from the soil upon the wagon and on looking back witness saw him lying on the ground. Deceased was quite sensible. He was brought to Whitehaven. It was not usual for men to jump. They could get down at a place about 50 yards from where the deceased jumped, and all the men who had been working at the place on the day went round. Deceased fell with his breast against the wagon side. Thomas Walker, who had been working with the deceased, said he saw him slip when he was attempting to jump

upon the wagon. The ganger had ordered all the men to go round. Dr Storey, of Millom, and Dr l'Anson of Whitehaven, wished deceased to go to the Infirmary, but he wanted to go to his home. Dr l'Anson deposed that death had resulted from rupture of the kidneys. The jury returned a verdict of "Accidental death."

It is supposed he must have fallen overboard on going on board in the dark. The jury returned a verdict of found drowned.

The Rev Canon Dalton, who made the presentation, spoke of the kindly feeling existing between the congregation and Mr Anderson, and that gentleman suitably acknowledged the gift. A pleasant evening was spent.

#### PEOPLE'S WARDEN PROSECUTES

Chancellor Prescott and five assessors sat at a special Consistory Court at Carlisle today to inquire into the charges of immorality against the Rev James Anderson, vicar of Holy Trinity, Whitehaven. Mr T Shepherd Little was counsel for the prosecution, and Mr Mattinson K C was counsel for the defendant.

Mr Little asked leave to amend the date of one of the charges, which related to an act of indecency towards a blind girl on the road near White Park, Whitehaven, and to add a new charge of precisely similar character. The Court allowed the first charge to be amended but declined the second.

Mr Little described the circumstances and said in one case Mr Anderson and the blind girl were observed by John Cowen, one of Lord Lonsdale's foresters, upon a seat in the White Park, and on another occasion were detected in a granary yard, Whitehaven, by Mr Barnfather, a churchwarden, to whom defendant said, "You have seen nothing; I was only setting the girl home." Defendant was further charged with drunkenness. On the 7<sup>th</sup> of February this year some women were cleaning out the church, and went to the vicarage to get the lights turned on. The vicar, it was alleged, staggered drunk into the vestry, and turned on all the lights and then staggered away nearly falling into a gutter outside. Mr Barnfather was unable to get admission to the vicarage and forced upon the lock in the vestry to turn out the lights.

Mr Barnfather, people's warden of Holy Trinity Church, and prosecutor in the case, gave evidence as to the seeing the defendant and Miss Hetherington together on the night of February 11<sup>th</sup>. Witness called him a scoundrel. Defendant said, "You had better be careful what you are doing. You have seen nothing." Witness afterwards required his resignation. He stated that defendant admitted that he had done wrong, and promised to send in his resignation. A day or two later witness gave defendant till five o'clock to send in his resignation. Defendant said he had done nothing to resign for. Asked to the circulation of the news in the town, witness said it would be done by two men who were going to the Volunteer Shed at the time, and who would tell their comrades, "Poor old Jimmy's been nabbed at last."

#### A WHITEHAVEN VICAR'S DOWNFALL

##### Deprived of all Church Appointments

Sentence was on Saturday pronounced by the Lord Bishop of Carlisle upon the Rev James Anderson Vicar of Holy Trinity Church, Whitehaven, who several days previously was tried before Chancellor Prescott and five assessors and found guilty of drunkenness and immoral conduct with a blind girl. In pronouncing sentence, the Lord Bishop, who spoke with much emotion, said the discharge of discipline, painful in any case, was made additionally painful when the offender was an aged brother clergyman. Grey hairs were a crown of glory when found in the way of righteousness, but if otherwise, they became an additional cause of shame. The discipline was also made more sorrowful when, as in this case, the offender had previously been

admonished by the Bishop in the exercise of his fatherly duties. . . the defendant was a student of Edinburgh University, and was for a couple of years in the early sixties a minister of the United Presbyterian Church at Dunbar. After being a Presbyterian minister at Whitehaven for ten years he entered the Church of England.

#### WRIT OF SEQUESTRATION

A writ of sequestration has been posted on the door of Holy Trinity Church, Whitehaven. The writ declares the vicarage of Holy Trinity, Whitehaven, to be vacant by the deprivation of the Rev James Anderson, the last vicar and incumbent, and it appoints and commands the Rev George Benjamin Armes, vicar of Cleator, and the Rural Dean of the Deanery of Whitehaven, and James Barnfather and William Graham, the churchwardens, as sequestrators, to collect and receive the rents, profits and emoluments to the vicarage belonging, and to provide that the cure of the said parish be duly supplied by a sufficient curate during the vacancy of the vicarage.

Yesterday week Mr Henry Edward Armstrong, a young man about 20 years of age, son of Mr Henry Armstrong, draper, Whitehaven, was accidentally poisoned under most painful circumstances. He had been in the employ of Messrs Gibson and Richards, as clerk in the office of the Chemical Works during the last two months, and was on very friendly terms with Mr Joseph Horrocks, practical chemist and manager of the works. Having frequently observed Mr Horrocks use the contents of a small bottle which was in the laboratory, for the purpose of perfuming his clothes after they had been splashed with the paraffin and other noxious liquids manufactured and kept on the premises, the deceased requested Mr Horrocks to give him a small quantity of the same liquid for a similar purpose, and the request was complied with. The liquid is named nitro benzole. Deceased had occasion to go into the town, and when there, felt exceedingly cold, to counteract which he partook of a glass of spirits with warm water, and straightway returned to the works. Apprehending that the smell of spirits would be discerned on him, he partook of two or three drops of the liquid out of the bottle. Immediately after, feeling strange sensations passing through his body, he went to Mr Horrocks, and inquired whether a few drops of the contents of the bottle would injure him. Mr Horrocks expressed surprise and horror at the question, and inquired how much he had taken. He produced the bottle and it appeared to Mr Horrocks that about fifteen drops had been taken out that morning. He then asked deceased if he had taken the whole of that. He said, "No, I spilled some of it in taking the cork out; I only took two or three drops." By this town deceased's countenance had become quite livid, and Mr Horrocks immediately hurried him off to the residence of Dr Greene. On Friday morning he expired. An inquest has been opened and adjourned.

Mr W. H. Atkinson, a well-known Whitehaven solicitor and Clerk to the Whitehaven Board of Guardians, was found dead in bed on Friday morning. He lived at Lund Hall, Ulverston, but also had a bedroom for occasional use at the Union Hall, Whitehaven, and it was here that he died. He had been in poor health for some considerable time, but continued to perform his duties, and conducted a case at the Police Court on Thursday. He retired to bed about ten o'clock, and when the caretaker went to his bedroom yesterday morning she found him lying dead in his bed. His spectacles were on, and a newspaper was lying on the table by his bedside. There was a little blood about his mouth, and the doctor who was called in came to the conclusion from a superficial examination, that death had been due to a stroke.

Mr Atkinson served articles as a solicitor with his uncle, and afterwards entered into partnership in the firm, which then took the style of Atkinson, Son and Collins. Subsequently he took into partnership the late Mr Ralph Bennett, and the business was continued under the style of Atkinson and Bennett. In March 1877, Mr John McKelvie resigned his appointment of Clerk to the Guardians of the Poor of the Whitehaven Union, and Mr Atkinson was appointed to the office after a tie with Mr Webster. He has held office for 34 years. Mr Atkinson was also Clerk to the Assessment Committee and the Rural Sanitary Authority, which became the present Rural District Council. He was also Superintendent Registrar of Births and Deaths, Clerk to the Whitehaven and Preston Quarter Burial Committee, and Clerk to the Galemire Joint Hospital Committee. Before the incorporation of the town Mr Atkinson was for many years returning officer for the borough in Parliamentary elections, and these duties he carried out with perfect impartiality and courtesy.

Mr Atkinson was a Freemason, a member of the Sun, Square and Compasses Lodge no. 119. Initiated 1<sup>st</sup> December 1873, he was Junior Deacon in 1876, Secretary 1877, Senior Warden 1879, and Worshipful Master in 1880, and subsequently he became Past Provincial Senior Grand Warden.

In connection with the Volunteers, Mr Atkinson was well-known throughout the county. He joined the Whitehaven Battery of Artillery when a young man, and his association with the Volunteer movement extended to nearly thirty years. He was captain for a number of years of the Whitehaven Battery; then he became Mayor, and in October 1891, he was gazetted Lieutenant-Colonel, and took command of the 1<sup>st</sup> Battalion Cumberland Volunteer Artillery. He retired a few years ago. During his military career he was also attached to the 3<sup>rd</sup> Battalion Border Regiment on occasional trainings at Brackenber Moor and Lowther Park. As a sportsman Mr Atkinson was well-known. Cricket and athletics had in him a warm supporter, and years ago he figured prominently as a player on the Whitehaven field. For many years he captained the Whitehaven Cricket Club, and was also a member of the old North British Wanderers eleven. He was a dashing and plucky bat, and a sound judge of the game. He and Mr J. G. Dees and Mr J. B. Robinson were among the three or four who remained of the Whitehaven team of 22 that played the All-England Eleven in 1868. He was also a keen curler and a member of the Whitehaven and Keswick Clubs. In private life Mr Atkinson was a most genial companion and very popular with all who knew him. He was a man of frank and independent character, and kindly disposition, and his many friends will hear of his death with sincere regret.

We regret to announce the death of Mr John Atkinson, which took place at his residence, Lowther-street, on Saturday morning. The deceased gentleman was the eldest and only survivor of the four sons of the late Mr Henry Armstrong, solicitor, of this town, who entered into business in 1811. Mr Atkinson was admitted solicitor in 1838 and subsequently entered into partnership with the late Mr Henry Collins (son in law to Mr Atkinson Sen.) who was admitted in 1828, also entering the firm at a later date as a partner. Mr Atkinson, at the time of his death, was the oldest solicitor in Whitehaven. He married Miss Dixon, sister of the late Mr Thomas Dixon, Rheda; she died in 1878 leaving no issue.



Mr Atkinson was for a number of years returning officer for the borough. He retired from business shortly after the year above named, taking up his residence at the house in Lowther-street, previously occupied by Mr Helder, and which belonged to the deceased; and he had lived there since. In 1883 Mr Atkinson was placed on the commission of the peace, but he did not attend petty sessions often, his deafness interfering with such duties. Mr Atkinson, like all his family, was a strong Conservative, but he took no active part in public life. He was in his 80<sup>th</sup> year. The funeral took place yesterday (Wednesday) at Arlecdon Churchyard, the Rev R Taylor, formerly vicar of that parish, and now of Bromfield, conducting the service at the graveside.

**THE SALISBURY RAILWAY DISASTER**

Mr Walter Barwick K.C. of Toronto, who was killed in the railway disaster at Salisbury, was brother in law of Mr W H Atkinson of Whitehaven, having married a sister of that gentleman who, with three children, survives him. Mr Atkinson went to London for the purpose of meeting his brother in law, and it was his painful duty to give evidence of identification at the opening of the inquest on Monday. Mr Barwick, who was 55 years of age, was head of the Toronto Bar.

We regret to announce the death by drowning of Mr Joseph Barker of the Coach and Horses public-house, King-street, which took place on the 4<sup>th</sup> instant, from board the ship Arab, at Nantes. A letter addressed from the Arab to a friend in Whitehaven thus explains the unfortunate occurrence: -

"Dear Sir, I am sorry to inform you of the untimely death of my mate, Joseph Barker, which took place last night at seven o'clock. He accidentally fell from the gangplank, with the gangway rope in his hand; he let go of the rope and sank immediately, and did not rise again. I was with one of the men within four yards of him when he fell, and there was also other help at hand; but as he did not rise to the surface it was impossible to save him. I regret his loss very much; he was active and diligent throughout every voyage, and his premature death has thus occurred while in the act of preventing accident to others by his spreading ashes on the plank from which he slipped his footing. We had just come up from supper when the accident happened. I did all in my power to recover the body but up to this time it has not been found. I sent a man down the river thirty miles to look for it. The current at the time was boiling in whirlpools and the water very muddy. The men were up at daybreak and down the river side as far as they could get searching for the body but without success. He had his watch on him at the time. Please to communicate this sad intelligence to Mrs Barker."

On Monday Mr Carrick, coroner for East Cumberland, held an inquest at Whitehaven on the body of James Edward Bewley, aged 19, who resided with his mother, Mrs Bewley, plumber, King Street Whitehaven, and who on Friday evening last was found dying in his bedroom, having been shot through the head with a revolver. The youth, who was serving his time as a fitter at Lowca, came home about half past five on Friday afternoon, and then appeared in his usual health and spirits, as he laughed and joked with his sister. He went up to his bedroom and his sister some time afterwards found him lying on the floor. The bedroom was in darkness but on a light being obtained it was found that the unfortunate youth had been shot in the right temple. Dr Fisher was at once called in, but death took place almost immediately. Thomas McGuire, aged 20, deposed that he gave Bewley the revolver to repair, as it was not in working order. When he gave it to the deceased, it had two cartridges in it. The Coroner examined the revolver and observed that it would not stand at full cock or half cock. He asked witnesses why he left in the cartridges? Witness: He wanted them to try the revolver. Witness added that he used the weapon for starting the competitors at races. The coroner advised witness not to touch firearms.

Isaac Bewley, a brother of the deceased, said he thought his brother had been handling the pistol, that he had snapped it and then turning the barrel and looking towards the muzzle it had gone off. The jury returned a verdict of "Accidental death." The Coroner remarked that he thought the pistol ought to be destroyed. He had never seen a pistol in such an unsafe state of repair. The brother of deceased said he would like to destroy the revolver. The Coroner said he thought the police would take care that no one else had a chance of doing any mischief with it.

**LOSS OF A WHITEHAVEN BRIG AND SIX OF THE CREW**

Intelligence has been received here of the total loss of the brig Mary Martha, belonging to this port, with six of the crew. Full particulars have not as yet come to hand, but it would appear that the Mary Martha had on board a cargo of hempseed in bulk, and was bound from Ibrail to Falmouth or Queenstown, for orders. On the 19<sup>th</sup> of August, when some 300 miles to the east of Malta, she was caught in a squall and capsized; all the crew, except three, it is supposed being drowned. How those three men escaped the sad fate of their unfortunate comrades is not exactly known, but it is certain that they were picked up by a German barque named the Theresa, and landed at Malta. The Mary Martha was owned in Whitehaven and neighbourhood; Captain David Borrowdale of the Dauntless, being the managing owner. His eldest son was master, and there is only too much reason to fear that, like others of his crew, he has met a watery grave. He was a promising young man, and has left a widow and child. What makes the case still more sad is the fact that this is the second son Captain Borrowdale has lost at sea within a few months. The other was mate of the Warwick Castle, and was unfortunately drowned on the passage home from India. . . The three saved and brought into Malta were: James Lightfoot, Harrington, second mate; Henry Rodridge, seaman, shipped in London; and John Connolly, apprentice, son of the late Captain Connolly of the William Wilson of Whitehaven. The vessel, we understand, was partially insured.

It is feared that Mr Arthur Livingstone Boyd, son of Mr George Boyd, C.E., Whitehaven, has been drowned in Argyllshire. He had been staying for some time in the island of Easdale, about eleven miles from Oban, and was missed on the evening of Wednesday the 8<sup>th</sup>. He had been out for a short stroll, and did not return. On search being made his cap was found the following evening upon the shore. Despite every effort which has since been made to ascertain beyond doubt what has become of him, no further clue has been obtained. Mr Boyd was residing with a medical gentleman, who is of opinion that he must accidentally have fallen into the sea and been drowned while strolling across the rocks, which at this place are rugged, slippery, and fall abruptly into the sea, some fishermen in the distance having seen a person on the rocks about the time

Mr Boyd was supposed to be there. Mr Boyd, who had just completed his twenty-first year, served his apprenticeship at the Bank of Whitehaven. He was much esteemed by all who knew him, and there is much sympathy with his parents and relatives.

**Mr George Boyd**

The death of Mr George Boyd, retired civil engineer, occurred on Monday at his house in Inkerman Terrace, Whitehaven, at the age of 93 years. Mr Boyd was born at Burgh-by-Sands in 1835, and he was therefore one of the few nonagenarians during whose life the railway and industrial enterprises in the county developed. He acquired his early engineering training in connection with the canal which at one time connected Carlisle with Port Carlisle, and he was one of the engineers engaged in the construction of the Carlisle and Silloth Railway, for the North British Railway Co., the course of the old canal being utilised as the route for part of the distance. Mr Boyd was also the engineer for the first dock at Silloth, now known as the outer dock, the gates of which were destroyed long ago by a gale, the present inner dock then being constructed and Silloth Green being made out of the soil dug out during the progress of the work. He was also engaged in work on the Elizabeth Dock, Maryport, and the original Carlisle Waterworks.

During the period of railway developments Mr Boyd was engaged on construction work in connection with lines in Lancashire, Yorkshire, Durham, Westmorland and Cumberland, as assistant or resident engineer, principally under the late Sir Thomas Bouch, CE. In 1867 he went to Whitehaven on his appointment as engineer to the old Whitehaven, Cleator and Egremont Railway, an appointment which was terminated in the early 80's by the acquisition of this railway by the London and North-Western and Furness Railway jointly. For the Cleator Company he carried out as engineer new railway extensions and widening. In the early eighties he started practising on his own account, and as railway construction had considerably decreased, he took up local government work and was responsible for the construction of numerous works of water supply, sewerage etc., for the Egremont, Arlecdon and Frizington and other local authorities. Afterwards he took up the appointment of engineer and surveyor to the Whitehaven Rural District Council, and carried out in their district a number of water and sewerage works and road improvements. It was in connection with this Council he was best known to the present generation. In spite of his advanced years Mr Boyd continued to practise his profession until about eight years ago, when he decided to retire. He had a remarkably vigorous constitution and until early this year, when he began to fail, was a well-known figure in Whitehaven.

Mr Boyd took a deep interest in religious and social matters, and was one of the founders of the Whitehaven YMCA. At one time he associated with Trinity Church, in the time of the late Canon Dalton, but for the past thirty years or so he had identified himself with St Nicholas Church. He was for some years a churchwarden and took an active part in the promotion of the scheme for a new organ, which resulted in the erection in the church of one of the finest instruments in the North of England.

Mr Boyd's wife, who was a Miss Campbell, of Maryport, predeceased him in 1910, and he is survived by two sons and two daughters. The funeral will take place today (Friday), leaving the residence at 11 am for service at St Nicholas Church.

William Bragg, who died recently at Harras Moor at the advanced age of 77, was a somewhat remarkable character. By trade he was a sawyer, and he worked for many years for Messrs Lumbley, Kennedy & Co., before wooden shipbuilding disappeared from Whitehaven. Then when top and bottom sawyers gave place to the revolving saw, William fell back on what up to that time had been but recreation and pleasure, as a means of living. He had been very fond of the violin, and he took to fiddling as a remunerative occupation. He took pupils, played for dancing, and led a string band; and in this connection he was known all over the countryside, down Egremont, Calderbridge and Gosforth way. He was an excellent judge of a violin and took to collecting as a hobby; and when he died he left over 80 violins in his little cottage – some of them very good specimens.

We regret to record the death of Mr Joseph Braithwaite, which took place on Monday morning at his residence Oakbank, Whitehaven. He had been confined to his bedroom for about a week, suffering from liver complaint, and though the nature of the illness was such as to require medical attendance, no serious results were in the least expect. He was apparently in an excellent way on Sunday afternoon, but about midnight he became very ill and passed away at two o'clock on Monday morning before the doctor could arrive. The deceased gentleman was an old and well known tradesman. He was a native of Beckermeth, having been born at Blackbeck, and came to Whitehaven when quite a boy with his father, Mr Thomas Braithwaite, who for many years was employed in the Granary Yard, and resided in the gardens at the high end of Peter Street, better known as "Whitey woa." The deceased became apprenticed to the late Mr William Todd, ironmonger, Strand Street, and on the completion of his apprenticeship in 1852 commenced business on his own account, succeeding the late Mr J J Peile, Market Place. He was soon after partnered by his brother Mr James Braithwaite and Mr Joseph Braithwaite Jun., son of the deceased gentleman, joined the firm in 1886. Mr James Braithwaite retired from business in 1892, and in 1894 Mr Joseph Braithwaite also retired, the firm being now carried on under the old style by Mr Braithwaite jun. The deceased gentleman took some part in public life. He was a member of the Whitehaven Board of Guardians for a great many years, and for some time occupied a seat on the Burial Board, retiring when the Board became connected with the Corporation. He was a director of the Lonsdale Mining Company and was one of the oldest directors of the Whitehaven Savings Bank, and had he lived a little longer he would have by right of rotation succeeded the late Mr Henry Jefferson, of Springfield, as one of the Trustees. Mr Braithwaite possessed many good qualities and was held in deservedly high esteem. He was a staunch Conservative though he took no active part in politics. He was 65 years of age, and leaves a widow and family of grown-up sons. The funeral takes place this (Thursday) afternoon.

We record this week the demise of another old Whitehaven tradesman, who passed away early on Saturday morning last, in Mr Sam Braithwaite, of Scotch Street, Whitehaven. The deceased, who was 77 years of age, had an apoplectic seizure about four years ago, and had been more or less of an invalid ever since. He was born at Tortola, Haile, being the son of an old Cumberland statesman. He served his time in Whitehaven with Mr Askew as a grocer, in the shop now owned and occupied by Mr Peter Leech at the corner of Lowther Street and Church Street. Mr Askew was a brother of the late Mr Askew, carver and guildler, of Whitehaven. Mr Braithwaite ultimately succeeded to the business, purchased the premises and carried on one of the most successful establishments in the town. He retired about 22 years ago, being succeeded by Mr Peter Leech; and after having resided at Hensingham for a while, some years ago came into town to live. Mr Braithwaite took no active part in public affairs, but he had a wide circle of friends and was highly respected by all who knew him. He leaves a widow and two daughters, both of whom are married. His funeral took place on Tuesday afternoon, the interment being at the Whitehaven Cemetery. It was largely attended by both town and country friends. Among the mourners were four brothers, nephews of the deceased, being sons of the late Mr Henry Braithwaite, the deceased's elder brother, viz., Mr John Braithwaite of Newcastle; Mr Edward Braithwaite RN HM Ship "Empress of India"; Dr S Braithwaite, Egremont; and – Braithwaite, Hall Flatt Farm.

We regret to record the death of Captain John Brewster, of Edgehill, Whitehaven, which took place on Saturday night and was due to apoplectic seizure. Captain Brewster, who was 59 years of age, was born at Annan, and served his time at sea, under Captain Nelson, in the sailing ship Gleaner, which was engaged in foreign trade, voyaging chiefly to South America. He afterwards served as mate on foreign ships and went quite a young man became master of the Emily Burnyeat, which belonged to the late Mr William Burnyeat of Whitehaven, and was engaged in coasting and Mediterranean trade. Later on he was transferred from this ship to an iron vessel, the Sarah Jane, another of Mr Burnyeat's boats. Ultimately Captain Brewster left the sea to take up the position of overlooker for Mr Burnyeat, and after that gentleman's death he continued to act in the same capacity for Messrs Burnyeat, Dalzell and Co., until about six years ago, when he himself took over the firm's ship-broking business, and also became managing owner of the steamship Thistle, which trades regularly at the Whitehaven port. For the past two years Captain Brewster has been unable, through ill-health, to take an active part in the management of his business, which, however, has been carried on by his son, Mr William Brewster. Captain Brewster, who was an unassuming man, was never prominently associated with public affairs, but he was nevertheless well known in the town and generally respected and esteemed. The deceased was a Presbyterian, and at one time held office at the old High Street Church. After the two Presbyterian bodies in Whitehaven became united and the High Street Church was closed, he attended the Market Place Church, and here he also acted as an office bearer until his health compelled him to resign the position. Captain Brewster, whose remains will be interred today, leaves a widow and four sons and four daughters.

October 11<sup>th</sup> 1922 Sheffield Daily Telegraph

The inquiry into the disaster at the Haig Pit, Whitehaven, on September 5<sup>th</sup>, when thirty-nine lives were lost, was resumed at Whitehaven yesterday. The inquiry is being conducted by the Coroner for West Cumberland, with whom is associated the Chief Inspector of Mines. Mr Herbert Smith, President of the Miners' Federation, elicited from one witness that six holes had been found improperly fired near the body of the shot firer whose qualifications were the subject of many questions.

Alexander Millar, under-manager, recalled, gave particulars of seven working places which had to be fenced off on account of gas.

Mr Smith questioned witness closely regarding the qualifications of the shot firer, Brewster, who was killed in the explosion. Witness said that Brewster told him he had five years' practical experience, and he also had a deputy's certificate. He asked Mr Smith not to lose sight of the fact that the man served five years during the war.

Mr Smith: I never lose sight of the war. We have lost too many in it. (Applause in court.)

Witness said that he considered Brewster a qualified man, apart from his war service.

Mr Macquister, KC, pointed out that Brewster was granted his deputy's certificate by a public authority, which fully qualified him for his work.

Mr Top Cape, MP: We would like to know who gave you the authority.

The Coroner: I cannot go into that; you must tackle the public authority concerned.

Isaac Churchill Graham, an overman at William Pit, Whitehaven, said that on hearing the buzzer at Haig Pit after the accident he went there and went underground. He described the finding of the body of Weightman, a deputy, who was lying on his back, his feet towards the workings. Witness took him out and went back to examine the place. He found a cable six feet from the face, and on tracing it back found an electric lamp and an oil lamp. The cable was connected to a battery and it appears as if Weightman had just been firing a shot which seemed to have been a good one, which had done its work properly. There was nothing in the nature of a "blot out." Wires were hanging from other shot holes, as if the man was preparing to fire those shots.

James Strickland, manager of the Ladysmith Pit, who was in charge of the rescue parties, described the finding of the body of Brewster, the shot firer. He found four bodies where there had been a slight fall. Next day, in another working place, he found five holes had been charged, and one had been fired. The finding of a cable led to the discovery of Brewster's body. Part of the cable led underneath the body, and an explosives tin was hanging round his neck. Witness followed the cable for a further ten feet, and found it lying in a tangled mass and beneath it was the key of the battery. At the coal face three shot holes had been bored.

William Thompson, a deputy at Haig Pit, said he had never found gas where the men were working. He expressed the opinion that Brewster was not shot firing at the time of his death. He would not have been lying in line with the shots, or have his explosives tin round his neck. Witness explained to Mr Smith that the reason he agreed to work 12 hours was that another man was on holiday.

Mr Smith declared that 20 men in Whitehaven, who held deputies' certificates, were out of work at the time.

Mr Smith next questioned witness about six shots which had been fired at the place where Brewster was found. Witness said the place was not properly holed for six shots.

There were some manifestations of surprise in court when Mr Smith went on to suggest that all six shots were fired contrary to the Mines Act, and witness agreed.

Mr Macquister asked if the three bottom shots had not done their work.

Witness: not in my opinion. I think they had been bored a little into the solid.

Evidence as to conditions in the pit was given by coal hewers, one of whom, John Slack, said that Brewster fired shots for him on two occasions, when he followed the same procedure as the deputies.

The inquiry was adjourned until today.

The inquiry into the Haig disaster concluded at Whitehaven on Saturday when the jury found that the disaster was due to an explosion of fire-damp and coal dust caused by shot firing. They recommended that no explosives be used at Haig Pit in procuring coal. . .

In our impression of Thursday, we announced that Mr G W Brown, manager of the Bank of Whitehaven, had on the previous Friday, while staying at Whinlatter Cottage, Braithwaite, near Keswick, been thrown out of a pony phaeton while driving in the neighbourhood, and had sustained a severe compound fracture of the leg. At the time we wrote it was hoped and supposed that Mr Brown was progressing favourably. Unfortunately, however, the accident was attended with fatal issues. The shock proved too severe for the system, and on Saturday last the melancholy intelligence of the death of Mr Brown on that day reached Whitehaven. The news produced a very painful sensation. It was told by one to another with something more than mouth sorrow. For the deceased gentleman was one among a thousand. Outside the sphere of his professional life, which may be said to have been of a quasi public character, Mr Brown was in no sense of the word "a public man" yet few names associated with the interests of our community have been hidden in death's dark night more universally honoured than his. His was the nobility of goodness. His was "pure religion and undefiled." His aim was to be ever doing good - from far other motives than those of vanity and ostentation. He let not his left hand know what his right hand did; and while the public hardly ever saw a record of his generous acts, they are yet written in indelible characters. "Open as day to melting charity,"

he did not satisfy his conscience with mere pecuniary gifts. He regularly conducted the services of the Plymouth Brethren, in Mr Lowden's Schoolroom, Albion-terrace, and was most indefatigable in his Sunday and weekday ministrations. As manager of the bank, he enjoyed the most entire confidence of his directors, and of the public at large; and in all relations of life he presented a character stainless and unimpeachable. On Tuesday morning the remains of Mr Brown having been removed from Braithwaite, were interred at the Cemetery, Whitehaven. All the more influential residents in the town attended to pay the last mark of respect to the memory of the deceased, and there were not a few sorrowing mourners in the poor people who had been participants of Mr Brown's munificence. . . Mr Brown at the time of his death was 57 years of age. he leaves a wife and six children to lament his loss.

**The Drowning of a Carlisle Boy**

Details of the circumstances under which John Brydon, the son of Mrs Brydon of Abbey Street, Carlisle, lost his life at sea, by being washed overboard the Crummock Water, have now been received. Brydon, who was 17 years of age, was an apprentice on board that vessel, which encountered fearful weather in the Indian Ocean on the 31<sup>st</sup> of March and 1<sup>st</sup> of April. Captain Amery states in his log that he was obliged to run before the gale and keep good canvas set. "We used 25 gallons of oil over the sides, otherwise there would have been heavy seas pooping. At 4 pm the wind veered to the southwest, when a tremendous sea broke over amidships on the port side, rushing aft, taking seven men over the rail, three of whom - John Brydon, eldest apprentice; T Davis, A.B.; and H Bolteel, ordinary seaman - were lost. The others managed to retain their holds and get back on deck. The vessel was sailing at the time over 12 knots an hour, and the sea was so heavy that it was impossible to render the least assistance. When next seen the men were about three or four hundred yards astern. It was an utter impossibility to bring the ship to lower a boat, as the decks would have been swept and many more lives lost. Captain Amery was evidently much attached to Brydon. He is a thorough believer in the use of oil on troubled waters, and used it to advantage during his recent rough time in the Indian Ocean. Brydon succeeded in keeping back many monster waves by the aid of oil, but being called away for a moment to lend a hand at some other work, the fatal wave was shipped.

Death of Miss Murray of Whitehaven

The announcement of the death of this good and benevolent lady, which occurred at two o'clock yesterday (Wednesday) morning, at her residence, 75 Lowther Street, will be received with regret by all who knew

her, and by no class will she be more deeply mourned than by the poor, to whom she was a kind friend and generous benefactress. Her name is a household word in the town for deeds of charity and benevolence. Miss Murray was one of the late Canon Dalton's best Christian workers, and it would be very difficult to enumerate the many good works in which she was engaged. She had the interests of the Church Missionary Society very deeply at heart, and acted as secretary of the Whitehaven branch. She was also secretary of the Society of Promoting Christianity among the Jews. Miss Murray, however, devoted most of her leisure time to obtain subscriptions for local charitable purposes. She and her sister, Mrs Burns, were chiefly instrumental in putting the Soup Kitchen on a sound financial footing. Towards almost every charity in the town Miss Murray contributed most munificently and was also the means of aiding the same very materially by handsome collections from her numerous friends and acquaintances. As showing that her valuable services were appreciated, in 1886 a meeting was held in Holy Trinity School "to consider the most desirable mode of recognising Miss Murray's indefatigable exertions for such a number of years in the cause of benevolence, as well as for the efficiency of her management of the charities of the town with which she was associated" and it was decided to establish "The Murray Fund" to be devoted to relieving the necessities of the poor of the district. Miss Murray's place will indeed be hard to fill, but Mrs Dalton is doing her best to supply the void. Miss Murray, who was in her 83<sup>rd</sup> year, had been in failing health for some time before her death, but she retained her faculties and exhibited a lively interest in those affairs which had always given her so much delight, almost up to the last. Her remains will be interred at eleven o'clock on Saturday forenoon, and the majority of the tradesmen in Lowther-street, King-street and the Market-place have agreed to close their shops during the funeral.

Last night an inquest was held on view of the body at Hensingham, when a verdict in accordance with the above facts was returned.

Shipping Notes

The London shipping world is altogether unable to account for the mysterious disappearance of the British S.S. Hashemi, belonging to the Bombay and Persia Steam Navigation Co. Sailing from Calcutta on the 4<sup>th</sup> September for Bombay, she has never since been heard of. She is a large steam screw steamer of 3,302 tons burthen, class 100 A1, built in 1894 by Messrs A Stephen and Sons of Glasgow, and was only bought by her

present owners late last year. The class of vessel which is posted as "missing" at Lloyds, is usually a sailer making a long voyage in the Australian or Pacific trade, and it is almost unprecedented for a large well-founded steamer making a short coastal voyage of this description to vanish thus. Underwriters were absolutely refusing to accept any further insurances upon the vessel today, and she cannot any longer figure in the overdue list even at 92 guineas per cent.

**July 18<sup>th</sup> 1906 London Evening Standard**

The official report of the inquiry into the loss of the British S.S. Hashemi, which is to hand, will not be by any means satisfactory to the underwriters who have to pay a total loss upon her. A large vessel of 3301 tons gross, she was owned by the Bombay and Steam Navigation Company and was chartered by the Bengal Coal Company. The Hashemi left Calcutta on September 4 last, with a cargo of coal for Bombay, having on board a crew of 75 hands. Nothing whatever has been heard of the vessel from the time she sailed, and the court could only conjecture that she foundered in a "small cyclonic storm of moderate intensity" in the Bay of Bengal. But the court found, as a fact, that the vessel was considerably overloaded when she left Calcutta, having taken on board much more cargo than she was legally entitled to, which part of the cargo was actually being carried on deck. Apart altogether from the heavy monetary loss (the vessel was insured for exactly £20,000 on the hull and about £10,000 additional on cargo and freight) it seems deplorable that nearly 100 lives have been lost in a casualty of this description, for under normal conditions the weather appears to have been by no means dangerous to a vessel of such a size. The Hashemi was quite a modern boat, built on the Clyde in 1894, and was well found in every respect.

We regret to announce the death of Mr John Collins, formerly Clerk to the Whitehaven Town and Harbour Trust, which took place at Petersfield on Tuesday. Mr Collins was the son of the late Mr Henry Collins of the firm of Atkinson and Collins, solicitors, Whitehaven, and became Clerk to the Whitehaven Town and Harbour Trust on the 11<sup>th</sup> August 1862, succeeding Mr John Musgrave in that important position, and retired on a pension in November 1894 on the separation of the Town and Harbour. His position naturally brought him prominently before the public, and just as he was well-known so was he equally regarded by all sections of the public, whom he served well and faithfully. He was the most unobtrusive of men, yet he brought to bear in his important calling very great ability, and an energy which were alike remarkable, especially in the later years of his life, when he had constantly to fight against sickness and bodily infirmity, which had their origin in an accident on the race-course. He possessed many excellent traits, and in this connection it is worthy of note that during the whole of the period of rivalry between the respective parties on the Trustee Board he knew neither one side nor the other, and was respected by both. During the earlier part of his career he was a keen and active sportsman. He was an ardent follower and liberal supporter of the Harriers and Foxhounds, and a familiar figure at the Harras Moor Races in their more palmy days. He rode at the latter on several occasions, and the last time he rode he met with an accident which permanently lamed him. He was riding his mare Flounce at the time, and appeared to have the race in hand when another horse crossed him and upset his mare, which fell upon him and seriously injured him. This ended his active career as a sportsman, and from that time till his death he gradually declined in health. In later years he had to be conveyed from his residence to the Town Hall in a bath chair, though he was otherwise well able to carry out his official duties in connection with the Town and Harbour. He remained a short time in Whitehaven after his retirement, and afterwards went to Petersfield. He was 62 years of age. On the receipt of the news of his death the Town Hall, Harbour Office and Free Library flags were hoisted half-mast.

Mr J Webster, coroner, held an inquest at the Mission House Moresby Parks on Saturday, relative to the death of Joseph Connors, 18, who was killed on Friday morning in the fitting shop connected with the Walk Mill Pit. Mr Oswald, inspector of coal mines, was present at the inquiry. Thomas Connors, an engineer, living at Moresby Parks, said the deceased was his son. Witness was present at the fitting shop when the accident happened, and was about eight yards away from the deceased. There was in the shop a grindstone which was worked from the engine shaft. Witness thought the band had come off the pulley or wheel by which the grindstone was driven. They generally kept the grindstone running for the purpose of grinding their tools. Witness went into the workshop for a screw key. On returning to his vice he just happened to turn round, and was going to shout at the deceased, but before he had time to do so he saw his son caught by

the belt and go up over the engine shaft. Witness thought the lad was going to put the band on the pulley of the engine shaft and the belt caught him whilst he was doing this.

By Mr Oswald- The belt was not fenced

Samuel Walton, a blacksmith living at 13 Albert Terrace, Whitehaven, said he saw the accident occur. He started the engine at 11.30, and it would be running for about two minutes when he noticed the grindstone belt was off. Witness shut off the steam for the purpose of putting the belt on, when the deceased came behind him. Witness said to him, "Keep off, keep off" but deceased stepped forward and got hold of the belt with both hands. He also set his foot on the portion of the belt that was on the floor and it took him right over the pulley. Witness was going to wait until the engine stopped to put the belt on again. Witness was not aware that anyone had told the deceased to put the belt on. They were not in the habit of putting the belt on when the engine was running. The jury returned a verdict that the deceased was "Accidentally killed."

We regret to announce the death of Mr. John Corrie, which took place at his residence, Irish Street, Whitehaven, on Sunday. The deceased gentleman had been ailing for some time, and had reached the advanced age of 78. Mr. Corrie was a well-known figure in the Whitehaven district, being intimately brought into close connection with the public by reason of his position as goods agent at the Preston Street Station of the Furness Railway Company. He retired into private life about two years ago, after a connection with the Company extending over the long period of more than fifty years. He was the son of Mr. Joseph Corrie, of Busk, near Kirkoswald. His first appointment was at Harrington on February 1<sup>st</sup>, 1846, and from there he was promoted to Whitehaven in January of the following year, where, as goods agent, he received the first luggage train that ran through from Carlisle to Whitehaven on February 1<sup>st</sup> 1847. The line was not open for passenger traffic until March 1<sup>st</sup> of the same year, on which date the first passenger train to Maryport was run, the Rev. J. Jenkinson, incumbent at St. James', Whitehaven, at the time, being credited with having purchased the first ticket used, booking to Maryport. The funeral of the deceased took place at the Cemetery yesterday afternoon, and largely attended.

On Thursday evening, an accident attended with fatal results, occurred in the Henry Pit Whitehaven to a youth named John Cowan, 13 years of age, the son of Wm Cowan, coalminer, of 35 Front Row, Newhouses, Whitehaven. Cowan was employed as a trapper and went to work about two o'clock on Thursday afternoon, and about seven o'clock he was run over by a "sett" of wagons, and very much crushed about both legs and body. As soon as possible he was got out of the pit and conveyed home on stretchers. Dr Harris was in immediate attendance and deemed it necessary to amputate one of the lad's legs. The boy, however, almost immediately afterwards succumbed to his injuries. It is not known definitely how the accident occurred. The duty of the lad was to attend to a number of trucks, which are drawn up the wagon way by an engine. There were seven of these trucks, and it was the duty of Cowan, when they were ready to start, to give a signal to the engineman and another signal when the trucks were to be stopped. The first signal was given all right, and the engine started to haul the wagons, and it is supposed that after the wagons had started the lad attempted to get into one of them, and was then thrown down and run over. The second signal was never given, and on going to ascertain the cause, the lad was found lying underneath one of the trucks. The boy had no business to ride on the trucks at all, as a place is provided in which he can stand until the wagons have passed.

**MAN CRUSHED TO DEATH IN WHITEHAVEN DOCK**

The second inquiry was touching the death of Charles Cowell, aged 55 years, master of the brigantine "Fanny" of Ramsey. William Kennish said he was mate of the "Fanny" and belonged to Ramsey. They had been three weeks last Saturday in Whitehaven harbour, wind-bound, with a cargo of coal, lying in the north basin. On Thursday night the captain was quite well and attending to the ship. He had got outside of the vessel's rail and was asking witness to hand him a fender, when he was crushed against the sleeper of the quay, and he cried out to witness to hold on, that he was very badly hurt. There was a very bad motion in the water at the time, and the vessel was broadside to the quay, and it was blowing very heavy. They pulled deceased in, and he was taken down into the cabin. Afterwards he was taken to the Infirmary. He died at two o'clock this morning. Deceased was hurt between the hips and the loins. Had he been caught by the hips he would have been smashed to pieces. When he was being taken into the cabin he said to witness, "I'm done." Asked him what he would do with the ship, and he said he was to do what he liked. Mr Coulthard, the broker, had something to do with the vessel, and he let the deceased's friends know of the occurrence. John Batey, seaman, belonging to Irvin, Scotland, corroborated this evidence and the jury returned a verdict of "Accidental death."

The death is announced at his residence, Hilton-terrace, on Saturday, of Mr Thomas Cowman, an old and well known Whitehaven skipper, in his 77<sup>th</sup> year. Captain Cowman, who was born in the town, came from an old seafaring family, his father being for a number of years captain of the brig Favourite, which traded to Dublin and Quebec, and was lost in Kingstown about twelve years ago. He had three brothers, who were also skippers of Whitehaven craft, and deceased's only son went down with all hands in one of his father's vessels, the Erato, in January 1866, in the same gale, in the Bay of Biscay, that sent the steamer London to the bottom. The Erato was only about five miles from the London when she foundered, and nothing was ever seen of the former save a boat, which was found bottom upward by a French man of war. Captain Cowman followed the sea for a number of years as skipper of the Favourite, which he owned; and he was the principal owner in several others, including the Erato, the Tarragona, the Tarano, the Elizabeth Cowman, the Allies, the Kestrel &c. He was a quiet inoffensive man; and save that he sat for several years as a Trustee for the Harbour Ward, a silent member, he took no part in local affairs. Deceased was twice married, and leaves a married daughter. Captain Bragg and Mr J Kitchin were appointed executors under his will.

On Saturday evening last a melancholy accident occurred in King Street, Whitehaven, which resulted in the death of Mr George Curling Cox, jeweller, residing close to the spot where the catastrophe occurred. In contemplation of the opening, at an early date, of the Whitehaven and Furness Junction Railway, a new engine, to run on the line, had been procured, and arrived from Newcastle in the course of the week. It was intended on Friday evening to remove this immense locomotive from the terminus of the Whitehaven Junction to the new station at the end of Preston Street, but owing to the unfavourable state of the weather, the task was deferred till the following day; the engine having only then got to the end of the North Wall. On the afternoon of Saturday, Mr Dees, the superintending engineer of the railway, obtained the assistance of about five and thirty men when, by means of a number of moveable rails, properly connected together from side to side, but capable of being taken up and carried forward as the engine had passed over each length, the locomotive was brought from its position and taken down Tangier Street and King Street. The operation was as carefully performed as possible, and was necessarily exceedingly slow. The rate of progression, however, may be estimated with tolerable accuracy, from the fact that the first movement of the engine was made at about four o'clock in the afternoon; that it was better than half past ten ere it had reached the spot where the lamentable event happened; and that it was not till past seven next morning before it arrived at the railway station in Preston Street. The engine was not drawn by horses as it was considered unsafe to do so through the narrow thoroughfares which it was requisite to pass along, on account of the numbers of these animals that would have been necessary, and the crowd which was certain to collect in the streets to witness so novel a spectacle. It was therefore drawn by men with ropes on the moveable rails referred to; several of the police force being employed during the whole time to keep back the throng of spectators, and to prevent, if possible, any accident from occurring. During the whole of the operations, a large assemblage of people, attracted by curiosity, crowded the streets, and at about half-past ten o'clock, when the engine was nearly opposite Mr Cox's own door, that unfortunate gentleman, who had but just recovered from a long and serious fit of illness, stepped off the path, apparently to render what assistance he could in moving the ponderous machine, the weight of which is upwards of twenty tons, by pulling at one of the ropes, when his foot appears to have slipped under one of the rails, either through the tilting of the end, as it was pressed by the engine, or through a slight hollow in the street; and feeling the sudden pressure, Mr Cox endeavoured to extricate his foot, when his leg came into contact with the sharp edge of the left wheel of the locomotive, which dreadfully lacerated the limb, completely severed the bone and left the lower portion of it attached to the upper part by merely a few shreds of muscle and skin. So intense was the shock sustained by the system of the unfortunate sufferer that, although every attention was instantly paid to him by nearly all the medical gentlemen in the town, who were at once sent for and who promptly attended, he never rallied, but gradually sank, and expired about half past three o'clock on Sunday morning.

An inquest was held to inquire into the circumstances attending this fatal accident on Monday morning at seven o'clock, at Mrs Todhunter's, the Albion Hotel, King Street, before W Lumb Esq. coroner, and a respectable jury, when a verdict of accidental death was returned. Mr Cox was about 36 years of age and was much respected by a large circle of friends. He has left a widow and seven children. The melancholy interest attaching to his untimely death has been greatly heightened by the fact that on Monday morning, Mrs Cox gave birth to twins, premature accouchement having been brought on by the shock which she had sustained. The mother and children, we understand, are at present doing well.

The deceased was a great favourite with his Sovereign, with whom, if he found him alone in the stables, he invariably spent some time in conversation. Having been so frequently in company with the good old King, Mr Gird was wont to relate numerous anecdotes of that somewhat eccentric Monarch, one of which we annex, under the hope that it may not be unacceptable to our readers.

Mr Gird had been commanded to make a new saddle for one of the Royal stud, and whilst selecting a saddle-tree to fit the animal, His Majesty joined him in the stable and fixing upon a small saddle-tree, handed it to Mr Gird, as the one he should prefer to any other. Mr Gird assured His Majesty that it would not fit, and placing the article on the horse's back desired His Majesty to examine it, and he would at once discover that it was not adapted for him. The King, who was not to be thus deprived of his favourite saddle-tree, exclaimed: - "All horses are alike: what will suit one will do for another. You must have this - you must have this." Mr Gird, begging His Majesty's pardon assured his Royal preceptor he was labouring under a mistake, that a saddle-tree which would sit easy on the back of one horse would not necessarily do so on that of

another. The Royal amateur saddler, however, was not to be thus reasoned out of his choice, but still maintained that, as all horses were alike, the same saddle tree would fit any horse whatever. Mr Gird, again begging His Majesty's pardon for objecting to his choice, and by way of illustrating the fallacy of His Majesty's reasoning, remarked that a saddle-tree would not necessarily fit any horse, any more that would one man's coat fit every man. "For example," continued Mr Gird, "my coat (Mr Gird being a man of short stature) would not fit your Majesty." This evidently shook His Majesty's faith in his previous reasoning, and, after pausing a few seconds, exclaimed in his usual hurried manner - "Right, saddler; right, saddler; right saddler; take your own plan, take your own plan" and away he hied in the direction of the royal castle, evidently with more knowledge of saddlery than when he left.

He had not been in robust health for some eighteen months and was taken seriously ill some seven weeks ago, from which he never rallied. Deceased, who was 75 years of age, was a native of Bolton but he had been in business in Whitehaven for about 50 years. He was a man of considerable ability and born genius in connection with his profession. Several ingenious patents in the manufacture of umbrellas were introduced by him and only a few weeks before his death he took out another patent for two further improvements which have been recognised by experts as of considerable importance. In the manufacture of all kinds of wirework he was an adept. He was a man highly respected by all who knew him. In politics he was an ardent Liberal. He leaves a widow and numerous grown up family. The interment will take place at the Whitehaven Cemetery on Sunday afternoon at three o'clock.

On Thursday evening a public meeting, on requisition of a preliminary meeting of shipowners and others, W Miller Esq, in the chair, was held in the Globe Hotel Assembly Room, Whitehaven, to adopt measures for the relief of the widows and orphans of the seamen lost in the recent gales. The meeting, we rejoice to say, was one of the best attended and influential ever held in Whitehaven. . .the Chairman said the unparalleled loss of life occasioned by the numerous shipwrecks during the late terrific gale, had excited a warm feeling

of sympathy in the minds, he believed, of every person, and that feeling had caused a few gentlemen to consider the best mode of promoting, with efficiency, the relief of sufferers. The conclusion they had come to as the most effectual mode of doing so would be to call a public meeting, and originate a general subscription. . . 2) The AGNES; the Captain, Richardson, George-street, had left a widow but no family dependent on him. The mate, T Lewis, Michael-street, son in law of the captain, had left a widow and 2 children aged 7 years and 13 months, no means. One of the crew, Robert Currie, Michael-street, had left a widow and 5 children unprovided for. Of the latter the eldest, aged 20, was subject to fits and was entirely dependent on his mother, the ages of the rest were between 11 years and 5 months. This case was a very destitute one. . .

**MELANCHOLY DEATH OF A CHILD FROM FRIGHT**

W Lumb Esq., coroner, held an inquest on Monday at the house of Mr D Benson, Tangier-street, Whitehaven, touching the death of James Daley, aged 9, son of Joseph Daley, Albert-terrace, who, it was alleged, had died from fright occasioned by a dog being set upon him. Mr James Henshall, assistant with Dr Wilson, gave it as his opinion that death was the result of a fright. A youth named Joseph Wilkinson, Sunny Hill, had, three weeks ago, taken hold of the deceased in fun and frightened him by telling him he was a policeman, and would take him to the station. At the same time two sheep dogs which were with Wilkinson began to bark, but did not touch deceased. The poor little fellow ran screaming home, and had ever since complained of pains in his head, and on Thursday night last became collapsed and on Friday morning he died. The Coroner, in summing up, pointed out that though there was no blame in the eye of the law, morally the youth, Wilkinson, might be considered to have caused the child's death by one of those stupid practical jokes which often resulted more seriously than the perpetrators of them expected or intended. He hoped that it would be a warning to him for the future. The jury returned a verdict that death had been caused by a shock.

A familiar figure has just been removed from our midst by the hand of death. We allude to the demise on Saturday morning last of the Rev Thomas Dalton, B.D., Honorary Canon of Carlisle Cathedral, Vicar of Holy Trinity and Rural Dean of Whitehaven. The deceased was present at the Church services on Sunday the 3<sup>rd</sup> inst, and on the following day he complained of a cold, which developed into bronchitis. On Tuesday the Canon had great difficulty in breathing, and his condition on Wednesday became more critical. On Thursday there appeared to be an improvement in the patient's condition, and the Canon desired to be allowed to come downstairs, but his medical adviser (Dr Ablett) would not permit him to do so. On the evening of the same day there was a relapse; on Friday the deceased was insensible and he died at twenty minutes to four o'clock on Saturday morning.

The Rev gentleman who was in his 84<sup>th</sup> year, was a native of the district of Longtown, his father being a yeoman in that neighbourhood. He proceeded to St Bees Theological College in 1829; he was admitted into holy orders in 1833 by the Bishop of Chester, in whose diocese Whitehaven was at that period. His first curacy was at Holy Trinity, and as the vicar, the Rev T Harrison, was in failing health, there was a large field for his youthful energy and activity. When Mr Harrison died in 1840, Canon Dalton was appointed to the vacant living, and from that time almost up to the day of his death he has continued to labour with great zeal amongst his parishioners. . . The deceased was twice married. His first wife was Miss Buckham (a daughter of the late Mr George Buckham, draper, of this town) by whom he had a family of eight sons. Six of them are living, and four of them are ministers of the Church of England. Thomas, the eldest, was a wrangler at Cambridge, and is now head mathematical master at Eton. He has also distinguished himself in public affairs, being chairman of the Eton Local Board and a County Councillor for the division in which he resides in Buckinghamshire. John is vicar of Hickleton near Doncaster. Joseph, who married a daughter of the late Sir Joseph Paxton, is also a clergyman. Edward Septimus, the seventh son, is curate at Kirkby Stephen. Charles is a medical practitioner in Derby. The deceased's second wife, who survives her husband, was a cousin of his first wife, and is Mrs James Brockbank's sister. Mrs Dalton has shown herself to be an ideal clergyman's wife by her activity in church and parochial affairs, especially in the work of district visiting.

The living of Holy Trinity is in the gift of the Earl of Lonsdale and is worth £300 with a house.

March 21<sup>st</sup> 1889 Cumberland Pacquet

On Sunday morning a funeral sermon was preached at Holy Trinity to a large body of worshippers by the Rev T Dalton, head mathematical master at Eton, and the eldest son of the late vicar. He selected as he text 1<sup>st</sup> Corinthians, ii, 9-10, "But it is written, Eye hath not seen nor ear heard, neither have entered into the heart of man, the things which God hath prepared for them that love him. But God hath revealed them unto us by his Spirit; for the Spirit searcheth all things, yea, the deep things of God." The preacher prefaced his discourse by observing that he could not tell how much the relatives and friends of his late father were comforted by the service which was held in that church on Friday, when so many of the inhabitants of the town where his life's work was done, assembled to pay their last respects.

After explaining the text, Mr Dalton went on to refer to some incidents in his father's life. He came to Whitehaven as curate in 1832 when the cholera was raging with a severity which it has never assumed since that time. The ravages of that disease and its fatality might be gathered from the fact that his father once pointed out to him a man who had been dragged down some cellar stairs and thrown amongst a lot of dead bodies, under the impression that he too was dead. By a chance it was discovered that he breathed, he was taken out and eventually he recovered.

In 1840 he succeeded the Rev Thomas Harrison in the incumbency, although for some years previously he had been practically in sole charge. He dwelt very modestly and affectionately on his father's early labours, mentioning that by his extreme earnestness he was successful in gathering large congregations to his

ministry. It was rather remarkable that the last two incumbents had held the living for 81 years between them, and as the church was built in 1715, that covered about half of its existence. In 1862 he was appointed an honorary Canon of Carlisle Cathedral and had been the senior member of that diocesan body for many years. His private life was uneventful. His first great sorrow was about 16 years ago when he suffered the loss of a much beloved son; this blow being rendered all the more severe from the circumstance that his (the preacher's) mother was away on an errand of love and mercy, and got home in the morning only to find that she was too late. His mother never got over this great grief, and she herself succumbed about eighteen months afterwards. This was a very heavy affliction for his father, whose letters and bearing at that time were so sacred to say any more about. As an indication of the sense of the great responsibility which their late vicar felt on entering upon the ministry, he might say that on looking over his papers the other day, he came across three manuscripts tied together; one was his first sermon as curate, another his first as incumbent, and the third his Latin sermon preached on the occasion of his taking his degree at Cambridge. The last years of his life had been very peaceful. The probability of his resigning had been talked about, but there was no valid reason why he should resign, as his strength was equal to his duties. He had passed away very calmly.

The Derry Standard of Friday says; "Yesterday the remains of Mrs Davidson were conveyed from her late residence in Spencer-road to the family burying ground at Ballykelly. The service in the house was conducted by the Rev. Dr. Stuart. The chief mourners were - Messrs. James Marrow, brother; James M'Sparron, brother-in-law; and Robert Parkhill, cousin. The funeral procession was large and respectable, having been greatly augmented as it moved towards Ballykelly. Mrs Davidson was one of those choice spirits that will be much missed in every circle in which she was well known. As a girl she gave indication of what she afterwards became. During the revival movement 1859, which swept over Ulster, her warm and generous nature received a more decided bent, and she became an active and useful district visitor, tract distributor, and Sabbath-school teacher under the late Rev. Dr. T. Y. Killen and the Rev. W. O. Robinson, M. A., the highly respected minister of Ballykelly. In 1875 she was married to Rev Alexander Davidson, MA., Presbyterian minister of Cleator Moor, Cumberland, and during the seventeen years of her wedded life she was leader in every good work in connection with the congregation. After her husband's death she came to reside in Londonderry, but, owing to her heavy bereavement, her health was so impaired that she was unable enter with her usual earnestness upon Christian work. During the closing months of the past year she paid a visit to Cleator Moor, and spent an exceedingly happy time amongst her many deeply attached friends. Returning in vigorous health, she determined to carry out some her previous plans for devoting time and energy the work of her Divine Master. Sudden illness stayed her purpose, and after little more than a fortnight, during which she manifested cloudless faith and marvellous Christian fortitude, patience, and submission to the will of God, she passed peacefully to sleep, leaving behind a large circle of friends and neighbours, who had manifested the tenderest sympathy and kindness.

On Saturday morning Mr John Dickinson, an old Whitehaven townsman, passed away after a long illness. About two years ago he had a paralytic seizure, and afterwards gradually declined, though he was able to walk with assistance until towards the close of last year. About a month ago he became much worse and his friends saw that the end was approaching. Deceased, who was 63 years of age and resided in Senhouse Street, was one of the best known and most highly respected men in Whitehaven and both in business and social life he made many friends by his courtesy and geniality. Before the seizure he was a very active man and carried on an extensive auctioneering business at the Mart in Church Street, which has since been conducted by his son George. Straightforwardness was one of his chief characteristics – no man loved fair dealing more than John Dickinson. He was a son of the late Mr John Dickinson who, in the capacity of a local preacher, was closely associated with Primitive Methodism in this district. After leaving school he served an apprenticeship with the late Mr J Young, joiner, Whitehaven, and ultimately entered into business for himself as a joiner and undertaker. A few years later he also took up auctioneering, which he had carried on for the past twenty years, the joinery business being likewise continued during that period. Mr Dickinson represented St James's Ward on the Whitehaven Town Council, and was elected to that position when the town was incorporated. He retained his seat without a break, and at the last election was returned without opposition. He always evinced a keen interest in public affairs, and in the time of the old Trustee Board he once put up against Captain Bragg as a candidate for a seat on that body, and was defeated by a majority of only three votes. Mr Dickinson was a Freemason, and belonged to the Curwen Lodge, Harrington; he was also an Orangeman, being a Past Grand of No 66 Lodge. In politics he was a staunch Liberal. He leaves a widow and four sons.

On Saturday morning the flag at the Town Hall was hoisted at half mast, and at the Primitive Methodist Church on Sunday morning the Rev J Jenkins (minister) made a few appropriate remarks in reference to the death of Mr Dickinson, who was a member and good supporter of that church. The funeral takes place this Wednesday afternoon and will be attended, amongst others, by the members of the Town Council.

On Saturday last an inquest was opened at Mr King's spirit vaults, Ginns, on the body of a miner, named John Dixon, who was killed whilst working in Croft Pit, on the morning of that day, by the fall of a portion of the roof of the pit upon him. The inquest was adjourned till today (Thursday) in order that the Government Inspector of mines might be communicated with.

On Saturday, a painful feeling was created in Whitehaven by the announcement that Mr John Dixon, bookseller and stationer, of Market Place, Whitehaven, (of the old-established firm of Messrs Callander and Dixon) was missing, and as it transpired that an umbrella and silk hat had been found on the north side of the wet dock on Friday night, it was feared that Mr Dixon had met his death by drowning. In the afternoon Captain Mann, the harbour-master, and a number of men proceeded to drag the dock, and almost

immediately they succeeded in securing a man's body, which was at once identified as that of Mr Dixon. The body was taken to the room adjoining the harbour-master's office, and was there searched by Inspector Blenkinsop, when it was found that deceased's watch had stopped at twenty minutes to eleven o'clock. His money and other property were all found safe in his possession. It is difficult to account for the fatality. He was a man of about 63 years of age, particularly steady, and was highly respected by everybody who knew him. Some years ago he identified himself with the local artillery volunteer corps, and took great interest in the movement. He was quartermaster for a long time, and for many years he was connected with St James's Church, where he held the position of churchwarden. He also took great interest in the Sunday school. A few years ago Mr Dixon lost his wife, and since that time his health has been gradually failing. An inquest was held at the Indian King Hotel, Whitehaven, on Monday afternoon, before Mr W. W. Lumb, deputy-coroner. John Lancaster of Park View, Newtown, tailor, stated that about 9 o'clock on Friday night he was near the wet dock. He saw a figure on the bridge which crosses at the dock gates. It suddenly disappeared, and witness then saw Mr John Huggins and told him he thought some one had gone in there. On looking about he found an umbrella on the north wall side of the bridge. There was no cry and he considered it was a case of deliberate suicide.

Captain Mann, harbour-master at Whitehaven, proved that last witness brought an umbrella to him which he had found. He went down to the pier head, but could see nothing. In the morning he fancied he saw something in the water, and a boatman came and took out two hats from the water, one a silk hat and the other a round silk beaver. A broker from Workington lost a hat the night before, but the beaver was not his. An owner had not been found for the other hat. Afterwards grappling irons were used, and Captain Mann got the body out. He considered that Mr Dixon had dropped his umbrella and in stooping for it he overbalanced himself and fell over the edge of the wall into the dock. There was a bruise on the face, and he thought deceased had struck against a chain which was taut and that he was then stunned. He did not believe deceased had committed suicide.

Inspector Blenkinsop said he saw the body of the deceased taken out of the dock. He searched deceased and found various articles upon him. There was a slight graze on the forehead, which might have been done by falling into the harbour.

Mrs Elizabeth Shannon, Cross Street, stated that deceased lodged with her. When he left her house in the morning he was quite well and cheerful. He came in to dinner and tea, and witness saw him at night when she was out.

The Coroner, in summing up, said he was sure they all deeply felt the sad duty that devolved upon them to inquire into the death of one of the oldest tradesmen in Whitehaven, and he was a gentleman deservedly respected, and every one he was sure would regret his unexpected death. As to what the first witness said about "Deliberate suicide" he thought they might dismiss that from their minds. There was not a tittle of evidence to show that the deceased had committed suicide. The jury returned a verdict of "accidentally drowned."

Some excitement was caused in Gilsland early on Friday morning by the report - which turned out to be quite correct - that one of the visitors at the Shaws Hotel, Mr John Dodd, tobacconist, Lowther Street, Whitehaven, had committed suicide by drowning himself in the river Irthing. Mr Dodd and his wife arrived at the Shaws Hotel on Wednesday night. Nothing particular in his manner was observed by any one at the place. He went to bed at an ordinary hour on Thursday night, but he seems to have got up between 11 and 12 o'clock and partially dressed himself. He returned to bed sometime afterwards, but rose again about five o'clock on Friday morning. He seems then to have been in a very excited state of mind. He threw the chamber ware out of the window, breaking a number of panes of glass, and considerably alarming his wife, who rushed out of the bedroom and screamed. As soon as she left the bedroom, Mr Dodd locked the door. Mr Gelderd, the landlord of the hotel, hearing Mrs Dodd's screams, immediately roused the servants, five of whom ran to Mr Dodd's bedroom door. They asked him to open the door. He answered that he would directly. They waited outside, expecting him to open the door. Suddenly he gave a loud shout, and the servants having the necessary implements and appliances with them at once broke open a panel of the door. After they broke this he leapt from the window, which had been put up, a distance of two storeys. He landed on the grass outside and jumping over the rails, ran along the road leading to the station past Orchard House. The servants of the house followed. When passing Gilsland church, before coming to the Orchard House, Mr Dodd took off his coat and left it on the road side. Being a good pedestrian, he kept a good distance from his pursuers. He turned up the road which leads to the Hill, but before reaching this place, finding his pursuers on his track, and seeing the Irthing on his left, he made a rush down the hill towards the river which, as described by a person on the spot, at the time was flowing from "bank to brae." On reaching the river side he deliberately jumped in, at a place nearly opposite Willow Ford. Some of his pursuers at this time were only about 25 yards from him. They saw him roll down the stream for a short distance and disappear. . .

**ORIGIN OF JADE GREEN DYE**

**The following interesting note appears in last week's issue of "The Whitehaven News." The item was submitted by a correspondent of the newspaper and a reader of the "Falkirk Herald" forwarded a copy. - "I was interested in your notes on Crowther's book re James Morton and the Caledon jade greens. You may like to know that the original patents for this dyestuff were partly in the name of H.A.E. Drescher, a Cumbria. Albert Drescher was the son of a former Whitehaven schoolmaster. His mother now lives at St Bees. Drescher was a brilliant youth. He was educated at St Bees School and at the Queen's College, Oxford, where he took his M.A. He had a short period of service in the Air Force as an observer towards the end of the war, worked at the Harrington coke ovens as a chemist, and then went to Scottish Dyes, Ltd., at Grangemouth. It was here that he began work on the jade green which was to become the foundation of the firm's prosperity. His career was cut short by a motor-cycle accident. He was killed on his way to work on the morning of August 12, 1929. He was 32 years of age.**

**On Friday afternoon Mr Joshua Druery, George Street, who carries on business as a grocer in Scotch Street, Whitehaven, was serving a customer when he suddenly cried out and fell on the floor dying immediately. A doctor expressed the view that death was due to heart disease or stroke and the Coroner considered an inquest unnecessary.**

Deep sympathy is felt for the widow and family of the late Rev George Mackay, whose melancholy death last Friday has been so much commented on. Mr Mackay was held in high esteem by the clergy and the various religious denominations in this town, and he had the entire affection and devotion of his own congregation to whom he had ministered for 23 years. This was shown in

a marked and gratifying manner recently, when he wished to retire altogether from his charge. So great was their regard for their pastor, that there was no sacrifice they were not prepared to make to retain him amongst them, even nominally. On his part the deceased gentleman was most attentive to his flock in all his pastoral relations, and there was scarcely a member of his congregation who did not look on him as a personal friend.

A distressing boat accident occurred near Lerwick, the Shetland Isles, on Tuesday evening, the 4<sup>th</sup> inst. A small pleasure boat was sailing across from the Island of Bressay, containing the owner, the Rev Mr Rogerson, Free Church minister, Lerwick (late of Workington), that gentleman's servant girl, and a young Edinburgh student named Frank Mackay (only son of the late Rev George Mackay, of the Market place Presbyterian Church in this town) who was spending his holidays at Lerwick. The boat capsized when near the Bressay shore, and the occupants were thrown into the water. Fortunately an Isle of Man fishing boat, which was proceeding out to sea, was nearby, and the crew, observing the people in the water, launched their small boat, and succeeded in rescuing Mr Rogerson and the girl, both of whom were very much exhausted. Mackay, however, sank before assistance reached him. The unfortunate lad, who was but eighteen years of age, had only been in Lerwick four days. He was studying medicine in Edinburgh, where his mother and sister have lately been residing.

#### **December 12<sup>th</sup> 1871 Cumberland Pacquet**

On Friday morning, at an early hour, a fatal accident occurred near the Corkickle station of the Furness Railway at Whitehaven. An engine belonging to the London and North-Western Railway Company, in charge of Richard Starr, driver, and Thomas Cummings, fireman, ran over an elderly man named Jas. Edgar, and killed him on the spot. Edgar was formerly captain of the Laurel, a brig trading from Whitehaven. In recent years he has been an engineer's labourer in the employ of the Parkside Mining Company at Frizington. He resided in Strand-street, Whitehaven, and it has been his custom, like that of many other workmen, to proceed to his work by a mineral train on the Whitehaven, Cleator and Egremont Railway, workmen's tickets being issued available for a week. It was in walking to the train, along the line instead of a safe six foot space, that he was run over and killed. His body, which was dreadfully mutilated, was conveyed to the deadhouse at Whitehaven. An inquest was held at the Globe Hotel, before Mr Thomas Howson, deputy-coroner, and a jury comprising Messrs Joseph Alcock, Joseph Wilson, John Pearson, Robert Bell, W. Williamson, C. C. Morton, R. Kerr, John Barnes, R. Atkinson, Jas. Thompson, R. Pickering and John Murray. The jury having viewed the body of the deceased at the deadhouse, returned to the inquest room, where the following evidence was adduced:

Richard Starr, an engine driver in the employ of the London and North Western Railway Company, said: - about a quarter past five o'clock this morning I was going with an engine and tender from the Bransty passenger station, Whitehaven, through the tunnel and Corkickle station, to the Preston-street goods station. We left Bransty at ten minutes past five o'clock. It was a very dark morning, and there had been no moon. About 150 yards from the signal post at Corkickle, after passing the station, on approaching the junction leading to the goods station, I felt that the engine had gone over something and I immediately stopped to see what it was. The engine had not to go more than 10 yards before it stopped, as it was scarcely going faster than at a walking pace, having only just unhooked from another engine that had come through the tunnel with us, and we were approaching the points. The engine had a light, and I whistled nearly the whole way, for the protection of our men, who were about another engine. I had just passed an engine standing with two vans as the accident occurred. There is space of six feet or more between the Whitehaven, Cleator and Egremont railway and the Furness railway. My engine was on the Furness railway. We found the deceased in a heap, quite dead, as though the engine had rolled him into the ballast. The fire-box must

have come in contact with him, there being a space only about seven feet between the firebox and the ballast. I went on at once to Preston-street with the engine, and brought a policeman from the station. Several persons had arrived at the place where the man lay when I left. Deceased had been on his way to go to his work by a mineral train. He went there every morning, and generally walked to the train in a four-foot. On this occasion he might have been walking between the rails upon which my train was travelling. The number of the engine is 1078 and it is the property of the London and North West Railway Company. .

Agnes Edgar, widow of deceased, said he was 61 years of age last birthday. He was brought up to the sea, but had recently been working at Parkside, Frizington. He left home at a quarter-past five that morning in his usual health, took his breakfast with him, and went to Corkickle station to go to the mineral train to his work.

The jury returned a verdict of "Accidental death".

The death of Mr James Egerton, aged 66 years, took place at Meadow View, Whitehaven, on Monday afternoon. Deceased had had a painful illness, with which he struggled patiently for some years. He was an active member of the Robin Tea Committee, during that committee's work in Whitehaven, and was well known to the poor and their children in the town, having arranged (with a small committee) and dispensed at the Cocoa Rooms, free dinners three days per week for both adults and children, for a good many winters. Since Mr Egerton has not been able to go about in his usual way, however, the dinners have been discontinued. For 25 years he was the chief mover in providing a treat for the inmates of our workhouse, and many of them will not soon forget him for the good things he was the means of securing and handing out to young and old on his annual visit there. For many years Mr Egerton took very keen interest in political matters on the Liberal side and while health continued, he was an active worker in all Parliamentary and municipal elections. He was also associated with the Artillery Volunteers, in which he reached the rank of sergeant. Mr Egerton was also an active Oddfellow, and at various times held several official positions in that Order. He leaves a widow and grown-up son.

March 3<sup>rd</sup> 1892 Cumberland Pacquet

We regret to record the death, at the age of 73 years, of Mr John Ellwood, which took place at the residence of his son, Croft Pit (where he had lately moved from his old home on the Low-road), on Thursday morning. Mr Ellwood came of a family that had been employed in the service of the Lowthers at the Whitehaven Collieries for generations. His father and grandfather were both overmen at the pits, and there are records to show that the Ellwoods have held office almost without a break since 1714. The late Mr Ellwood was born at Harras Moor in 1819. Although he must only have been young at the time, he had a good recollection of the disaster on the 13<sup>th</sup> October 1823, when 32 men and boys (including his cousin, John Ellwood) were killed by an explosion of fire-damp in William Pit. He could remember distinctly the dead horses being brought up to Harras Moor and being buried behind his father's house. When about ten years old he began work underground, his first job being to drive "fire coals" at Fox Pit - an old pit between Preston Hows and Far Preston Hows. He had been about three years in the pits when, on the 11<sup>th</sup> November 1831, an explosion occurred in the adjoining workings of Croft Pit, by which 23 lives were lost. At the time Mr Ellwood entered the pits, their state and the condition of the colliers were vastly different from what prevails at present. There were neither cages nor guides in the shafts, and the usual mode of descending the pits for men and boys was for them to "swarm" on the winding rope. Women were then also employed below ground, about twenty being employed at Croft, Saltom and Wilson Pits. Mr Ellwood was fond of narrating a story which his father used to relate of an old woman named Betty Thompson, who "hooked on" at Kells Pit bottom about 73 years ago. Whilst Betty was thus engaged, the hook at the end of the winding rope became entangled with her clothes, and she was drawn along with the basketful of coals to bank. Fortunately she reached the pit top in safety, and when liberated from her perilous position she merrily exclaimed; "If ah hedn't hed a good heam mead petticoat band on ah would hev been killed." And without any more ado she

made her way down to the Bearmouth on the Low-road, and travelled in to the scene of her labours - Kells Pit bottom - and finished her days work as usual. Mr Ellwood had a good recollection of the time when Whitehaven was made a Parliamentary borough in 1832, and could relate many tales of the rows which took place at the contest between Mr Littledale and Mr Attwood, in front of the hustings which were then, and down to a much later date, erected near the old Round House on the site of the present Green Market. He could also describe very graphically the colliers' attack on the Black Lion Hotel, the Blue headquarters, when they each "chalked their working out," and began to bore holes with the intention of blowing the front wall out.

After a short experience at the pits, Mr Ellwood went to Wilkinson's Pottery, where he served a regular apprenticeship, but he again entered the pits and subsequently in the county of Durham he worked at coal hewing at Wingate Grange and Castle Eden Collieries. He was there during the great strike of 1844, when he was the secretary of the Castle Eden branch of the Durham Miners' Union. Mr Ellwood soon afterwards returned to Whitehaven and he rose to be overman at Croft Pit in 1859. In 1860 he went to reside in the house in which he died. In 1867 he was appointed master wasteman of the Howgill division of the Whitehaven Collieries, and as such had charge of the extensive workings on the south side of Whitehaven, of which, it may be said, that he had a more intimate knowledge than anyone living. He could go easily and safely throughout the pit without a lamp. In every position he occupied in the Whitehaven Colliery he enjoyed the confidence and respect of masters and men alike. Deceased continued in the office last mentioned until shortly after the leasing of the collieries to Sir James Bain and Co. in 1888. Since then he has been in failing health, suffering from bronchitis and has been very seldom out of doors.

In addition to his work at the pits, Mr Ellwood was chiefly instrumental in founding the Whitehaven Colliery Reading-room on the 10<sup>th</sup> March 1863, and he acted as secretary and librarian until the end of 1888. In recognition of his services he was on two different occasions presented by the members with handsome testimonials. He also co-operated with others in the formation of the Whitehaven Scientific Association, in which he took the greatest interest. His favourite science was astronomy and at his house on the Low-road, he had a large and powerful telescope of his own manufacture, with which he loved to study Starland. Mr Ellwood was also noted for his minute handwriting. Some of his feats in this direction sound incredible, and a favourite Newcastle paper which he frequently favoured with proofs of his skill once stated that he was undoubtedly the cleverest writer of the kind in the country. Mr Ellwood has written the Lord's Prayer seven and even eight times on a scrap of paper that could be covered with a threepenny piece. More wonderful still, he did it all with the naked eye, and with a pen of his own manufacture, and up till only a few months before his death his hand had not forgot its cunning. Mr Ellwood was an old Oddfellow and the first miner made in Cumberland. He had been a member of the Whitehaven Lodge for 53 years, and was a trustee and Past Grand Master of the district. Mr Ellwood was also an old member of the Primitive Methodist body, and continued so to the last. The funeral, which was largely attended, took place at Whitehaven Cemetery on Sunday last. The Rev T Markwell and the Rev J Sharpe (an old friend of Mr Ellwood's) officiated, and Mr J Jenkinson, also an old fellow-workman of deceased's, read the services of the order at the graveside.

On Thursday the body of Mr Frank Farquharson, wholesale grocer at Whitehaven, was found in a field behind the Rest and Be Thankful Inn at Quality Corner, near Whitehaven. It appears that Mr Farquharson left home on Tuesday night to join a private party at the inn, and there remained all night, leaving at ten o'clock on Wednesday morning, after which he was not seen alive again. The body was found by Mr S Clark, landlord of the inn. It was lying face downwards and deceased appeared to have been dead for several hours. His pipe was lying on the ground beside him. Apparently he had been sitting on a stone by the side of the hedge, and had fallen on his face and been suffocated. He was about (53) years of age and leaves a widow and grown-up family. He had been in business in Whitehaven on his own account for a good many years, and was well known throughout West Cumberland. For several years he was people's warden at St James's Church, Whitehaven, and was generally held in high esteem.

On Monday morning, about eight o'clock, a locomotive exploded on the Whitehaven, Cleator and Egremont Railway at Moor Row Station, and the engine driver was killed on the spot. The driver, brakesman and stoker had all been standing on the engine, but the brakesman went away to change his cap and the stoker to get his breakfast, thus leaving only Fearon, who was standing on it when the boiler exploded. Pieces of it were blown to a distance of 200 yards, and Fearon, who was a married man with no children, was killed on the spot. The inquest was held at the Station Hotel on Tuesday, before R Bell Esq. Mr Dodgson, the general manager of the Whitehaven, Cleator and Egremont Railway, stated that the locomotive was built only some eight years ago, by one of the most eminent firms in the world, Messrs Stephenson and Co., of Newcastle, and had been running ever since. A short time ago the engine was taken into the repairing shed and there, after undergoing a thorough repair, was tested up to 130lbs to the square inch, or 20lbs more than what the pressure was at the time of the explosion. That they thought was a sufficient test for the boiler. At 5.45 on Monday morning they started for Whitehaven with the first train, the deceased man driving, did the ordinary work there, and afterwards went into what is called the coal siding, where they took in a sufficient quantity of coal and water. The engine then returned to Moor Row. He (Mr Dodgson) believed that he would be able to prove that when they returned to Moor Row the tank of the engine was full of water and that the boiler only indicated on the gauge a pressure of 110lb to the square inch, or 20lbs less than what it had been tested only a month previously.

The deceased man had been in the company's service for eight years, and the poor fellow had been laid up for six weeks previous to that morning, when he so unhappily came by his death. He was a steady, careful man, and the people who saw him would tell the court that he was in every way in a proper condition to attend to his work. After he started from the station with his engine, he had to draw up some forty or fifty yards from it, as the signal was against him. The fireman and guard got off the engine for some purpose or another, and so averted what would have inevitably been their fate.

John Binks Cooper, locomotive superintendent, said he examined the plates after the explosion and he believed that a flaw in one of the plates had been the cause of the accident. There had been an original fracture, and the contraction and expansion had gone on increasing it. There was no visible fracture, but it must have been a weak part in the plate. He should say that it had not been properly manipulated. A verdict of "Death caused by the explosion of a locomotive" was returned.

He was of humble parentage but by perseverance and thorough industry he raised himself to eminence as an extensive iron ore proprietor. Mr Fearon was a man much respected by a large circle of friends; he possessed sound judgment and business capacity, and was frequently consulted on matters connected with agriculture, especially by small farmers. The poor of Maryport have lost in him a good and generous friend. On his arrival at Maryport with any friend he invariably begged to be allowed a short time in order that he should have an opportunity of distributing amongst the poorer working classes such assistance as he felt proper and prudent to bestow. Mr Fearon has been suffering for some time from a complicated attack of jaundice &c. to which he succumbed on Friday, having borne his illness with great patience and Christian fortitude. He slept away without a struggle.

One of the best known veterinary surgeons in the North of England has just passed away in the person of Mr John Fisher MRCVS of Whitehaven. Mr Fisher held a high position in his profession, he being considered one of the first authorities on horses in the North. He was 75 years of age.

**February 6<sup>th</sup> 1897 Maryport Advertiser**

We regret to announce the death of Mr John Fisher MRCVS which took place at his residence, Church Street, Whitehaven, on Thursday afternoon under somewhat melancholy circumstances. Mr Fisher up to two years ago had enjoyed the best of health. He was then, however, attacked with influenza and had never fully recovered from its effects, though he was able to pursue his professional duties with seemingly all his old energy and ability. He was apparently in his usual health on Thursday morning and till early in the afternoon, when he suddenly became ill and passed away peacefully at the good old age of seventy-five. Although he took no active part in public life he was one of the best known men in Whitehaven. The deceased had enjoyed an extensive practice all over the North of England for considerably over thirty years. He was medallist of his year, and was regarded as one of the best judges of a horse in the North. The deceased leaves a widow and one son, Dr Fisher, Medical Officer of Health, for whom much regret is felt. The interment took place at the Whitehaven Cemetery on Monday forenoon. On the coffin, which was supplied by Mr Dixon, cabinet-maker, Lowther-street, was a beautiful wreath. There were nine conveyances containing relatives and friends, and a large number of tradesmen and others followed the funeral cortege on foot.

The death took place on Sunday morning of Mr John Fisher, son of Mr Robert Fisher, manager of the Whitehaven Cab Company, at the age of 44. The deceased had been ill only a few days and died from pneumonia. He had been in the employ of the Cab Company for 28 years, and was widely known. In the early part of his life he gained considerable success as a jockey. He won his first race at Harras Moor, when seventeen years of age, on Dennis, a sixteen year old horse belonging to Mr W C Steward, of Whitehaven. Subsequently he won the same race for the late Mr Tom Jackson on Goose, and also for Mr W B Turner on Jimmy. He also won other races at Whitehaven, Carlisle, Penrith and Cartmell, and everything he rode was always heavily backed as he was always regarded as a straight rider. He was a capital horseman and as a driver his skill was known far and wide while everywhere his genial manner and obliging conduct made him many friends. He was very popular both with the gentry and the public of the district, from many of whom his respected father has received letters of sympathy, including Mr Jefferson (Springfield), Mr E Atter &c.

**February 4<sup>th</sup> 1911 West Cumberland Times**

The death took place at his residence, Herbert Hill, Whitehaven, on Wednesday, of Mr Robert Fisher, for many years general manager of the Whitehaven Cab Company. For a fortnight, Mr Fisher had been confined

to the house with bronchitis, but Wednesday was the first day that he had kept to his bed and early in the afternoon he passed peacefully away.

Mr Fisher was one of the best known and most popular men in the district. Born at Allonby on the 3<sup>rd</sup> of August 1823, Mr Fisher had attained the ripe old age of 87 years. In the work which he entered upon very early in life, he followed in the footsteps of his father, who drove the coach between Whitehaven and Carlisle in the old days. Three years in his early youth he spent in the neighbourhood of Liverpool and then came to Whitehaven – over 70 years ago – and entered the service of the late Mr Joseph Fearon, who at the time occupied both the Golden Lion and the Globe Hotels.

After being in the service of Mr Fearon for some time, Mr Fisher became first postilion, a post for which his muscular, wiry, horseman-like frame well suited him. Between that time and 1863, when the posting business of Mr Fearon was acquired by the newly-formed Whitehaven Cab and General Posting Company, Limited, Mr Fisher, with the exception of twelve months spent at the Golden Lion whilst the Globe was partially re-building, remained at the latter place and had the control and direction of Mr Fearon's posting yard and stables. During that period he saw the gradual rise of the local railway system. Mr Fisher drove a coach or omnibus between Whitehaven and Maryport three times a week. At Maryport it was placed on the rail, came off again at Aspatria, and was driven to Wigton, and back again in the same way. Mr Fisher's father was then driving the opposition coach, which continued to be driven right through from Whitehaven to Carlisle and back each day. When the Coach Road was opened, Mr Fisher drove the first carriage along it, containing William, Earl of Lonsdale, and George Hudson, "The Railway King." Some forty-eight years ago Mr Fisher became general manager of the Cab Company, and during his long association with that firm he filled a leading place in local affairs of equine sporting interest. He took an active interest in the steeplechase meetings at Harras Moor in the seventies and early eighties, he as trainer and his son Jack as jockey, and many successful horses were turned out by the one and ridden by the other. In 1899 a movement was set afoot, with Mr E Atter as secretary, to present Mr Fisher with a testimonial by public subscription. The movement was influentially taken up and readily responded to; and at the Black Lion Hotel Mr Fisher was presented with his portrait, painted by Mr J D Kennedy, together with a well filled purse of gold and an album containing the list of all the subscribers, the presentation being made by the Earl of Lonsdale. For some times afterwards Mr Fisher continued to manage the Cab Stables, only finally retiring in 1907. He leaves a widow and family of four daughters and a son, who is now in Australia.

Explosion at a Whitehaven Colliery  
Five killed, seven injured

An explosion occurred at William Pit, Whitehaven, on Tuesday afternoon, that resulted in the loss of five lives and injury to seven other workmen.

The names of the killed are; W Vincent Fitzsimons, aged 22, single; Joseph Kennedy, aged 22, single; Alf Burns, married; W Hanlon, married; Jas. Row (or Denwood) George-street. The injured were Tom Moore, married; John Hanlon, John Kirkpatrick, Evan Evans, single; Wm Cown, single; John Nelson, Parton; Wm Cannon, married.

The explosion happened in what is known as No 6 drift, which is about 400 yards from the main haulage road, and nearly three miles from the shaft. Fire followed the explosion and the after-damp made the work of the rescue party exceedingly difficult and dangerous. The bodies of Fitzsimons and Kennedy were found about 200 yards in the drift, and they had probably been blown a considerable distance; but the other three bodies could not be reached owing to the fire and the deadly fumes. Ventilation was restored and at half-past eight on Wednesday evening the three remaining bodies were recovered. The inquest was opened by Mr Atter on Wednesday.

November 30<sup>th</sup> 1907 West Cumberland Times

Yesterday (Friday) afternoon the remains of Wm Vincent Fitzsimons were interred in Whitehaven Cemetery, and the funeral was very largely attended, many colliers and other workmen from the pit being present as well as officials. . .On Thursday night the body of the unfortunate young man, who was a member of St Begh's Church, was taken to the church where it was met by the priests and the choir. The first part of the funeral service was then chanted and the body placed in the Sanctuary. Father Murphy was the celebrant. At half past eight yesterday morning Requiem Mass was sung. The choir again attended for the concluding portion of the funeral service in the afternoon, which was conducted by Father Murphy, who gave the Absolutions, the choir singing the Libera. Father Murphy afterwards addressed the large congregation and feelingly referred to the sad calamity, through which the relatives of the deceased young man and others had suffered heavy bereavement. At the close of the service the choir accompanied the cortege to the cemetery, walking in processional order. The procession was headed by cross bearer and acolytes. At the graveside the choir sang the concluding portion of the burial service and the Rev Father Murphy again officiated. Hundreds of people gathered at the cemetery and the scene was a most impressive one.

Fleming was employed by Mr Rowland Gammon, master plasterer, and at 4.45 on the 9<sup>th</sup> inst, along with his son Samuel Fleming, he was engaged cementing the gable end of the new houses being built by Messrs A and T H Anderson, at Wellington Row, Whitehaven. Deceased by some means fell from the scaffold to the lane below, a distance of a little over fourteen feet. Thomas Henry Anderson, who was near to the place at the time, heard deceased fall, and immediately went to his assistance. He found him lying on the ground unconscious, and bleeding from the nose and mouth. He had a wound on the forehead. Dr Muriel was sent for and arrived in about five minutes, and deceased was taken in a cab to the Infirmary, where it was found he was suffering from a fractured skull. Deceased died from his injuries at 9.30 on the 12<sup>th</sup> inst.

He was curate of Burwell, Cambridgeshire, in 1865-66; curate of Guisborough, Yorkshire, from 1866 to 1870; curate of Brandesburton, Yorkshire; from 1870 to 1873; curate of Waberthwaite in 1873 - 1874; and in the latter year he was appointed rector of Waberthwaite. The net value of the living, which is in the patronage of Lord Muncaster, is £92 per annum.

The funeral of Mrs Fletcher, wife of Major Fletcher of Whitehaven and Conheath House, Dumfriesshire, were conveyed to their last resting place in the Cemetery, near this town, on Tuesday at noon. Notwithstanding the unpropitious state of the weather, crowds of people had congregated in Lowther-street for a considerable time previous to the hour appointed for the funeral to take place, and by twelve o'clock from Church-street to Scotch-street was thickly lined with spectators, their presence evincing in a marked manner how universal was the feeling of regret at the loss which the town had sustained and how deep was the public sympathy with the bereaved.

The funeral cortege consisted of the hearse and nineteen carriages, which were formed in the following order: No 1 carriage, preceding the hearse, containing the Rev F W Wicks, incumbent, and the Rev Michael Kennedy, curate of St Nicholas' and Drs Clarke and Thompson; No 2 carriage, immediately following the hearse, containing the chief mourners, Major Fletcher and his eldest son, Master John Fletcher, Mr William Thompson of Elton Cottage near Dumfries (father of the deceased) and Mr James Thompson (her brother); No 3 carriage, containing Mr Yeates of Kingston House, and Mr Edgar of Glasgow (brothers-in-law of the deceased) - - -the deceased lady was thirty-seven years of age, and had left a family of nine children. By her death the poor individually have indeed lost a generous friend, and Whitehaven one of the most honoured patronesses of its many charitable institutions. The arrangements for the funeral were under the personal superintendence of Mr Jonathan Shepherd, cabinet-maker, Lowther-street, and were most complete.

The Late Major Joseph Fletcher

Our obituary today contains the announcement of the death of Major Joseph Fletcher of Kelton House, Dumfries, who has been intimately associated with the prosperity of mining in the west of Cumberland. The Whitehaven News, in noticing his death, says:

For a long period the deceased gentleman took an active interest in the local concerns of this neighbourhood, and was always one of the first to encourage any new enterprise that was likely to tend to the prosperity of the town. His worth was known far and near, and many will feel his loss most deeply. He was a partner of the Parkside Mining Company, which he assisted in forming about twenty years ago, and which has proved so lucrative to all concerned. Previously he acted as engineer under the Trustees of the town and harbour. For many years, and up to the time of his death, he was a Justice of the Peace for this county. The late Mr Fletcher was a Freemason, and as such was held in high esteem by the brethren. In 1850

he was elected Senior Grand Warden for the Provinces of Cumberland and Westmorland. At Edinburgh he took various high degrees in Freemasonry, including that of "Rose Croix." Mr Fletcher was also a steward of the Freemasons' Girls' Charity School. At the commencement of the Volunteer movement Mr Fletcher was mainly instrumental in forming the second Rifle corps organised in the county, and he became its first captain. When he was promoted to the rank of Major of the Cumberland Volunteers, he only accepted that position on condition that he retained his position as captain of the Second Cumberland Rifles; and it was only recently that he resigned that office. For the last five years he had resided at Kelton House, a beautiful mansion, situated about three miles from Dumfries, going towards Glencaple. The remains of the deceased gentleman were interred on Wednesday in the family vault in Whitehaven Cemetery. The procession from the railway station consisted, in addition to the hearse, of twenty-four carriages containing the relatives and friends of the deceased gentleman, and numerous followers on foot. Along Tangier Street, King Street, Lowther Street, Scotch Street and Irish Street the procession (one of the largest ever seen in Whitehaven) wended its way to the place of burial, and although rain descended very heavily, the streets along the route were thickly lined with spectators.

On Thursday night a youth named George William Forbes, aged 16, of Carmichael Street, Whitehaven, the son of Alexander Forbes, formerly a policeman and now a watchman in the employ of the Whitehaven Colliery Company, was killed at the Wellington Pit, Whitehaven. The deceased was employed by the company as a ticket boy, his duty being to nail tickets on the coal wagons. He went to his work at Wellington Pit at half-past four o'clock on Thursday afternoon, and about eleven o'clock the same night he was riding in the pit yard on the front part of a wagon drawn by a horse, and when endeavouring to get off the wagon the lad's foot slipped, and his head fell on the rails and one of the wagon wheels passed over it. The lad was at once removed to the infirmary but died half an hour after his admission. An inquest on the body was opened at the Infirmary yesterday (Friday) afternoon by Mr G Falcon, coroner, and a jury, over whom Mr J Waugh was foreman. Mr J Ramsay, the manager for the Colliery Company, was present at the inquiry. The father of the deceased gave evidence of identification and the inquest was adjourned until Wednesday next for the attendance of the Government inspector.

DEATH OF DR FOX OF WHITEHAVEN

This well-known and respected gentleman died at his residence in Cross Street on Thursday last. Formerly he held the chief medical practice in Whitehaven, and was then in partnership with Dr Robinson. He retired from business about 45 years ago, and went to reside at Rottington Hall. Dr Fox attained the age of 92 years on the 12<sup>th</sup> of September last. He was at one time one of the vice-presidents of the Whitehaven and West Cumberland Infirmary. He was also one of the founders of the Whitehaven Joint Stock Bank of 1829, and served as a director frequently up till two years ago. In politics he was a Conservative.

A case of suicide of an extraordinary character occurred at George's Pit, at a cottage known by the name of the now unfortunately deceased occupier, as Fox's cottage, on the roadside between Albert-terrace and Quality Corner. John Fox was a married man, aged 59 years, and had a family residing with him. He had an interest in the schooner Diadem, which is the subject of a claim for salvage by the Maryport Towage Company, and for which an action in the County Court is pending. This case is supposed to have fretted his mind, and for some time past it has been observed that he was in low spirits, and rather childish. On Tuesday between eleven and twelve o'clock in the morning, his wife found him standing against the door of a room in the house, with a rope tied round his neck, by which he had desperately strangled himself, without attaching the rope to anything so as to hang himself. The rope had been made into a running knot, and Fox had with his two hands pulled it tight and choked himself. Mrs Fox called in a neighbour, Mr Thomas Armstrong, and Fox's two sons, Thomas and Joseph, were also soon present. Dr Kelly, assistant to Dr Robert Lumb, on being called in, cut the rope from the poor man's neck. Fox was quite dead. The same evening Mr W W Lumb deputy coroner for West Cumberland, held an inquest on view of the body at Sunny Hill public house, Mr Brown Harrison being foreman of the jury; and the facts above narrated, having been adduced in evidence, a verdict that "the deceased strangled himself with a rope whilst labouring under temporary insanity" was returned.

On Monday afternoon Mr W W Lumb, deputy-corer, held an inquest at the Whitehaven and West Cumberland Infirmary, touching the death of Robert Fox, aged seven years, who was killed on Saturday evening. It appeared from the evidence that the deceased resided at Parton, and had been sent to Whitehaven on an errand. Shortly after six o'clock he was seen on the wagon way near Lord Lonsdale's William Pit, and three boys, who were playing on the coal bank near, stated that they saw Fox pull out a stone from underneath the wheel of a mortar wagon. Previous to this he had placed another stone on the line lower down to let the wagon run down to it. The wagon, when free from the first stone, ran down the line and over the boy's legs. He was carried to the infirmary where it was found necessary to amputate one of his legs, and he died the same night shortly after 10 o'clock. The jury returned a verdict of accidental death.

**DEATH OF THE DEPUTY HARBOUR MASTER**

We regret to announce the death, which took place on Saturday, of Mr Wm Gair, the deputy harbour master at Whitehaven. The deceased, who was in his 69<sup>th</sup> year, went to sea in 1839 and served his apprenticeship in the brig Robert (Captain Shaw) which was employed in the home trade. He also made several voyages to Quebec with Captain Maclean in the brig Samuel, whilst during the last four years of his life at sea, he acted as mate of the brig Elizabeth (Captain John Leach). In 1859 he joined the harbour boat at Whitehaven, and on the death of Mr Joseph Golightly, the deputy harbour master, a few years afterwards, he succeeded to that position, which he held up to the time of his death. About ten days previous to his demise, Mr Gair had an attack of paralysis, and subsequently suffered from bronchitis. He leaves a widow and seven children, all of whom are married with the exception of the youngest son who is in Australia. The deceased was widely known and highly respected in shipping circles, and a general favourite amongst all with whom he came in contact. The interment took place yesterday (Wednesday afternoon) at the Cemetery, the obsequies being conducted by the Rev J Anderson, vicar of Holy Trinity. The funeral was largely attended by the sea-faring class, including many masters of vessels and fishermen. A number of the Harbour Commissioners and officials also attended, whilst flags were flying half-mast from all the vessels in the harbour.

The subject of our notice was the son of Mr George Gibson, a native of Northumberland, who, at the beginning of the century occupied a shop in King-street. In November 1809 the youth was apprenticed for five years (as we learn from his indenture, now lying on our table) to Mr W P Litt of Liverpool, commission agent. At the expiry of his apprenticeship he went to London, where he found employment as a clerk. This occupation, however, did not quite suit either his views or liking; and returning to the north, he obtained at Carlisle, on course of a few months, sufficient insight into the tea and coffee trade to enable him to set up in that line, in Roper-street, in his native town. Settled in life, he married, in 1823, Miss Benn, daughter of the late Captain Wm. Benn, who, with a son and daughter, survive him. He continued in business in Roper-street until his appointment as Postmaster of Whitehaven, in November 1837, when, under the Melbourne Administration, the Earl of Lichfield was Postmaster-general. That office he held to his death, performing its duties to the entire satisfaction of his townsfolk, and the inhabitants of the adjacent country.

It was not, however, in his career as a tradesman or as an official that Mr Gibson stood out in the level walks of provincial life as no common man, and for which we reckon him, after death, worthy of special notice. And yet he did stand out, more or less, in distinct and raised relief, from all of us. No person could be ten

minutes in his company without becoming conscious that there was before him a man of peculiar idiosyncrasy, and strongly developed individuality of character. Endued with great versatility and impulsive force of intellect, and quick, marvellously quick, of apprehension, he reasoned out results with an instantaneousness amounting almost to intuition. Imagination, or the originative power of thought, he possessed in a large degree; and, what is not always its accompaniment, a lively, mirthful and sometimes audacious fancy. There was nothing of the cynic or ascetic in his composition; on the contrary, a more genial and sympathetic nature never breathed. A thorough heartiness was the element that fused together and vivified his mental parts; and intercourse with him had that rare freshness of charm that springs from contact with the artless simplicities and confidences of childhood, which, even in man's estate, and to the close of his days, he never lost. And when we add that his various powers of thought, feeling, fancy and good-natured jest or banter, had a vigorous organ of expression at their command - that to whatever was uppermost at the moment, and for any length of time, he could give utterance in the most felicitous turns of speech, without hesitation, always with excellent effect, and when strongly moved, with a passionate oratory rising to true eloquence, we have set forth another of the characteries of our departed friend that rendered him so noteworthy in private and (when he ventured into it) public life.

He was a man of the most Catholic sympathies. In religion a member of the Church of England, in politics a staunch Liberal, yet politics or religion never with him operated as a bar to friendship. Protestants and Papists, Establishmentarians and Dissenters, Trinitarians and Unitarians, were among his friends. In every one he could find something to love, to cherish, to draw out tenderly, or admire. How many natives of Whitehaven, and others, now settled or settling in life, are indebted to him for the lift that helped them out of obscurity, or across their first and great struggle. The good that he did in this way can never be told. No young man of talent and merit but found in him a real friend. He would put forth his whole energies to aid one for whom he had conceived a liking. He would not wait for opportunities but would seek them, and even create them. Nor was his helpful mediation monopolised by the young. We happen to know that one of the last and most cherished schemes of his life, prosecuted till he took to what proved his deathbed, was to enlist interest sufficient to procure the necessary number of votes to place an aged native of Whitehaven, resident in London, on the pension roll of that noble County charity, the Cumberland Benevolent Fund. May we venture to hope that the object of our friend's sympathy will lose nothing by his death? His heart was easily moved, and open as day to melting charity. The poorest and most abject never failed to find in him a ready listener, and the utterer of a kind and encouraging word. A little child crying in the street, whom most men would pass by and never notice, would arrest him with his kindly "Holloa! What's the matter?" and its little heart would be pacified ere he left. Not a broken down, worthless fellow but could impose upon him with a plausible tongue, and make him open his purse, when no one else would fling him a copper, and not a needy, speculative poet between John O'Groats and the Land's End but could persuade him to take his book of verses and send a money order in return; and if there was aught passable in the volume he was sure also to receive praise from his patron what every poet prizes above money - praise!

Mr Gibson was well read in polite literature; to the extent of his means, he was a liberal patron of the fine arts; and he delighted in whatever was odd, rare and antique. If a queer old, out of the way book was wanted, he had it, or would quickly fall in with somebody who had. He was always abreast with the intelligence of the day. A man with such talents, tastes, sympathies and promptitude in seizing every opportunity to do somebody of other a kind turn, could not be have an extensive acquaintance. Such was the fact. It is no exaggeration to say that he knew, and was on speaking terms with every man and woman in Whitehaven. His correspondents were spread over the wide world. Merchants in New York - Bishops in Australia - emigrants in New Zealand - the sister of Robert Burns - the schoolmaster of remote Icolmkill - people everywhere whom he had never seen, nor ever expected to see in this world - were amongst them. There was always about his desk a letter in progress to someone; and the pains he took in its composition, in order to gratify its recipients, were immense. Out of purely literary circles, few could pen a better or more entertaining letter.

March 2<sup>nd</sup> 1860 Carlisle Journal (From the Whitehaven Herald) - continued

With Mr Gibson died, we fear, much curious knowledge of the old worthies of Whitehaven, and of its histories and antiquities. He was long and actively associated with most of the local charitable and

educational institutions - amongst others, the Bible Society, the Ginns General Sunday School, and the Ladies' Benevolent Society. He was one of the Trustees of Piper's Marine School, and for a number of years managed the soup kitchen connected with that Trust. The Horticultural Society remembers him as one of its founders, and the Mechanics' Institution as one of its earliest friends. And the following inscription, copied from the lid of a silver snuff-box, tells its own tale: - "From the Select Vestry of Whitehaven to Mr John Gibson, in testimony of their approbation of his zealous and disinterested services as secretary for two years, ending 25<sup>th</sup> March 1823."

We have stated that in politics our friend was a Liberal, and recur to the fact to give him credit for a service he rendered in that character to the town of which few at the present day are aware. It occurred about a quarter of a century ago, in connection with an election of Trustees for the Town and Harbour. At that time, the Castle interest prevailed at the board, and jealously excluded all professional reporters. The election being uncontested, no effort was deemed necessary by the party in power to secure their re-election; and in that circumstance, Mr Gibson saw an opportunity, by a stratagem, to throw open the proceedings to the press, and thereby render the Trustees more strictly amenable to public opinion. On the day of the election, therefore, he went quietly about among a few friends of the right colour, and persuaded them to repair to the voting booth, one by one at long intervals, and drop into the ballot box papers containing the single man of Mr Abram, the then Editor of the Herald. The scheme succeeded - Mr Abram (who knew nothing of the matter) was elected, the lowest on the list by the bare majority of 1 - to the utter dismay of the Yellows and not less to the surprise of himself. On taking his seat at the board, the first thing he did was to pull out notebook and pencils. The magnates at the head of the table remonstrated, but in vain; Mr Abram did his duty both as a Trustee and reporter. The consequence was, as foreseen, that, after some time, the Yellows concluded that, as they could not turn out the representative of the Herald, they might as well let in him of the Pacquet also; and accordingly passed a resolution conceding the admission of reporters generally.

Mr Gibson died at his residence, Lingydale near this town, on Sunday morning last, in the 67<sup>th</sup> year of his age; and all that remains of him was interred in the Cemetery on Wednesday. A large number of his friends attended his obsequies.

#### May 30<sup>th</sup> 1885 Carlisle Express and Examiner

We regret to announce the sudden death of Mr William B Gibson, postmaster of Whitehaven, who died suddenly at Harrington on Tuesday. In the discharge of his official duties he had gone to Harrington by the forenoon train to survey the post office at that place. This work he had got completed shortly after twelve o'clock and had set out for the station under the impression that the train left at 12.38, whereas it was actually timed to leave ten minutes earlier, and upon seeing or hearing the train he appears to have hurried to the station, and before reaching it he was seized with illness. Two passengers on emerging from the station after the train had come in found him leaning against the wall outside. They went to his assistance and procured stimulants, but he was unable to take anything and he died in their arms as they carried him to the neighbouring hotel. Dr Ablett of Whitehaven had been attending him since March last for heart disease, and under the doctor's advice he had been preparing to take a longer holiday than he had taken for many years in the hope of recruiting his health. Unfortunately this step had been postponed, and his sudden effort to catch the train had brought on a very serious and, as it proved, a fatal symptom of the disease. An inquest was held at Harrington on Wednesday before Mr John Webster, coroner for the district, and the circumstances having been detailed in evidence the jury returned a verdict of "Death from heart disease." The deceased had been postmaster at Whitehaven for 25 years, having succeeded to the office in 1860 on the death of his father, Mr John Gibson, who had held the appointment for many years before him. He had been in the service of the Post Office for many years before that, and had at one time held a situation in the General Post Office in London. He was a most diligent public servant, and his health may have suffered from his unceasing devotion to duty. He was a leading Freemason and has filled various important offices in connection with that body, in the practice of whose rites and mysteries he was an enthusiastic devotee. He was a man of a very genial nature, and kindly disposition, and the news of his sudden death will be received with regret by his many friends. Mr Gibson was in the 58<sup>th</sup> year of his age. . . The Whitehaven News says Mr

Gibson took an active interest in getting up the Whitehaven Cab Company, and has been its managing director ever since the formation of the Company. He took an interest, too, in the first Shipbuilding Company, and helped to float the new existing company. And he has been connected more or less nearly with every benevolent or philanthropic institution in the town, at one time or another. He was one of the managers of Piper's School, in which he took a warm interest; and he used to take a particular pleasure in helping forward and watching the fortunes of many of the young lads who received their education at that school.

At Keekle Grove near Whitehaven, 27<sup>th</sup> ult, aged 36, deeply regretted, Mr Philip Gibson, engineer to the Whitehaven, Cleator and Egremont Railway and son of the late Mr Philip Gibson, nail and chain manufacturer, Bedlington.

In memory of Robert GIBSON of Whitehaven who died on the 2<sup>nd</sup> of December 1878 aged 88 years. Elizabeth his wife who died on the 2<sup>nd</sup> of December 1844 aged 62 years. And of Margaret GIBSON their daughter who died on the 29<sup>th</sup> of July 1902 aged 85 years. Robert Henry GIBSON only son of Robert and Elizabeth GIBSON who died 14<sup>th</sup> May 1882 aged 63 years. Isabella Colton wife of Robert Henry GIBSON who died on the 12<sup>th</sup> of March 1855 aged 31 years. And of Robert their son who died on the 25<sup>th</sup> of June 1907 aged 57 years. Interred at Brighton.

December 6<sup>th</sup> 1878 Carlisle Journal

The death is announced of Mr Robert Gibson, former proprietor of the Cumberland Pacquet who died at Whitehaven on Monday in his 89<sup>th</sup> year. The Whitehaven News says: - Mr Gibson was a native of Sandford, a village on the banks of the Eden about four miles south of Appleby. He was bound apprentice to the art of letterpress printing and completed the term of his apprenticeship in the office of Mr Ware, the founder of the Cumberland Pacquet. To the office of that paper Mr Gibson came about the year 1810, and in Mr Ware's service he was in succession apprentice, journeyman, foreman and general manager. The last post he occupied at the time of Mr Ware's death on the 15<sup>th</sup> of April 1820. In June of that year Mr Gibson's name appeared in the imprint of the Pacquet as that of the publisher of the paper and in 1831 the Pacquet became his property and was considerably enlarged in the first weeks of his proprietorship. His connection with the Pacquet continued until the year 1858 when he retired from business, and disposed of the newspaper with whose interests his name had been so long identified.

The West Cumberland Guardian says Mr Gibson was a Conservative of the most pronounced type, and was the uncompromising advocate and defender of their local and imperial policy. He was a hard hitter. He used to tell a story himself, with great glee, of a wordy battle which he once had with the editor of a Scotch newspaper. In the fight he belaboured the resident of the "Land o' Cakes" so soundly and heartily that that individual was almost driven crazy and visited Whitehaven for the purpose of chastising Mr Gibson. He entered the Pacquet office, and, addressing a gentleman behind the counter, said, "Can I see Mr Robert Gibson, o'the Cumberland Pacquet?" "You can," answered the gentleman, who happened to be Mr Gibson himself. "Where is he?" said the Scotchman. "He stands before you, sir," was the reply. The Scotchman looked earnestly at Mr Gibson for a short time, and then said, "Man, I've come a' the way frae Scotland to gie ye a horse-whipping, but now I see what a pair-looking cratur ye are I wad be sorry to lay a finger on ye, guid morning, "and "our Scotch contemporary" walked out of the office.

In 1859, after the "Town's Bill" received the sanction of Parliament, he was a candidate for the representation of St Nicholas' Ward at the Trustee Board. His candidature was not successful, but he was afterwards appointed one of the nominees of the Lord of the Manor, a post which he occupied for many years. Lord Lonsdale also made him a county magistrate. He was largely interested in our local railways and carried on at Keswick an extensive and profitable business as a pencil manufacturer. In connection with this



business he had an establishment in Paternoster-row, London. He was also a shareholder and director of the Workington Haematite Iron Company.

February 27<sup>th</sup> 1909 West Cumberland Times

On Wednesday evening an inquest was held in the Sunday Schoolroom, Hensingham, touching the death of Mr Ed. Gill, 7 Scragill, Hensingham Road, Whitehaven, joiner, aged 61 years. He was employed by the Whitehaven Crown Estate Works, Corkickle. On Tuesday 22<sup>nd</sup> December 1908 he was working at a circular saw when a piece of timber that was being sawn bounced and struck him on the inside of the right thigh, causing a bruise. An abscess formed and death took place on Wednesday. . .

Joseph Gill, 3 Scragill, son of deceased, said his father was 61 years of age and had been in the employ of the Earl of Lonsdale for upwards of 35 years. On the 22<sup>nd</sup> December last a piece of wood which he was sawing with a circular saw nipped out and bounced back and hit him on the thigh, and he was laid up more or less for three weeks. About that time his father had a bad toe on the right foot. He was attended by Dr Muir. He never worked after the accident but got about the house. He died about a quarter to three that morning. Dr Clark had been attending him up to his death.

Joseph Douglas, 109 Main Street, Hensingham, said he had worked on the Castle Estate for a period of 17 or 18 years. He saw the accident: Edward Gill was sawing a piece of wood with a circular saw about 4ft 6in long, when it came back and hit him about the groin. It was a piece of larch. No fault could be attached to Gill or to the appliances. It was one of those accidents which could not be prevented.

Dr Muir said he had attended Gill on and off for over 20 years. On December 30<sup>th</sup> Gill came over to his surgery suffering from a sore toe on his right foot and a bruise on the inside of the right thigh. The injury to the toe was of old standing. He found a considerable amount of bruising extending from the knee up to the groin. Gill said that a log of wood had struck him about a week previously. He gave him a clearance of the club on January 30<sup>th</sup>. Gill said he wanted to go back to work but witness thought he would have been better of another week's rest.

Dr Clark said that on January 30<sup>th</sup> he visited Gill but did not examine him. He was sent for on the following Thursday, and he examined him thoroughly. On his right groin was a blister containing a lot of fluid. He made no complaint about his toe. His heart was not good and it got worse and taking that into consideration he was of opinion that the accident would accelerate death.

The jury found that Gill died from heart disease accelerated by the accident. They expressed sympathy with the family and Mr Dickinson referred to the respect in which deceased was held by those on the Castle Estate.

July 25<sup>th</sup> 1867 Whitehaven News

On Monday evening last a very narrow - indeed almost miraculous - escape from drowning occurred at Whitehaven. A little after eight o'clock on that evening, Mr Adair, bookseller, King-street, went to bathe behind the West Pier. The sea was running very high at the time, the tide was ebbing fast and at this spot there are dangerous currents, but Mr Adair, being an excellent swimmer, apprehended no danger. After being in the water some time he turned towards the shore but the current was such that he could make no progress in that direction. After contending with the waves his strokes gradually became weaker and slower. Two or three people on the West Pier, who had witnessed his struggle, became alarmed, and a rush was made towards the light house where the life-buoy was hung. At that instant, Mr Richard Gill, the lighthouse keeper, happened to be at the entrance to the light house. He observed that something unusual was taking place, and with the intuitive quickness of instinct, he guessed that some one was in danger of being drowned and concluded that the life buoy was what was wanted. He lost not an instant in taking it to the assistance of the drowning man, but first, with commendable coolness and promptitude, taking care the lengthen the line as to ensure its being of sufficient length. On its being thrown, Mr Adair, after one fruitless effort, succeeded in getting one arm through the buoy and clutching the line; after which, according to his own account, he became completely insensible. Mr Gill, instead of dragging him towards the shore, whereby the unlucky swimmer might have been injured on the rocks, had him dragged round the end of West Pier, where he was lifted into a boat, the usual remedies being applied for the recovery of persons apparently drowned. After long-continuing exertions, Mr Adair showed symptoms of returning life; and as soon as possible he was removed to Mr Gill's house, where every attention was paid him, with successful results, for before long he was restored to consciousness. We understand that it was opinion of one of the medical men who were called in that if assistance had arrived one minute later, Mr Adair's recovery would have been hopeless. The highest praise is due to Mr Gill for his heroic conduct on the occasion; and this is by no means the first time he has been the means of saving human life. During a gale some years ago he saved three seamen from a watery grave, the boat in which they sailed being dashed to pieces immediately behind his own residence. We trust that ere long his services may be suitably acknowledged by some of those societies whose province it is to reward such noble conduct, for surely never was such acknowledgement better deserved . . . This hair-breadth escape of a strong swimmer should act as a warning to those who are in the habit of bathing at that dangerous place lying between the West Pier and the Tom Hurd Rock.

October 30<sup>th</sup> 1912 West Cumberland Times

We regret to announce the death of the Rev C. B. S. Gillings, M. A., vicar of St Nicholas Church, Whitehaven, which took place at the Vicarage on Sunday evening. The circumstances attending the Rev. gentleman's death are extremely sad. In September he went for a holiday in the south, and, after spending some time with an old clerical friend at Eastbourne, paid a visit to Norwich, his native place. While there he, unfortunately, caught a chill, but this did not deter him from proceeding to Middlesbrough for the purpose of attending the Church Congress. His condition, however, became worse, and he returned home on October 3<sup>rd</sup> seriously ill. Rheumatic fever developed, and there were serious complications. Still it was hoped that his robust constitution would pull him through, and the members of his congregation awaited anxiously the daily reports respecting his condition, but despite all that medical skill and the best nursing could do, the desired improvement was not forthcoming, and shortly after seven o'clock on Sunday evening the Vicar passed away. The sad news was made known to the churchwardens and the curate of St Nicholas Church (Rev J. L Kendle) during the service, and at the close the Dead March in Saul was played by the organist, Mr Wilson Foster. Thus was the last sad message conveyed to the members of the congregation, many of whom were visibly affected.

Mr Gillings, who was 57 years of age, had been vicar of St Nicholas' Church for the long period of 28 years. He succeeded the Rev Stuart Hall, and at the time of his appointment to the living – February 1884 – he was curate of St John's Church, Carlisle, having previously been curate of St Mary's Church, Maryport. At an early period of his clerical career he was engaged in missionary work on the West Coast of Africa. Before leaving Carlisle Mr Gillings was presented with a testimonial by church workers and members of the congregation of St John's as a mark of their esteem and appreciation of his efforts on behalf of the parish and the schools. He came to Whitehaven, therefore, as a young man full of promise, and quickly proved his ability in various directions. In the pulpit he was an eloquent and - - preacher, on the platform a fluent and convincing speaker, and in church work generally a splendid organiser and a thorough business man. Special efforts on behalf of the church were invariably successful with the Vicar as an active worker and leader and so far as the district is concerned, probably there has never been a more striking example of success achieved by determination and perseverance in parochial enterprise than that which marked the promotion and carrying out of the scheme which in 1904 placed St Nicholas Church in possession of one of the finest organs to be found in the North of England. Something like £2000 was raised absolutely by voluntary subscriptions and donations. It was indeed a great achievement for the Vicar and his congregation, and one of which he was naturally very proud. The Vicar, it can be truly said, loved his church and during the latter part of his life was instrumental in carrying out various improvements, one of the latest being the conversion of the clergy side chapel into a vestry, and the erection of beautifully carved oaken screens around it. He was also a great lover of music, especially choir and oratorio, and when the St Nicholas Oratorio Society was formed some years ago he became an active and enthusiastic member. In all matters, whether appertaining to Church and State, to social, political or public life, Mr Gillings took a keen and bright interest, and always kept himself particularly well informed. He had exceptional literary ability, and often contributed to Church and other publications. He was also well acquainted with civil law, and held the degree of B.C.L. Few men, if any, outside the legal profession, in fact, probably had a better knowledge in this respect, and his friends often said of him that he would have made his mark as a barrister. The Vicar of St Nicholas was truly a man of many parts, and he will be missed, not only in Whitehaven, but in the diocese, as a minister of outstanding

ability, but nowhere will he be missed more acutely than in the parish where he had laboured so conspicuously for many years.

In memory of John GILLEAD master mariner of this port who was lost through the foundering of the Sarah Bragg on her voyage from Whitehaven to Douglas Dec 2<sup>nd</sup> 1892 aged 60 years. #### December 8<sup>th</sup> 1892 Cumberland Pacquet

There is every reason to fear that the schooner Sarah Bragg of this port has been lost with all hands on the passage from Whitehaven to Douglas. The vessel left with a cargo of coals for Douglas at ten o'clock on Friday morning, with a fair but slight wind, and ought to have made her destination the same night. About four in the afternoon she was sighted by some fishermen standing towards the Island, about ten miles W of St Bees Head. Nothing, however, has since been seen or heard of her, though Captain Bragg, the owner, has telegraphed repeatedly both to Douglas and Ramsey. The schooner carried a crew of four men, namely the master, John Gillead, Queen-street; Thomas Burns, mate, Church-street; Thomas Wilson, High Queen-street; and Isaac Cartmell, also a Whitehaven man. All the men were married. The families of the master and mate are grown up, and Wilson had no family; but Cartmel has five or six children. In addition to the crew, a man unknown, who was on the North Wall when the vessel went out, applied to be taken on board, and, the captain consenting, he dropped onto the vessel. He is said to be a stranger to the town about 40 years of age, and looked like a mason or a plasterer. It was moonlight on Friday night, and comparatively calm up till about midnight, when the moon was overcast, and a gale blew from S.S.E. Whether the schooner was run into and sunk, or foundered, it is impossible at present to say, but Captain Bragg inclines to the former opinion, as he says the vessel was well found and in good order. The sad event - for there can hardly be any doubt that the vessel has sunk - has elicited a feeling of profound sympathy with the families of the unfortunate crew. The master had been six years in the vessel, and the mate ten.

The Sarah Bragg was a schooner of 73 tons, carrying 150 tons cargo, and was built at Maryport about 40 years ago for the Bragg family. She was copper fastened, and about twelve months ago had a thorough overhaul on the Patent Slip here. She had seen a good deal of service. Her first voyage was with a cargo of rails to Messina, and she was subsequently largely engaged in the Baltic and Mediterranean trades, and latterly in carrying iron ore and pig iron to Newport and Cardiff. The Sarah Bragg, being of no particular class, was not insured, but in the days of the old Whitehaven Mutual Ship Insurance Society which took in most of the coasters here, she was insured.

##### THE FATE OF THE SARAH BRAGG - CHARRED WRECKAGE WASHED UP

With reference to the statement that has already appeared in print that certain wreckage had been cast up at Ravenglass the other day, it has since transpired that the beams and portions of the fore-castle bulkheads appear to have been burnt pretty well through. The forebeam appears to have been burnt, too; and a lot of small pieces of burnt wood have been strewn upon the beach, having come from the wreck. We understand that Captain Bragg on Thursday identified the wreckage as having belonged to the Sarah Bragg of which he was the owner, which left Whitehaven on the 2<sup>nd</sup> December and has not since been heard of, except that her boat was washed up some time ago at Fleetwood. It appears to be pretty certain now that the fate of the Sarah Bragg was altogether different from what anyone ever supposed. . . The day the Sarah Bragg left Whitehaven it was fine weather till about ten o'clock at night, when it came on a gale. It appears to be now pretty evident that the fire got too far ahead to be mastered, and that the men took to the boat before the gale came on, as they naturally would do. The vessel burnt down to the water and then sank; and the gale coming on the poor men in the boat would be swamped.

**CHILD BURNED TO DEATH**

An inquest was held at the Old Crown, Whitehaven, before Wm Lumb, Esq, coroner and a jury, on view of the body of Elizabeth Bowes Gillead, daughter of John Gillead, a seaman, who came by her death the previous day. Deceased, who was five years of age, had been left alone with a younger sister, by their father, who had lighted the fire in the morning and gone to his work on board the brig Agaphia. The children were downstairs in their night dresses, and their mother had not got up. The deceased child was seen by a woman who lives opposite to swing something lighted over her head. Shortly afterwards the mother heard the child scream and on getting out of bed, and running to the stair head, met deceased enveloped in flames. The flames were soon extinguished, but the little sufferer died the same night. The jury returned a verdict of "accidentally burned to death."

An inquest was held at the Black Lion Hotel in this town, on Saturday evening last, before W Lumb Esq., coroner, on the body of Mr Christopher Gilpin, of King-street, paper and marine store dealer, who had suddenly expired shortly after one o'clock that day. It appeared from the evidence that Mr Gilpin during the morning had been engaged in his business as usual at the warehouse in New-street, and that nothing appeared to be the matter with him more than ordinary. He had, however, been poorly since Good Friday last, when he had a severe attack of rheumatism. After dinner he went again into the warehouse, where George Quinn was at work, and calling to the latter, asked him to hold a rope while he (deceased) cut it. The rope was as thick as a man's wrist. Mr Gilpin cut the rope with a hatchet into about a dozen pieces of a foot long each; when he suddenly exclaimed, "Dear me, George, I have done myself a mischief;" and placing both hands upon his chest, he immediately afterwards vomited a quantity of blood. Quinn instantly ran off to fetch Mr Mitchell, Surgeon, who came directly and administered such medicines as the case required. After Quinn had gone and previously to his return, Susannah Mosley, who worked for Mr Gilpin, went into the warehouse, when she saw her master stagger and at the same time blood came from his nose. He then faintly said, "the doctor; your mistress;" and went to a rise in the warehouse floor, where he sat down and was unable to rise again. She ran to fetch Dr Wilson, and on her return found Mr Mitchell there. Rosanna Carlon, who was at work in the warehouse at the time of the occurrence, remained with the deceased until the doctor arrived. After Susannah left him he called for her mistress, and asked for some water. Mrs Gilpin was fetched, and on seeing him believed that he was dying. Some water was offered, of which he could

drink only a few drops, when he said he was very badly. Mr Mitchell, on reaching the warehouse almost immediately after he had been sent for, saw from the blood and the state of exhaustion in which the deceased was, that he was not likely to recover, but would shortly die. The air was then rapidly leaving the lungs. He gave him medicine to endeavour to relieve him, but objected to his being removed into the house, and he died shortly afterwards. His death was occasioned by the rupture of a blood vessel in the chest, brought on by too great exertion in cutting the piece of rope referred to, immediately after eating a hearty meal. To cut such a rope required considerably more strength than Mr Gilpin, in his then state of health, ought to have exercised. The jury returned a verdict of "Death from the rupture of a blood vessel in the chest." Mr Gilpin was 44 years of age and was highly respected.

**WRECKAGE FOUND**

**The following item of news appears in the Sydney Morning Herald of February 13<sup>th</sup> and it will be read by many in this neighbourhood with feelings of deep sorrow.**

**"Several weeks ago, particulars were published in these columns concerning the new steel barque Friar's Crag, which loaded at Newcastle for Iquique and has not since been heard of. The names of the crew were then given, and it is now feared that not a soul has survived to tell the tale of the new vessel's misfortune. The theory of her loss which has most supporters is that she encountered ice and was dashed to pieces against one of those dreaded floating mountains about whose movements between New Zealand and the South American West Coast so much has lately been published. Now another piece of the disaster has been disclosed, and it looks like the Friar's Crag was wrecked off the Australian coast. Pilot M'Cauley, at the Clarence River, reports that a board like the headboard of a vessel came ashore at Woodebluff, with the gilt letters on it, "Friar's Crag," together with other small pieces of wreckage. From this it appears that disaster**

overtook the barque soon after she left Newcastle, between the East Coast of Australia and the North Cape of New Zealand.

The following is a list of the crew of the Friar's Crag:- Gilpin Waddell, master, Whitehaven; Robert Hugh Jones, first officer, Carnarvon; Samuel Duncan, second officer, Rothesay; John McPherson, carpenter, Glasgow; W Hall, steward, South Shields; Robert Hutchinson, cook, Glasgow; John Joseph Benson, boatswain; John Walker, A.B.; James Clark A.B., Whitehaven; John A Lynn, A.B., Glasgow; Thomas Divine, A.B., Whitehaven, John Buchanan, A.B., New York; Lachlan Campbell, A.B., Glasgow; J J Laird, A.B., Dundee; John Taylor A.B., Cork; David Bodels, A.B., Magheramorne, County Antrim; A Cassie, A.B.; F Gardner: A.B., Newcastle, N.S.W.; William Mackereth, apprentice; Thomas Tyson Kitchin, do., Whitehaven; Charles James Watt do., William Herbert Watt, do., Birkenhead; Richard John Payne, do., Portsmouth.

As bearing upon the possibilities of the vessel's voyage and the equinoctial gales that prevailed soon after she left Newcastle, New South Wales, we learn that Captain Moore (brother or half-brother to Captain Waddell) has stated that he sailed the same course with Captain Waddell near a score of times, and he says that the captain of the Friar's Crag knew the course well and he (Captain Moore) is of opinion that the ship never got past the south east of New Zealand. Had it done so, the wreckage would probably have been taken by the trade winds towards the South American coast before passing New Zealand. It would most likely to drift where it has been found. His opinion rather leans to the Friar's Crag having been run into by one of the trading steamers between New Zealand and Australia, of which there are a great number constantly passing along. In this connection it would be interesting to know if any steamer has been missing. This is a conjecture worth naming, though it cannot affect the painful conclusion that must be come to as regards the deplorable end of the Friar's Crag.

It appeared from the evidence that on the previous Monday the covering of the cellar in front of Mr Stalker's grocer's shop was off to allow some boxes to be removed from the cellar to a railway cart. Several passers-by were warned to go round the cart, but Mr Gordon appears not to have noticed till he fell down into the cellar below, a distance of between five and six feet. He was taken home in a cab and attended by Dr Jackson, who found several ribs had been broken. While Dr Jackson was attending Mr Gordon he did not state how the accident occurred, but, referring to his partial blindness, remarked, "I am going to a land where there is no blindness." He died on Thursday morning. The Coroner, in summing up, said he thought there had been very great carelessness on the part of the person to whom the cellar belonged. That carelessness, however was not such as to make him criminally responsible. The jury, after being alone a few minutes, returned a verdict of "accidental death" and the foreman remarked

that the jury were of opinion that great carelessness had been shown by the owner of the cellar, and they recommended that the authorities be asked to take steps either to abolish traps or compel their owners to exercise due caution in their use.

On Thursday Mr H J Whiteside, deputy coroner, held an inquest at the Court House, Whitehaven, touching the death of Roberta Ellen Graham, aged 16 months, daughter of Robert Graham, fish merchant, Duke-street, Whitehaven, who was killed about midday by a Furness Railway cart, in Scotch-street, Whitehaven. The child had been sent to a friend's house, and soon after noon its sister took it out, stating that they would go to their grandmother's. Some sheep were passing along the street, and whilst watching the sheep and some children on the opposite side of the cart, the deceased, unnoticed by the driver, got up from the footpath and attempted to cross the road. The child was knocked down by the front of the cart, and was struck by the axletree underneath, and died almost immediately, having its skull fractured. The jury returned a verdict of "Accidental death" and appended to their verdict that no blame was attached to the driver of the cart.

The adjourned inquest touching the death of Miss Sarah Graham, who died on Sunday at the residence of Mr Robt. Jefferson, Springfield, from injuries caused by an unknown cyclist on Saturday night the 15<sup>th</sup> inst, was held yesterday (Friday) at the Railway Hotel, Moor Row, before Mr John Webster, coroner for the lordship of Egremont, and a jury with Mr Carleton as foreman. Mr E Atter, solicitor, Whitehaven, was

present on behalf of the relatives of the deceased, and watched the case on behalf of Mr R Jefferson. Supt. Kelly also attended.

Mary Costello, laundry maid at Mr Jefferson's, Springfield, said she knew the deceased Sarah Graham, who was a nurse in the employ of Mr Jefferson. She went with her as far as Cleator on Saturday. They met Mrs Rooney and talked with her a short time, and then went to the Roman Catholic Church at Cleator about half past seven o'clock, intending to go back to Springfield. Miss Graham was in good health at the time they started. They went through Mr Ainsworth's drive and so on to another road which leads towards Moor Row. Witness walked on left hand side of the road leading to Moor Row and Miss Graham was at the right hand side a yard away. Witness did not know the width of the road at the particular place. They got close to a farm house and witness did not remember anything until she saw Miss Graham thrown to the ground. When witness went to raise her she found her lying on her right side with her right cheek on the ground. She ran and asked her if she was hurt, and she made no reply. At that time she saw a cyclist, who seemed as though he had run into the hedge on the right side of the road. She said to him, "I am afraid you have badly injured her." She asked him to help her raise her, but they could not raise her altogether from the ground. She was at that time unconscious and was heavy. Witness then proposed that he should go into the village (Moor Row) for a conveyance. He suggested she should go, and she replied, "If you will go I will mind your bicycle." He took his machine and went down at a rapid rate. The cyclist said he was very sorry for what had happened. He seemed to bother with the lamp of his bicycle. The lamp was not lighted at the time. She said to him, "Don't bother with your bicycle, but run along as quickly as possible for assistance." He got on his bicycle and went down the road at a very rapid speed. He cut down the back of John Street; she did not see him call at any of the houses. Witness ran after him as far as Scalegill Road corner – Mr Nicholson's – where she saw him last. There were a good few houses where he could have called at if he thought proper. She thought she would run over 120 yards after him. She got assistance and went back to Miss Graham with a person named Joseph Knipe. She was still lying in the same place and still unconscious. She asked the young man Knipe to go for a conveyance, and Miss Graham was moved to Springfield. The cyclist came from behind at the time of the accident and witness was not aware there was anyone there. She did not hear anyone shout before the accident happened, nor did she see any light or hear any bell ring or gong sound. She could not say whether the cyclist had a light on his machine nor not at the time he knocked Miss Graham down. She thought she remembered saying to him, "You never sounded your bell" but she could not swear to that. She thought the accident occurred between eight o'clock and half past. The night was dark but not raining, and she thought they could see half a dozen yards in front. Witness sent for Dr Byers, Cleator, who arrived a few minutes before Dr Braithwaite at Springfield. She was still unconscious and remained so until she died at five past one o'clock on Sunday the 16<sup>th</sup> inst...

After the jury had visited the scene of the accident, the Coroner summed up and explained the law on the point.

The jury proceeded to consider their verdict at 1.35 and at 3.15 they found that Miss Graham had died from injuries inflicted by an unknown cyclist, adding, "And we, the jurors, do further say that a person to the jurors unknown did feloniously kill the said Sarah Graham." The Foreman said that the following recommendation had been unanimously arrived at: - as a recommendation the jury strongly urge the desirability of all bicycles in use in this country being registered with the police, or some other county authority, and their being required to have painted or affixed upon them in legible figures the registered number. The Coroner undertook to have the recommendation sent to the proper quarters.

The remains of Miss Sarah Graham, whose sad death is deeply regretted at Springfield, were laid to rest on Tuesday. The funeral took place at Whitehaven and the service was conducted in the church by the Revs Fathers Finch and Campbell, and at the graveside by Father Finch. The handsome oak coffin was covered with beautiful wreaths and the grave was lined with white and decorated with moss, white flowers and maidenhair fern by the Springfield gardener, Mr Frederick Tester. The coffin was carried by Messrs Cadden, Graham and Lowery, the butler and gardeners at Homewood, and Mr Tester. The hearse and carriages were provided by the Whitehaven Cab Company and were in charge of Mr Robert Fisher. Mr Jefferson's and Mr Lumb's carriages were in the cortege. Mr Alfred Selby, Hensingham, was the undertaker, and carried out his duties in his usual painstaking manner.

**The funeral of Mr R B Gunning, artist, formerly of Whitehaven, whose death occurred at Dumfries last week, took place at Whitehaven on Saturday. Some time ago he had a paralytic seizure, but recovered sufficiently to remove to his relatives in Scotland. Mr Gunning, who was 77 years of age, was well-known and greatly respected in Whitehaven. He took a keen interest in public affairs, though he was never prominent in connection with Party organisations. He was a Presbyterian and a devoted adherent of the Presbyterian Church in James Street, of which he was one of the elders.**

**It is our painful duty this week to record a case of drowning under circumstances which invest it with an unusual degree of interest. The unfortunate occurrence took place at Nethertown, and the unfortunate victim is Mr W H Gunson, spirit merchant, Whitehaven. It appears that a female relative, Miss Ellen Banks, of Keswick, being an invalid, had come over to reside for a short time on the coast, for the benefit of sea bathing. On Tuesday Miss Banks, accompanied by Miss Todhunter, proceeded by train to Nethertown, where there is a beautiful beach for bathing. On Thursday morning Miss Todhunter returned to Whitehaven, leaving Miss Banks with the understanding that she would return in the evening. Mr Gunson, the deceased, who had previously promised to visit the invalid at Nethertown, agreed to return with Miss Todhunter in the evening, and they accordingly left Whitehaven by the six o'clock train. On the way the deceased complained several times of the excessive heat, and on arriving at Nethertown, and after a passing inquiry after Miss Banks's health, he said he would go down to the beach to have a bathe. He accordingly went, and Miss Todhunter entered the house to divest herself of her travelling habiliments. The tide was far out, and Mr Gunson was observed to go into the water; but nothing more was thought of the circumstance for some minutes. At length on Mr Belman looking out for him he could nowhere be seen, and at first it was thought that he was dressing himself under shelter of the rocks; but this surmise proved incorrect. On going down to the place where Mr Gunson was seen to go in, the water was discovered to be muddy. His clothes were lying on the sand; but nothing could be seen of the body. Mr Belman, though unable to swim, waded in a**

considerable distance, and afterwards got the assistance of some haymakers from an adjoining field who used every exertion to find the body, but without success. A man was at once despatched on horseback to inform Mr Gunson's father and family of the sad occurrence. Miss Todhunter and Miss Banks returned to Whitehaven by the last train, and a number of the deceased's friends at once obtained conveyances and proceeded to Nethertown to institute a search for the body. Several boats were manned, and the search was vigorously carried on from 2 o'clock till between 6 and 7 the following morning, but the body was not found till nearly low water. During the course of the day it was removed to the residence of the deceased's parents at Sandwith. On Saturday Mr Lumb, coroner, and a respectable jury held an investigation into the circumstances when a verdict of "Accidental death" was returned. The deceased enjoyed the esteem of a wide circle of relatives and friends.

A painful instance of the uncertainty of life occurred in Whitehaven on Sunday morning when the Rev Thomas Harding, Wesleyan Minister, was seized with apoplexy during the delivery of his sermon and died almost immediately. Mr Harding was, up to the time of his death, in his usual health. He conducted the service with his accustomed vigour, preaching from the 10<sup>th</sup> verse of the 5<sup>th</sup> chapter of the First Epistle to Peter -- "But the God of all grace, who hath called us unto His eternal glory by Christ Jesus, after that ye hath suffered a while, make you perfect, stablish, strengthen, settle you." Towards the close of an earnest appeal, the rev. gentleman was practically applying the lesson of the text when, without the slightest premonitory

symptoms, his language instantaneously failed him and he fell slightly backwards. Assistance was at once rendered, and Dr Henry and Mr Muriel were immediately sent for, but before either of these gentlemen arrived life was extinct. The sad event caused, as will be readily imagined, the greatest excitement. The service was brought to a close and the congregation, who were naturally greatly alarmed at what they had witnessed, quietly dispersed. Mrs Harding was present, and witnessed the melancholy occurrence. The rev gentleman's body was conveyed, as soon as possible, to his house on High-street. The deceased gentleman was between 50 and 60 years of age, and had been for about thirty years in the ministry, having commenced circuit travelling as far back as the year 1844. He came to Whitehaven from Chesterfield, and was in his second year upon this station. In the evening, Mr Sibson preached in the chapel, and touched incidentally upon the sad event of the morning. Indeed, in several of the places of worship in the town it was touchingly referred to by the occupant of the pulpit. The deceased gentleman was the father of the Cambridge Senior Wrangler of last year, Mr T O Harding, who very recently delivered an able lecture in the Town Hall, in aid of the building fund of the Whitehaven Scientific Association.

Yesterday afternoon an inquest was held at Mr Gunson's spirit vaults, New-street Whitehaven, before William Lumb junr., Esq, coroner, upon the body of a boy named James Harper, aged 11 years, son of Mr Matthew Harper, mariner, College-street, who met with his death on Tuesday evening last by falling into the water whilst jumping off the bulwark or "channel" of the brig Jane on to the Jetty in the north harbour. . .the jury having viewed the body, the following evidence was taken: -

William Fairclough, a boy 10 years of age, deposed: I live at the corner of Duke Street and Queen Street. I knew the deceased. Last night about seven o'clock I was playing with him and another boy on the jetty near the Bulwark. The tide was in at the time. We were jumping off the bulwark or "channel" of the brig Jane on to the jetty. When the deceased jumped he slipped his foot and fell into the water. He had hold of my hand at the time and he nearly pulled me in with him. There was no-one on board the vessel at the time. No one pushed him into the water. When he fell in the other little boy went and told two men that he had fallen in. it was about a quarter of an hour before the men got him out of the water. I didn't see the deceased taken out because I went to tell his mother that he had fallen in.

Samuel Ferguson, a boy about the same age as the preceding witness, deposed: - I live in Addison Alley and I knew the deceased. I was playing with him last night. We went down to the jetty about half past six o'clock. When we got there we got on to the side of a ship (meaning the "channel") and we tried to jump off on to the jetty. We wanted to see who could jump it. We jumped off the jetty on to the side of the ship. The distance from the jetty to the ship's side would be about as far from where I am standing to that wall - (a distance of about five yards. No one was on board the ship at the time. We had been there about ten minutes when the deceased fell into the water. When we got on to the side of the ship we took hold of each other's hands and were going to jump together. We had jumped once before all together.

The Coroner: it's a wonder you were not all drowned, jumping such a distance as that altogether.

Mr Thompson: I don't think the vessel would be lying so far off the jetty as the witness says she was. I think she would not be lying more than two feet from the jetty. I

Examination of witness resumed: It was the second time we jumped when the deceased fell into the water. I saw him fall in, and then I jumped onto the jetty. I think the depth of the water would be about six feet.

The Coroner (addressing the witness) said: I hope you will never try to do such a thing again. You two little boys might easily have been drowned as well as the deceased.

Mary Ann Storey, aunt to the deceased, deposed: I am wife of Thompson Storey, carpenter, and live in Strand-street. I was on the jetty when the deceased was taken out of the water. It was about a quarter to seven o'clock. I saw two men grappling for him with grappling irons. One of them was on the jetty, and the other was in a boat. I was there a quarter of an hour before they got him out. The place where they found him was about two yards from where he fell in. He was quite dead when he was taken out. I believe he was in the water about half an hour. Dr Thompson, Dr Wilson and Dr l'Anson were sent for, and they did all they could to restore life, but it was of no avail.

The Coroner having briefly summed up, the jury returned a verdict of "Accidental death."

**TERRIBLE SHIPWRECK**

**Loss of the "River Garry" and All on Board**

On Monday evening last quite a gloom was cast over Whitehaven when the melancholy tidings became known that the steamer "River Garry" of Glasgow had foundered at sea, and that all on board – 21 in number – had met a watery grave. . .

The fears entertained at Dunbar that a large steamer had been lost off Skateraw, four miles east of Dunbar, were verified on Monday. Large quantities of wreckage had been coming ashore, strewn the beach for more than a mile. Boats and 15 life belts were picked up, as well as chests and books. The books show the ill-fated vessel to be the River Garry, of Glasgow, owned by Messrs Little and Co. with coal, from Leith to London, with a crew of 21 hands, all of whom have perished.

The steamer sailed from Leith for London on Friday evening about 9 o'clock with a cargo of coal. At the time appointed for sailing a number of the crew had not turned up, and the captain had to fill up the vacancies by engaging "runners." The vessel had a cargo of 1,650 tons of coal on board, the value of which was estimated at £900. The "River Garry" arrived in Leith about two months ago from Newport News, U.S. with a general cargo. After the vessel had been discharged she was placed in the dry dock in order to be overhauled, the work being executed by Messrs Cram and Co., engineers, Leith, the cost of the overhaul amounting to £700. When the vessel left Leith she was in command of Captain Joseph Cavender, 44 years of age, and third son of Mr Cavender of Scotch Street, Whitehaven, a valued and trustworthy officer of the River company, having been in the service for 15 years. Mr Cavender had along with him his youngest son, and by what may be considered providential his only daughter and wife had intended going along with him to London, but were detained at home. . . Although a minute examination was made, no trace could be found of the cook, Matthew Harper, also a native of Whitehaven. . .

Up to last night no tidings of the body of Matthew Harper, who had gone in the position of cook on board the vessel, had been received. This young man was the eldest son of Mr William Harper, sailmaker, Brackenthwaite, Whitehaven, who joined the vessel on the Wednesday previous to sailing, having been sent for by Captain Cavender. Matthew was a young man of great promise, widely known, and highly respected by a large circle of friends and acquaintances, and his untimely death has evoked the deepest sympathy all round. Mr William Harper proceeded to the place on Wednesday with the result above stated.

Somewhat singular to relate this is the second Matthew Harper that has lost his life under the same firm. Matthew Harper, uncle of the young man mentioned above, lost his life from the "River Lagan" some eleven



years ago on a voyage from Whitehaven to the Baltic, and about the same time after leaving port, some four or five hours.

On Monday morning another well-known Whitehaven man disappeared for ever from our midst. Mr William Spence Harper, journalist, expired that morning at his residence, Mountain View, Prospect, Whitehaven. Mr Harper met with an accident some short time ago at Corkickle Railway Station. He fell, and his injuries were of so serious a nature that he has been bedridden ever since. One of his knees was severely injured, but the cause of death was general debility. In 1848 Mr Harper came to Whitehaven from Edinburgh. He was a compositor on the "Whitehaven Times." About 1858 he left Whitehaven and went to Ulverston, and after a short stay there he proceeded to Manchester. In that city he remained for some time and was connected with the Manchester press. He was successively connected with the "Whitehaven Messenger" "The Herald" "The Guardian" "The News" and "The Cumberland Pacquet." He was for a considerable period the editor and manager of the "Pacquet." In 1884 he succeeded Mr Washbourne as editor on this journal, continuing in this capacity until January 1894, when he became the registered proprietor of the "Pacquet" and held that position until April of last year, when he severed his connection with the paper. Shortly afterwards he joined the revived "Gazette" but had only been connected with that paper a short time when he met with the accident that has had such an unfortunate termination. Mr Harper wielded a ready and facile pen, few men had a more retentive memory for old local incidents, and he was widely known as "Auld Hodden" under the heading of which he contributed "O maks o' Crack." He was the oldest of Whitehaven journalists and during his connection with the "Pacquet" his editorial writings had a force about them somewhat unique. For a considerable time Mr Harper took a very active part in connection with the Co-operative movement; he was a fluent speaker and in 1888 he was elected a guardian for the township of Whitehaven, holding office for three years. The late Mr Joseph Braithwaite and Mr Harper were defeated in the year 1891, their places as guardians for the township of Whitehaven being taken by Mr William Walker of Oaklea and the late Mr Joseph Jackson. Mr Harper remained a year – during 1891 – out of office. In 1892 he was again elected guardian, there being no contest, Mr W Walker withdrawing. Mr Harper continued as guardian for another three years – 1892 to 1894 – and since then and up to the time of his death he was a District Councillor and guardian for Preston Quarter rural township. The only other public office held by him, we believe, was that of member of the Burial Board, and in connection with his public offices he was a regular attender and often added considerable life to the debates. At the time of his death he was about 57 years of age. He leaves a widow and grown-up family.

The maid gave an alarm and in a few minutes later the neighbours found Miss Harris at the top of the stairs. Her clothes were in a red glow and she was shockingly burnt all over the body. Her burning clothes were put out by the Rev M Young with a coat, and medical aid was obtained, but she died on Saturday night. A verdict of "Accidental death" was returned.**

**SUPPOSED LOSS OF A WHITEHAVEN VESSEL WITH ALL HANDS**

**There is too much reason to fear that the brigantine Glenroy, of this port, has gone down between Whitehaven and Dublin, and left no one to tell the story of her loss. The Glenroy, of which Captain Harrison was master, and Mr J J Dixon, managing owner, carried about 200 tons. She left this port, coal-laden, for Dublin on the 24<sup>th</sup> of last month, in company with the brig Nicholson, Captain Brannan, and other vessels bound for the same destination. All of these reached Dublin in due course, with the exception of the Glenroy, which, as we have stated, has not since been heard of. Captain Harrison purchased the Glenroy about three years ago. She formerly hailed from Cardigan, and was both good looking and a smart sailer for an old vessel. After her purchase she was put upon the Slip at Whitehaven and thoroughly overhauled. The crew consisted of the master, who was married; the mate, W Sample, also married and has one child; W Chambers, able-bodied seaman, who has also left a wife and five children; H McManus, Roper-street, able-bodied seaman, unmarried; and a boy, a stranger. On the evening of the 24<sup>th</sup> ult, the steam-tug Prince of Wales left this port for Drogheda, under the charge of Captain Gaitskell, of the Nymph, as coast pilot. Between two and three o'clock on the morning of the 25<sup>th</sup> ult., a blinding storm of wind and snow set in, and the tug was compelled to put into Peel (Isle of Man) for safety. Several times during the morning,**

Captain Gaitskell made the remark that he wondered what would become of poor Harrison. It is conjectured that the Glenroy foundered during the severe storm of Tuesday the 25<sup>th</sup> ult. A remarkably swift sailer she ought, in ordinary course, to have reached her destination as soon, if not sooner, than any of her companion vessels. Captain Harrison was a steady and good seaman and very much respected.

The many friends of Mr John Hartley of Whitehaven will be sorry to learn of the death of his son, David, whilst following his employment as a plumber in the railway shops at Sparks. It appears from information received that Mr David Hartley had been laying a range of pipes across the top of a wall 20 feet high. Whilst he was in the act of receiving another length of pipe from some men who were working for him below, he came in contact with an electric wire which ran across this wall, and which was supported upon iron brackets. When receiving this length of pipe he placed his left hand upon one of those brackets to support himself from falling, whilst with the other hand he took hold of the pipe, with the result that an electric current passed through his body containing 440 volts, killing him almost instantly. The deceased's uncle, Mr David Hartley, boilermaker, a native of Whitehaven, who resides some 500 miles away from the scene of the accident, went right away in response to a wire informing him of the sad calamity, and attended to all the necessary arrangements for deceased's interment &c. The deceased was a general favourite amongst his workmates, and his sad death created keen sorrow. The workshops were closed on the day of his funeral, the men attending the last rites in a body, on the 17<sup>th</sup> June. It is just twelve months since the deceased left Whitehaven, and he was doing very nicely in his daily avocation. He was only 22 years of age and had every appearance of getting on in life, and it is pitiful to think of a young man being taken away just at the time when he was enjoying a successful career.

Lieut. James Hodgson Hartley, of the Namaqualand Burgher Commando, whilst attached to the Calirnia ambulance for special service, has been recommended for the V.C. After travelling day and night to catch up to the Commando, he went to the rescue of wounded men under heavy fire, and attended to them under heavy fire for 8 ½ years, during which time he narrowly escaped death, for only a stumble on a loose stone and an involuntary duck saving him from a bullet which whizzed over his head and flattened itself against

the rock he was skirting. He was shot through his clothes, and the Red Cross van he had improvised was fired upon. Lieut. Hartley is the hon. Secretary of the Aeronautical Society of South Africa, and secretary of the Navy League of South Africa, a J.P., an ex-councillor, and has twice been invited to stand for the Cape Assembly.

Deceased commenced work at eight o'clock on Monday morning and worked up to about a quarter-past eleven. At that time he was engaged running a tub into the bottom deck of the cage when a tub, which was on the top deck of the cage, fell out and in its descent it struck deceased on the head, crushing it severely. The unfortunate lad was at once removed to the Whitehaven Infirmary, where he died about half-past twelve from the injuries he had received. The tub which struck the deceased would fall a distance of nine feet, the top deck of the cage being nine feet from the flat sheets. It is stated that when the cage was lowered it was found that the sneck which keeps the tub in the cage had not been put into its place, this being part of the deceased's duty.**

The melancholy loss of the brig Elizabeth Buckham, on the Burbo Bank, off the entrance to Liverpool, while on a voyage from Demerara with a cargo of rum &c, has had the effect of making the well-known bathing place of New Brighton for a time a perfect pandemonium. Several puncheons and barrels of rum which had been washed ashore near that place fell into the hands of a number of men and women, who broached the barrels and carried the rum away in large quantities; indeed, many of the puncheons were emptied of their contents. One young man named Joseph Foulds, drank to such an extent of the rum that, in spite of all the exertions of a medical man, he never once recovered his consciousness, and died under the influence of the drink. A painter, who had no other thing than his paint mug to drink out of, emptied it of its legitimate contents, filled it with rum, took a dose, fell into a pool of water on his head and was nearly drowned. His rum drinking has nearly killed him. Many others - indeed, nearly a hundred - who drank too freely of the liquor, were on Wednesday suffering severely. Unfortunately the death of Foulds and the narrow escape of the painter and others, are not the only dark features in connection with the wreck of the Elizabeth Buckham. A number of servant girls and married women, who went down to the beach to see the wreck which had been and was washing ashore, were prevailed upon to taste the rum. The effects of the rum soon told, and scenes of dreadful profligacy followed. One young woman, very well connected, was prevailed to take some of the raw spirit, and she, like many others, was treated with the greatest violence. She was discovered at a late hour on Wednesday night lying in the sand hills, quite unconscious, and was taken to her home by the police. None of the bodies of the crew of the ill-fated brig had, up to Wednesday evening, been recovered.

**December 7<sup>th</sup> 1866 Carlisle Journal**

From inquiries made on Thursday it seems that further scenes of debauchery have occurred in consequence of persons "tapping" barrels of rum which were washed ashore on the Cheshire coast from the ill-fated vessel. Persons who were on the spot when the wrecking was going on, state that they saw people with gimlets, boring holes in the casks, applying their mouths to the holes and drinking copiously of the liquor which was several degrees over proof. The result was that numbers of the wreckers became helplessly drunk

and had to be carted from the shore to their homes. Men who had come from inland districts were found lying in ditches in a state of intoxication. Two women and two men were found on Thursday morning on the sandhills at Hoylake in a state of insensibility, and it was evident that their condition was to be attributed to inordinate rum drinking. An inquest was held on Thursday on the body of Joseph Foulds, "boots" at the Royal Hotel, New Brighton, who, as stated, had died from the effects of drinking quantity of the rum. The jury returned a verdict of "died from excessive drinking."

William HINDE their son master of the brig Favourite of Liverpool who on the homeward voyage from Sierra Leone was lost with all hands off Blackpool November 22<sup>nd</sup> 1865 aged 37 years and was interred at Bispham. Also Henry HINDE their son who died May 14<sup>th</sup> 1873 aged 37 years.

Wreck of a Whitehaven Brig

The brig Favourite of Whitehaven and Liverpool went ashore at Blackpool during the terrible gale on Wednesday week, and the consequences have been the destruction of the ship and the loss of the whole crew, ten in number. The Favourite was making for Liverpool, after a voyage to the Western Coast of Africa, whence she brought a cargo of palm oil and some seeds. The master (Captain W Hinde) and part of the crew belonged to Whitehaven. Late in the afternoon the vessel was seen off to sea, apparently making for Liverpool, and about seven o'clock it was reported that a ship was coming aground. Nearly half a mile out on the sands, when there was a pause in the pelting showers, the vessel was dimly seen through the gloom beating about on the ground. The lifeboat, under the direction of Mr Bickerstaff, the coxswain, and Mr E Banks, was launched. It took a long time and cost immense labour to make headway against the heavy and continuous waves which broke over the boat, filling it and drenching the crew. A terrific sea burst over the boat, submerged her, broke four oars and threw some of the men from their seats. This rendered it impossible to get to the ship. A second effort was immediately made, but it was equally unsuccessful. The spectators who were collected could distinctly hear the agonized shrieks of the distressed seamen, but nothing could be sooner done owing to the blackness and fury of the storm. It is supposed the brig went to pieces between ten and twelve o'clock, and from the appearance of the wreck, it appears that she went asunder at midships. A portion of the hull, after slightly drifting, got fixed in the sand, and another portions, consisting of small spars, the mainmast, the starboard bow, the figurehead and other fragments, was on Thursday brought in by the tide and thrown immediately under the wall opposite the new hotel. For miles up the beach timbers and small pieces of wreckage were strewed. Before long three bodies were seen nearly together drifting in shallow water. About mid day another corpse was seen near the shore, but before it could be reached it had disappeared beneath the surf and was taken out by the tide. Shortly after a fourth body was recovered - the corpse of a fine young fellow dressed like a mate. The dead bodies of nine of the crew have been cast ashore, six at Bispham, two at Fleetwood and one at Cleveleys. The body of the Captain, William Hinde, was recovered on Friday. He had in his possession a watch and guard, 10s in silver and copper, a knife and some papers relative to private matters. His watch was stopped at ten minutes to ten o'clock and it may be therefore calculated with certainty that that was the time when the vessel went down.

November 30<sup>th</sup> 1865 Whitehaven News

. . . the inquest on the bodies of the sailors who were drowned was held on Saturday afternoon at the Gynn Inn, above Blackpool. Evidence was given by Robert Bickerstaffe, coxswain of the Blackpool lifeboat, and by Mr J Richardson Thompson, of Whitehaven, the owner of the vessel. It was stated that the crew consisted of ten men, and the vessel was bound for Liverpool from Sherbro, via Sierra Leone. She was about nineteen

years old, and was considered seaworthy. The captain was William Hinde, the mate was William Nixon and the cook and steward were named Stephenson. The captain was a married man, and has left a widow and four children. The Coroner, in summing up the evidence, said the lifeboat crew did not appear to be at all to blame in the matter, and although it might be questionable as to whether the vessel was seaworthy, it was quite clear that the captain must have thought so, or else he would never have ventured to sea with her. A verdict of accidental death was returned.

The handsome Liberal Club which St Bees owes to the munificence and public spirit of Mr Alfred Hodgetts of Abbot's Court, was on Monday evening formally opened and presented to the village with due ceremony.

August 3<sup>rd</sup> 1887 West Cumberland Times

We regret to have to record the sudden demise, on Saturday night, of Mr Alfred Hodgetts of Abbot's Court, St Bees. The deceased gentleman was perfectly well on Friday evening but about five o'clock on Saturday morning he was seized with apoplexy. Dr Perry of Glasgow, Mr Hodgett's brother-in-law, was telegraphed for, and Dr Dickson of Whitehaven, Mr Hodgett's medical adviser, was also summoned, but the deceased gentleman never rallied, dying about twenty minutes to twelve on Saturday night. Mr Hodgetts, who was 56 years of age, was born in London, his father being a chemical manufacturer. He served his articles as an engineer at Manchester and afterwards held several positions in Staffordshire collieries. About 1852 Mr Hodgetts came to Whitehaven to act as manager for the late Mr S Smith, who was then the lessee of the High House Mines, Frizington, belonging to the Fletcher family. When the lease of these mines lapsed it was not renewed to Mr Smith; Messrs Fletcher taking them into their own hands with Mr Hodgetts as a partner, trading under the style of "Fletcher and Hodgetts". A large business was done and Mr Hodgetts retired from the firm three or four years ago, after acquiring a fortune. For a number of years, and up to the time of his death, Mr Hodgetts took a great interest in the political affairs of West Cumberland, and of the borough of Whitehaven. He was president of the old West Cumberland Liberal Association, and also president of the Whitehaven Liberal Association. He frequently occupied the chair at political gatherings, and his utterances on the topics of the day were noted for their ability and breadth of view. A few years ago, by his liberality, an exceedingly handsome institute was erected at St Bees for the especial use of Liberals, but also open to the entire community, and Mr Hodgetts was also generous in his support of the various other Liberal Associations in the division. When the Volunteer movement was commenced in Whitehaven, Mr Hodgetts took great interest in the formation of the Rifle Corps, and when the late Major Fletcher and he officered the corps, it was distinguished for the exceeding liberality with which its affairs were managed. In local affairs Mr Hodgetts did not take much interest, although he was a member of the St Bees Parochial Committee. Mr Hodgetts married Miss Perry, a daughter of the late Dr Perry of Glasgow. Mrs Hodgetts survived him but there is no family. The funeral is fixed to take place today (Wednesday) at the Whitehaven Cemetery.

We regret to announce the death of Mr John McKelvie, solicitor, of Whitehaven, which took place at his residence at Lowther street Whitehaven on Tuesday afternoon last. The deceased gentleman was a native of Whitehaven, and was in the fiftieth year of his age. He served his articles with Mr Hodgkin, solicitor of Sandhills Lane, Whitehaven, and subsequently became partner with that gentleman, who held several important public offices in that town, including that of registrar of the County Court, clerk to the Board of Guardians, superintendent registrar of births, deaths and marriages. Mr Hodgkin disappeared from Whitehaven in 1866 in a most extraordinary manner. He was a widower with a small family, in most comfortable circumstances, and was one of the most popular men in the district. He suddenly disappeared without any apparent cause, and was traced to London, thence to Liverpool, from there to New York, and after that all trace of him was lost and so far as we know he has never been heard of since. Mr McKelvie succeeded Mr Hodgkin in the appointment of Clerk to the Board of Guardians, superintendent registrar of births, death and marriages, and other appointments. He was also Clerk to the Rural Sanitary Authority, the Assessment Committee, the Commissioners of Taxes, Solicitor to the Building Society and for some years held the appointment of Coroner for the lordship of Egremont. . .

May 15<sup>th</sup> 1886 Wigton Advertiser

This was a somewhat similar case to the preceding one, the petitioner being John Dodds of 17 Hughenden Road, Clifton, Gloucestershire, gentleman, who was the beneficial owner of a customary tenement in the occupation of John Scott at Nether Row in the manor of Caldbeck Underfell, consisting of a close of land, called the "Intack" held of the said manor at an annual rent of 3s 10d, of which Christopher Hodgkin is tenant on the Court Rolls. Eighteen years ago the said Christopher Hodgkin, who was a solicitor in Whitehaven, went to America where he had since resided, and the petitioner prayed that the tenement whereof the said Christopher Hodgkin is seized might vest in himself. The petition was directed to Lord Leconfield, who was represented by Mr J Graham. Mr Graham said he appeared in fact for both parties and there was no opposition. The judge made the order required.

#### DEATH OF AN OLD WHITEHAVEN TRADESMAN

In our obituary column today we record the decease of Mr Isaac Hodgson, one of the oldest tradesmen in Whitehaven, at the advanced age of 73 years. Mr Hodgson carried on for many years a large business in Duke-street, and was ever ready to assist in every reasonable effort to promote the religious and moral welfare of the community in which his lot was cast. He was an old and respected member of the Wesleyans worshipping in Michael-street. In politics the deceased was a consistent follower of the Liberal Party; and he always took a lively interest in all projects that were brought forward for the benefit of his fellow townsmen. In paying a tribute of respect to the departed, it might be mentioned that for many years he never missed one Sunday in visiting the Union Workhouse where he constantly attended to exhort amongst the poor.

**One of the most familiar figures and perhaps the best known man in Whitehaven, Mr John Hodgson, died at his residence in Lowther Street, Whitehaven, shortly before midnight on Wednesday evening last. Mr Hodgson had been ailing for some time past. In his youth he was apprenticed to his uncle, Mr Thomas Fisher, and learned the art of chair making. Of an active and inquiring disposition, he soon became identified with public affairs in the town, first as overseer, and afterwards held different appointments. He has been one of the Trustees of the Town and Harbour for nearly 20 years, always being returned for St James's Ward, and throughout his career he was looked upon as one of the most popular members of the board. In harbour and town matters, he was exceedingly useful, his store of local knowledge being remarkable, especially in regard to past events and figures. For many years Mr Hodgson was a Guardian for Whitehaven, and on the death of the chairman of the Board, Mr William Wilson, Mr Hodgson was appointed to the vacant seat, a position he continued to hold until his death. He was also largely connected with the Whitehaven Gasworks, and held the post of director of the company. The Whitehaven and West Cumberland Infirmary also claimed his services on the committee of that institution. He was also connected with the Whitehaven Joint Stock Bank, and was a shareholder in the Maryport and Carlisle Railway Company, being a regular attender at the half-yearly meetings. The old Cleator and Egremont line of railway also found in Mr Hodgson a large shareholder, and one of its prominent supporters. Some years ago he was well-known to the shipping interest, no firm being better known in West Cumberland than that of Messrs John and Isaac Hodgson. They were chiefly interested in wood vessels. The firm were also known as the local agents connected with the Whitehaven Steam Navigation Company, an appointment held until within the past three or four years. Mr Hodgson was auditor for the Whitehaven Burial Board, and a director of the Mutual Insurance Society. For many years he took a pronounced stand against the Whitehaven Castle influence. He fought and won as the people's candidate. Although a man of no particular education, Mr Hodgson was a power on the platform and his manner of dealing with public affairs before a Whitehaven audience found for him a large body of supporters. He will be greatly missed at Whitehaven.**

Date for Joseph Hodgson's death is wrong, Jane Hodson (d 1892) is buried in the same plot as Joseph Hodgson who was buried 16<sup>th</sup> Feb 1895 aged 84.

Our obituary column of this week contains an announcement which will cause a pang of regret to not a few of the older inhabitants of the town, to whom he was well known, as to many of the present generation, with whom the deceased was a great favourite in company.

We refer to Mr Joseph Hodgson, glazier, who on Friday crossed that bourne from whence no traveller ere returns. For upwards of two years Joseph had been confined to his home as an invalid, not having been down town since the interment of his partner in life. Mr Hodgson's death took place on Friday last at his residence, High Queen Street, Whitehaven, at the good old age of 84 years and 10 months. Quoting from one of his numerous printed works, we learn -

"Who was in Whitehaven born,  
In 1810, Good Friday's morn,  
And oft since then has felt the thorn!

J Hodgson

Whose father died when he quite young,  
Could scarcely lisp a parent's name,  
Nor knew the value of the same!

J Hodgson"

From the above the reader will be able to form an idea that Mr Hodgson was not reared with the silver spoon, but like many more of that day had a very hard bringing up, having to toil at a very early age underground in William Pit, as a trapper boy. The remembrance of Mr Hodgson's early days, and his wonderful stories about chip-gathering at the shipyards, coal on the North Wall, in the days of James Curry and David Hellon, and the youthful frolics about the rope and twine works in the town, and the harbour master's office on the North Wall, are reminders of things that few of the present generation can remember. The educational facilities which Mr Hodgson possessed were very small, infinitesimally small, in comparison with what is enjoyed at the present time. Notwithstanding this drawback it is surprising the aptitude he possessed for putting into verse the various objects of interest that transpired around him. There are still left some who remember his centenary song on the Poet Burns, as given in the Globe Hotel, Whitehaven, Jan 25<sup>th</sup>, 1859, of which we give a verse: -

"We hail one hundred years this morn, with joy peruse each line  
Of Burn's poems and songs of love, memorials of lang syne;  
Who did predict his fortune great in true prophetic strains,  
Of honours that would be conferr'd upon his last remains."

In the same year the Oddfellows had a procession, which fired the poetic flame in the poet's breast, and he brought out a song which became very popular among the young men of that time: -

"Twenty-third day of August, at town of Whitehaven,  
The Oddfellows walked so blyth and gay,  
With music a-timing, regalia shining,  
There never was seen such a noble display."

In the same year appeared a rhyme on a meeting of Working Men, held in the Theatre, on the Whitehaven Town's Bill, which created some amusement at the time, but the names which he honoured then have all disappeared from this scene of action. The public of Whitehaven entertained a high respect for Joe, and liberally patronised him in purchasing his productions. He was the life and soul of many social gatherings in his day and was looked up to by all classes with respect and veneration. He was not a polished scholar, yet possessed sufficient to put together his numerous productions without any very material assistance, and they speak for themselves of the care he exercised in sending them out to the public. On one occasion



Whitehaven was visited by Poet Close, who delivered a lecture in the Whitehaven Theatre, when Mr Hodgson took the chair. In introducing the lecturer, he commenced by saying -

"Tis very rare, in any age,  
You see two poets on one stage,  
One poet to take the chair,  
The other to tell the whole affair".

Mr Hodgson, though not possessed of riches, was of a rambling disposition and visited every nook and corner of the county to which he belonged, and published a "Guide to the Lakes of Cumberland, Westmorland and Lancashire," which was effective in bringing the beauties of Cumberland prominently before the public. He never grew tired of relating his rambles, and boasted of having visited the Metropolis no fewer than seven times, the first visit being in 1839. His quaint saying with respect to that visit was

"Aye, my lad, just to think of it:  
And where will all these millions be  
A hundred years to come?  
Who now does throng the crowded streets,  
Like motes beneath the sun.  
They all within the grave will sleep,  
No living soul for them will weep,  
And other men their places keep,  
A hundred years to come."

At all the meetings held in the town, more particularly those of a political nature, it was incomplete if Joseph was not there to give one of his songs, and many a hearty laugh was enjoyed at Joseph's quaint style of rendering them, a style peculiar to himself. In 1868 Mr Hodgson delivered a lecture in the Oddfellows' Hall, entitled "A Plea for the Abolition of Capital Punishment." The deceased held strong views on this subject, and was not afraid to give utterance to them. His plea was "Man should not take life, that is God's privilege alone. The repentance of a convict under the circumstances of his knowledge of the very hour he is to die, may prove unavailing. Death bed repentances are weak reeds to rely upon. Leave the culprit to toil in a foreign land, till Nature calls him from the earth; leave him ample time to repent of his crime, and make his peace with God. Should he then perish, hardened in his iniquity, the sin be upon his own head, but do not thrust him unprepared before his Creator. The example of an execution does not deter men from such a horrible crime as murder." He believed that

"When God created man from dust,  
His precepts to fulfil,  
His greatest purpose in it was  
To man, "thou shalt not kill."  
Whose sovereign power did call him forth,  
And formed him out of clay,  
Then who so vain as dare to take  
The human life away."

Mr Hodgson published a fortnightly publication entitled "Joseph Hodgson's Venture." "This World's a Chase, where all haste to the Terminus." This first saw light on Saturday March 1<sup>st</sup> 1851, and was very readable. From No. 2, we take the following of a "Journey to Maryport."

"The 31<sup>st</sup> of Dec 1850, I journeyed by rail to Maryport, my seventh time, to audit the anniversary of the Primitive Methodists. Scholars of that town's school institution, where, as on all former occasions my most sanguine expectations and conceptions concerning that infantine or juvenile Institution for the moral instruction and improvement of the young and rising generation, were eclipsed in the reality of ocular demonstration, on beholding them beautifully arranged on their hustings or gallery about to commence with their instructive programme, commencing with a song of praise to that great immutable God to whom all our adorations are due; after which the faithful pastor's ejaculations to God for his unbounded concessions to all, more especially the young of the present generation, for their unprecedented privileges of obtaining a useful and gratuitous instruction at the hand of their kind preceptors; thus storing their

susceptive and youthful minds with scientific and useful knowledge, for their future progress in society, fitting them for every event in human life. Those annual occasions of exhibiting before a discerning public, proves to a demonstration the versatility or susceptible powers of the minds of youth of both sexes, where all who have come to discernment, or a philanthropic mind, must come to the conclusion that their retentive powers far exceed the general conceptions of mankind; thus a considerable store of edification and moral instruction is obtained. . . The Primitive Methodist School Institution of that town, in my humble opinion, with the aid of a little experience has the general ascendancy in school tuition.”

Space forbids enlarging upon the many productions which have emanated from the pen of the deceased, they are so numerous, and shall therefore close by mentioning what was about the ablest production he sent forth viz., “Greenhowes Cemetery” published in 1875. What tender reminiscences are awakened in the mind of the reader who can go back to Sunday the 18<sup>th</sup> of November 1855, when the first four interments took place, and more particularly so as they scan through the long list of the name of those who had been laid to rest in that hallowed spot. It seems that Mr Hodgson’s wish through life was to rest amidst the kindred who there so quietly repose, and anticipating the repose of his own body, he says: -

“Here could I wish to sleep! This is the spot

Which I have long marked out to lay my bones in:

Tired out and wearied with the riotous world,

Beneath this spot would I be sepulchred.

It is a lovely spot! ‘Tis a nook most pleasant;

Grant, heaven, that here my pilgrimage should close.”

The funeral of the deceased will take place on Sunday afternoon, leaving High Queen Street at 2.30.

#### **SUDDEN DEATH AT FRIZINGTON**

An old resident, Captain Joseph Hodgson, died suddenly on Friday evening at Main-street, Frizington. The deceased had been visiting some of his friends, and he complained of a pain in his stomach. Restoratives were procured, but the old gentleman only coughed once and then expired. Death is attributed to heart disease. About 13 years ago, whilst taking the new tug Whitehaven, belonging to trustees, to Cardiff, deceased lost her on the Horse Rock in Ramsay Sound. He afterwards went into the ironmongery trade in company with his son Joseph, with whom he resided. Deceased, who was in his 62<sup>nd</sup> year, was a widower. The remains were interred at the Whitehaven cemetery on Tuesday in the presence of a large number of persons.

In memory of Thomas Barnes HODGSON who died 5<sup>th</sup> November 1908 aged 76 years. Also Jane his wife who died 11<sup>th</sup> August 1911 aged 75 years. Fred HODGSON who died 27<sup>th</sup> August 1880 aged 5 years. And Tom WALKER who was killed by falling from the Pillar rock Ennerdale March 23<sup>rd</sup> 1883 aged 17 years. The Lord gave and the Lord hath taken away. Also Harry their son who was lost at sea when the S.S. Galleon

foundered with the loss of all hands Nov 1925 aged 53 years. Margaret Jane their daughter widow of George TODHUNTER died 27<sup>th</sup> Dec 1940 aged 67 years.

On Good Friday afternoon a very sad accident happened on the Pillar Rock, near Ennerdale, and a young man named Thomas Walker, aged 17 years, stepson of Mr J B Hodgson of Catherine Street Whitehaven, lost his life, who was serving his time as a chemist and druggist with Messrs Wilson and Kitchin of Whitehaven. The circumstances are among the most tragic of the numerous incidents of the kind in the annals of Cumberland mountaineering. The immediate vicinity of the Pillar has been most prolific of all the Lake District in fatal accidents of the kind. Only last August it will be remembered that the Rev W A Pope met his death in a similar way on the adjoining mountain, Great Gable. As the foot of Pillar Rock there is a rude monument marking the spot where the body of another clergyman was found four years ago, and it was close to his that young Walker lost his life. Until some few years back the Pillar Rock - which rises precipitously some hundreds of feet out of the side of the mountain of the same name - had been deemed inaccessible, but of late years it has been scaled by several, among whom were the deceased youth, who succeeded in ascending it last summer. According to the evidence given at the inquest, it appeared that five youths, all being about the same age, eighteen to twenty, walked to Ennerdale Lake on Good Friday, from Whitehaven, a distance of ten miles. At the Anglers' Inn they took a boat and rowed to the head of the lake. Leaving the boat here, they started on foot for the Pillar, and notwithstanding that all the fells were covered in snow, in some places to a great depth, determined to ascend it. In addition to the surface snow, they found that underneath this a previous fall had thawed and frozen again, making their feelings very dangerous in many places. They ascended the breast of the hill and were descending on the side from which the Pillar Rock springs, when they saw, in the gully separating the rock from the mountain, two tourists, who subsequently gave their names as Mr Robert Lord, junior, a member of the Alpine Club, and Mr G S Smith, both of Bolton, Lancashire. These had walked over from Wasdale Head from the Black Sail Pass, and intended to make an effort to scale the Pillar Rock. They hailed Walker and his companions to know if they could direct them the best way to make the ascent. Walker, who was in advance of the others, answered, giving some directions, but the gentlemen, not hearing him well, asked him to come a little nearer to them. A few yards below where he stood was a small projecting rock, and Walker said, "I'll slide down to that rock." The snow here was hard and smooth, and sitting down, he commenced to slide down the slope, but whether the surface was more slippery than he expected or he lost his footing, as to which his companions could not say, he did not seize the rock but instead struck it somewhat violently, and was turned on one side by the collision, sliding off on his back at a right angle to the course he had taken. His companions saw him slide or roll with great velocity some fifty yards down the mountain, and then he disappeared over a precipice. They were not previously aware of the existence of this chasm, the snow giving a deceptive appearance to the mountainside below them, but its presence was revealed to them by seeing their young comrade's body fly off the side of the hill into mid air, and then disappear from view. In a state of great excitement they shouted to the two tourists, who did not see the accident, but could hear the "whiz" of the unfortunate youth's body as it shot down the steep slope. The tourists joined the party of lads as quickly as they could and on their advice they started to reach the Ennerdale Valley via the Black Sail Pass, the opposite way to that they had ascended the mountain. Messrs Smith and Lord, who were familiar with that end of the valley, thought this would be the most expeditious route to reach the spot where Walker's body had fallen. The distance was, however, some six miles round, and it was between two and three hours when the party got to the foot of the rock. Here they found they would have to climb again to get to where the body had fallen. One of the lads was so exhausted he did not attempt to go with them, but made his way to Gillerthwaite - the last farm in the Ennerdale Valley - for assistance.

The others, aided by the tourists, who had sometimes to use their ice axes to cut footholds in the snow, reached the place where the body lay. It was found to be terribly mangled. High up above them they could see a projecting rock where the poor lad's head had evidently struck, the rock being besplattered with blood and brains; and thence the body had rolled further down a steep slope, on the white snow of which was a crimson track marking its course only too plainly. As well as they could the party carried the body down

between them and part of the way to Gillerthwaite; but here the tourists, having to return to Wasdale Head, were obliged to leave them. The lads accordingly placed the body on the grass and made their way to Gillerthwaite. On the road they met the assistance that their companion had gone for - two men and a horse, who brought up the body to the farm. After a rest the lads turned to the lake again and rowed down to the inn, reaching it about midnight. They acquainted the police at Ennerdale Bridge of the accident, and then walked home, reaching Whitehaven about four o'clock on Saturday morning, completely exhausted, having walked over forty miles, a considerable part of which was hard climbing. The depth of the precipice over which Walker fell was estimated at 200 to 300 feet, not reckoning the slope.

#### **December 1<sup>st</sup> 1925 Shields Daily News**

The managers of the Galleon Shipping Co. received a telegram this afternoon from the Coastguard Station at Sheringham on the Norfolk coast, advising them that two lifebuoys have been picked up, one at Tremingham and the other at Palling. Each was marked with the SS Galleon's signal letters and the name of the vessel.

Part of a ship's boat which is believed to belong to the Galleon has also been picked up at Tremingham. The steamship Galleon left Blyth last Tuesday for London, with a cargo of coal. The vessel was in command of Captain S H Burton of Tynemouth, and carried a crew of 13 all told.

The Galleon was practically a new vessel, having been built at Selby in 1923 and had a gross registered tonnage of 721. She was owned by the Galleon Shipping Co. whose managers are Messrs Heslop and Robson, of 26 Side, Newcastle.

The journey to London was calculated to take 30 hours, therefore the vessel was considerably overdue. Hopes had been entertained that she had been sheltering owing to the stormy weather, and this idea was strengthened by a telegraphic announcement from Lloyd's Signal Station at Flamborough Head about 6.55 pm on Nov 30, in reply to inquiries which was as follows: -

"Bridlington reports vessel, presumed Galleon, sailed yesterday afternoon, after sheltering in Bridlington Bay."

If that had been the case, the vessel should have arrived at her destination by midnight yesterday, although the bad weather might have delayed her arrival several hours.

A representative of the "Shields Daily News" was informed by the managers this morning that the lifeboat was sent out from Bridlington yesterday to see if they could get in touch with any vessels sheltering there for news of the Galleon but were unsuccessful.

The relatives of the missing men have been in constant communication with the managers hoping for good news, but unfortunately up to the present the whereabouts of the vessel and crew is shrouded in mystery. The majority of the crew belong to North and South Shields, and the lack of definite news is causing great misgivings.

We regret to announce the death of Mr John Huddlestone, wine and spirit merchant, Market Place and King Street, Whitehaven, which took place at St Bees under painful circumstances on Tuesday evening. Mr Huddlestone for a few months past has been residing at the Crescent, St Bees. On Tuesday he was in Whitehaven attending to his business apparently in his usual health and after tea at St Bees he was out for a walk as usual. He was returning about a quarter to nine, and when just on the point of entering his premises he was seen to stagger. Mr H Dixon and Mr George Dixon went to his assistance and supported him, but he died immediately in the arms of the former, an almost life-long friend. Mr Huddlestone was a native of the Gosforth district, but for the greater part of his life he has been in business in Whitehaven and accordingly was one of its oldest tradesmen. He had been in business in the Market Place as a wine and spirit merchant and grocer for about forty years, having two establishments, the Tea Canister and the Wheat Sheaf Inn, while a few years ago he purchased the Exchange Wine and Spirit Stores, King Street. For many years Mr Huddlestone was a member of the old Trustee Board and on the Incorporation of the town he was returned for Harbour Ward, which he continued to represent until the end of the last municipal year, which

also ended his last three years term of office, but for some time before he intimated his intension of retiring, and did not seek re-election. This was his only public office, the duties of which he discharged unobtrusively but none the less efficiently and well. He was essentially a quiet member, a man of action rather than words, and rarely took part in public debate, but whenever he did his utterance was marked by sound common sense, while his business capacity was always exceedingly useful in the administrative work of the Board. He was well-known and highly respected throughout the district, and his sudden death will be received with regret by the wide circle of friends he numbered. It is just forty years last week since he married Miss Forsyth, daughter of the late Mr Forsyth, farmer, Mawbray Farm, St Bees, who, with a son and five daughters, is left to mourn his loss. #### **SUICIDE OF A LOCAL INNKEEPER**

It appears that Mr Huggins, who was 46 years of age, went to bed on Thursday night shortly after eleven o'clock. He, however, came downstairs again about half an hour afterwards, and was spoken to by his daughter, Edith, who asked him where he was going. He replied that he was going for a newspaper. Nothing more was seen of him until about seven o'clock on Friday morning, when his son Fred found him hanging by a cord which had been fastened to a crook in the back kitchen. Mr Huggins was cut down by his son but he had evidently been dead for some time. The inquest was held on Friday afternoon at the Central Hotel, Duke-street, by Mr Gordon Falcon. One of the deceased's daughters deposed that she did not think her father was sober on Thursday evening, and his son stated that deceased had been drinking lately and had been excitable. Dr Harris stated that about two years ago he attended deceased for influenza, when he was almost out of his mind. The jury returned a verdict of "Suicide during temporary insanity."

#### **A NORTHERN AMATEUR OF PROMISE**

Jack Warwick Huggins, the Sunderland outside left forward, has come to the front with a bound, though he is not yet 21 years of age. A native of Cumberland, he commenced his football career with the Whitehaven club, having as a partner on the left wing a Scotchman, who taught him the rudiments of the game. Should that Scotchman read this paragraph, it may please him to know that Huggins feels much indebted to him for the tuition. In the season 1904 -5 Huggins occasionally played for Workington in the Lancashire Combination. A little over a year ago he entered Bede College (Durham) to study for the scholastic profession, and divided his leisure time between "socket" under the auspices of the Leadgate Park (Northern League) club, and the Rugby fixtures of the college. He has not confined himself solely to football, but has figured prominently in other branches of athletics.

When only 18 years of age he assisted Cumberland at cricket, he has twice been successful in minor tennis tournaments, and is a swimmer and a cyclist. The attention of the Wearside officials was drawn to him by his display at Roker in a friendly game with Bede College, and this led to the signing of an amateur form for the club. Four weeks ago he was given a place in the League eleven against Manchester United and so far has more than justified the confidence placed in him.

#### February 20<sup>th</sup> 1873 Whitehaven News

Our obituary of today contains the announcement of the death of Captain George Hughan, one who has been long and favourably known as a master in the Mercantile Marine, sailing out of this port.

Arriving from the Isle of Whithorn, of which he is a native, some 21 years ago, he entered upon the service of the Whitehaven Steam Navigation Company, as mate of the Queen steamer. He remained in that capacity for a short time, and perhaps one of the most memorable voyages ever made by that steamer was made while he was mate. The vessel left Whitehaven for Liverpool, with a large cargo and a great number of passengers, and shortly afterwards it came on to blow a perfect hurricane. The result was that the ship became unmanageable, and was fast drifting ashore in Morecambe Bay. The master lost his self-possession, and fixing on a life buoy, told his passengers and crew to look out for themselves. Some old ship masters, who were on board as passengers, wished to take command, but the mate declined to allow them to do anything of the sort, and ordering the carpenter to cut away the mizzen mast, the stick was soon sent over the side. He then took hold of the wheel and, bringing her round, stern on to the sea, after many hours' steaming, actually backed her into deep water and saved his ship and passengers. The wind moderating afterwards, all arrived safely at their destination. Captain Hughan was afterwards promoted to the command of the Waterwitch, a steamer carrying iron ore down channel; but again returned to the Whitehaven Steam Navigation Company as master of the steamer Whitehaven, perhaps one of the finest boats of the size that ever floated. Whilst in that position, which at that time was one of considerable responsibility, Captain Hughan not only won the esteem of the thousands of passengers that he from time to time carried across the channel, but also the entire confidence of his directors. The Whitehaven was afterwards parted with, and Captain Hughan entered the service of Messrs Bacon of Liverpool, and up till eight years ago was, at different times, commander of the Artizan, Annie Vernon and James Kennedy, large screw steamers carrying iron ore from Whitehaven to Wales &c.

Having by this time acquired some means, Captain Hughan bethought himself of taking leave of the sea, and settling down quietly on shore. This he did by purchasing the Indian King Hotel from Messrs Jefferson, entering upon it shortly afterwards, and remaining there until his death, which melancholy event took place on Tuesday afternoon last. Deceased had been ailing for some time, and had had medical advice, but nothing serious was anticipated. On Tuesday morning, however, whilst sitting at breakfast, he had a severe shock of paralysis, which terminated fatally in a few hours. Deceased was in his 52<sup>nd</sup> year, and has left a widow and six children. He was a man of sterling worth, and respected by all who knew him.

Deceased, however, was not again seen alive and his dead body was found floating in the South Harbour about 8.10 pm by a fisherman named Edward Mulholland and PC 160 (Byrnes) and removed to his home. Deceased was widely known and held in general esteem. For thirty-two years he was the Whitehaven lighthouse keeper and for twenty-nine he had been landlord of the Wellington Inn. He was the eldest son of the late Capt. William Hunter, who for many years sailed the brig Mary Ann out of Whitehaven.

The bride was given away by her father. Her dress was of white satin and brocade, with long tulle veil fastened with pearl pins, the gift of her aunt. She also wore a pearl and diamond brooch, the gift of the bridegroom and was attended by six bridesmaids: - Miss L H Heslop, Church Oakley; Miss Alice Waugh (sister of the bridegroom); Miss Lucy Welby (cousin of the bride), Croft House, Gomersall, Yorkshire; Miss Minnie Miller, Morpeth; Miss L M Helder, and Miss Florence Brockbank. They wore apricot muslin and lace dresses trimmed with ruby velvet with ruby velvet trencher hats, and ruby and apricot satin fans, the gift of the bridegroom. Mr Edward L Waugh, brother of the bridegroom, acted as best man. At three o'clock the bride and bridegroom started for Scotland. The bride's travelling dress consisted of dark brown velvet and serge, with hat to correspond. The wedding presents were numerous and handsome, numbering 133.

A WHITEHAVEN GENTLEMAN DROWNED. The Australian mail received on Monday brought news of the sad death of Mr Bryan Walter l'Anson, son of Dr. l'Anson, of Whitehaven. The deceased gentleman, who was 33 years of age, emigrated to the Mildura irrigation colony on the banks of the great Australian river Murray four years ago. On stopping work at noon on September 27<sup>th</sup> he turned his horse out to feed as usual, and in the afternoon was seen by a tradesman in the township three miles away, but all trace of him was then lost for ten days, when his body was found on the shore of a small lake, between two and three miles from the deceased's residence. The identification was with difficulty made by his friend Mr Geo. Pickering. In the afternoon an inquest was held, and the jury returned an open verdict. Immediately after the inquest the body was interred in the Church of England portion of the local cemetery, the Rev. T. Tapley Short conducting the service. Mr. G. Pickering and Mr. J. Baylee, two friends of the deceased, were present as mourners. The deceased, who was of a retiring disposition, was popular in local musical circles, and in the early portion of his residence in Mildura officiated as organist at the Anglican Church, with Mr. F. Flee wood, a member of a noted Lancashire family, as choirmaster.

**THE DROWNING OF A WHITEHAVEN GENTLEMAN** Subsequent to the inquest on the body of Mr Bryan Walter l'Anson, son of Dr. l'Anson, of Whitehaven, the particulars of whose sad death at Mildura, Australia, were published a few weeks ago, a statement was made which afforded a clue as to the way in which the deceased gentleman met his death. On the evening of the day on which Mr. l'Anson was last seen alive a woodcutter working near the lake heard several loud "cooees" at intervals, and he walked down to the shore to get his boat to go to the assistance of the person who seemed to be calling for help from the other side. He was unable to find his boat, and, as the "cooees" ceased, he concluded they were signals from someone who had temporarily lost his way. The finding of the body 10 days later recalled the circumstances to his mind, and his theory is that Mr l'Anson had gone out on the lake in a small dingy, that the boat swamped, and Mr. l'Anson, climbed a tree in the water, called from there, but finding no assistance forthcoming, took off his clothes and unsuccessfully attempted to swim ashore. Mr. l'Anson's clothes could not be found, and this fact supports the woodcutter's theory.

Dr Thomas Francis l'Anson MD, JP, who has just died at his residence in Irish Street, Whitehaven, at the age of seventy-three, was one of the leading medical practitioners in Cumberland, and a well known public man throughout the counties of Cumberland and Westmorland. Son of Mr John l'Anson of Hawkswell, Yorkshire, he was born in 1825 and studied at St George's Hospital and on the Continent, being admitted a member of the Royal College of Surgeons England, and a Licentiate of the Society of Apothecaries in 1846. Two years later he took the MD degree at King's College, Aberdeen and, after a lapse of 20 years, late of licentiate of the Royal College of Physicians, London. He was formerly surgeon to the Royal Cumberland Militia, and he was perpetual Vice President of the Cumberland and Westmorland branch of the British Medical Association, and consulting surgeon of the Whitehaven and West Cumberland Infirmary. He had contributed various papers to the professional journals and he was the author of a "Resume of the Progress of Medicine, 1858-69" Dr l'Anson, who was a FRHS and a magistrate for Cumberland, married in 1850 Arabella, daughter of Mr William Welby of Muskham, Notts.

Early on Monday morning Dr James Ross Irwin, one of the medical officers of the Whitehaven Union, died at his residence in Irish Street, Whitehaven. The cause of death was typhus fever, now very prevalent in Whitehaven, and which Dr Irwin contracted while attending one of his patients who was suffering from the disease. Dr Irwin was a native of County Derry and was a fine-looking, stalwart man. He was educated at Belfast, and qualified for his profession at Edinburgh. Ten or a dozen years ago he came to Cumberland as assistant to Dr Speirs of Cleator, and while occupying that position he became a member of the Arlecdon and Frizington Local Board. Five or six years ago he was appointed medical officer to the Whitehaven district of the Whitehaven Union, and then removed to Whitehaven. Dr Irwin was a hard-working and conscientious medical man and was greatly esteemed by the members of his own profession, as well as greatly respected in Whitehaven generally. He was an elder of the Whitehaven (Market Place) Presbyterian Church, and took considerable interest in the affairs of that community. Dr Irwin who was 35 years of age, leaves a widow but no family.

It is our duty this week to record the death of Mr George Jackson, of Vale View, Whitehaven, a well-known and esteemed resident in the town. Mr Jackson was born at Ambleside and was apprenticed to and learnt the business of a mason. In 1844, however, Mr Jackson came to Whitehaven and having inherited some money from an uncle, he went to Messrs Randalson and Foster to obtain some insight into business with the intention of embarking in trade on his own account. After remaining with this firm for some short time, he commenced business in the tobacco trade in King Street. For four years, as Mr Jackson stated in after years on the occasion of giving a supper to his numerous employees, it was a doubtful question with him whether his venture would be successful or the reverse, but eventually he firmly established himself in the trade. After remaining in King Street for some years, Mr Jackson purchased extensive premises in Tangier Street, where he carried on a very successful and growing business in the wholesale tobacco trade. In 1867 Mr Jackson took into partnership with him Mr W Dalzell and Mr Gill and the firm of "George Jackson and Company" as it was styled, soon became widely known, a very large business indeed being carried on by the firm. About nine years ago Mr Jackson was seized with a paralytic stroke, which deprived him entirely of the use of one side, and he then severed his connection with the business. Seven years later Mr Gill, who resides at Keswick, also withdrew from the firm, since which time it has been carried on solely by the remaining partner, Mr Dalzell. In politics Mr Jackson was a robust Liberal, but, while taking a keen interest in all political matters, he did not take any prominent public part in promoting the cause he advocated, though he occasionally spoke at Liberal gatherings, possibly, however, more from a sense of duty than from inclination, as his habits were of a sober, steady and retiring character. In politics Mr Jackson took no part whatever, so far as we can ascertain. The deceased gentleman was a prominent member of the Whitehaven Congregational Church, of which he was a deacon for many years. He subscribed very munificently towards the fund raised for the erection of the present church, and subsequently towards clearing off the debt upon the building. He was likewise a generous subscriber to the Cumberland Congregational Union, and some two or three years ago he presented to the Whitehaven church a very handsome organ as a memorial of his daughter (an only child) who died some four years ago. In addition to being partly paralysed, Mr Jackson also suffered from heart disease, to which he succumbed very suddenly on Sunday evening. During the day the deceased gentleman was apparently in his usual health, being out walking in the fields near his residence, but in the evening he was seized, and quietly and peacefully expired. He was in his 71<sup>st</sup> year. The deceased gentleman married a Miss Brockbank of Whitehaven, by whom he had one child, a daughter, who predeceased him, as already stated, some four years ago. Mrs Jackson survives her husband.

It is with great regret that we have to announce the death of Mr John Jackson, of Hensingham House, Hensingham. Mr Jackson expired at his residence on Sunday afternoon last. For some time past he had been in delicate health having caught a cold last year that could not be shaken off, but up to a comparatively recent period he continued to take interest and attend to his many public and private appointments. A short time ago he went to Bath, but his visit to that health resort did not prove as beneficial to him as was expected, and since his return he had been confined to his house. Deceased, who was 68 years of age, was one of the most prominent public men in Whitehaven, and his loss is a severe blow not only to many public institutions, but he will also be missed in connection with charitable and other institutions throughout the town. Mr Jackson leaves a widow and two sons. He was the eldest son of Mr William Jackson, timber merchant and ship owner, of Whitehaven, and was born on October 9<sup>th</sup> 1828. He was educated partly at St Bees Grammar School, and partly at a private academy at Douglas, and on the death of his father in 1852, he succeeded to the timber business in partnership with his younger brother. In May 1859 he married the youngest daughter of the late Mr John Hetherington of Lamplugh Hall, by whom he had two sons, William Herbert and John Arthur, and two daughters. The latter, however, are both dead. On the death of Mr Jackson, however, in 1870, Mr T. Jackson, a younger brother, was admitted a partner in the firm, and Mr J. A. Jackson was also added to the partnership in 1889, his brother, Mr Herbert Jackson following the legal profession. For a considerable number of years Mr John Jackson took a leading part in the public affairs in the town. For many years he was a member of the Whitehaven Town and Harbour Trust, and as chairman of the Harbour Committee rendered most efficient service. On the 7<sup>th</sup> of June 1861, Mr Jackson became one of Lord Lonsdale's nominees on the Trustee Board; and on the 9<sup>th</sup> of September 1867 he was appointed as an elected Trustee on the same Board in the place of Mr John Moore who had resigned office. In 1884, at the end of his three years of service, he retired in rotation and did not offer himself for re-education. When the town was incorporated and the Board of Commissioners appointed in 1894, Mr John Jackson was appointed chairman of the Harbour Commissioners, a post which he held up to the time of his death, and to which he had recently been by unanimous vote re-appointed. He was one of the promoters and first directors of the Whitehaven Iron Shipbuilding Company; he was also a director of the Whitehaven Cab and Posting Company; one of the founders of the Whitehaven Public Baths, of which Company he was chairman; a director of the Whitehaven Cocoa and Coffee House Company; chairman of the Whitehaven Gas Company; a vice-president and chairman of the Committee of the West Cumberland Infirmary; a trustee of the Whitehaven Savings Bank; president of the Whitehaven Young Men's Christian Association; a trustee and treasurer of St James' National Schools, St James' Infant School, and the Refuge Day and Sunday Schools; and he was also a trustee of Piper's Marine School. Mr Jackson was elected unopposed in 1892 to represent

the St Bees district on the Cumberland County Council. In politics Mr Jackson was a staunch Conservative; he was a vice-president of the Whitehaven, Hensingham and Egremont Division Conservative Associations. He was a Churchman, and until 1879, the year he gave up his residence in Whitehaven, he held office at St James' Church, almost without a break, during the incumbencies of the Revs J. Robinson, C.A. Perring, T.R. Holme, J.B. Dalton and D M'Leod, and when Mr Jackson left the parish he purchased and afterwards presented to it the old Baptist Chapel which has since been used as a mission church connected with St James'. Deceased took a great interest in educational matters, especially in regard to the maintenance of voluntary schools. He was especially well-known in connection with the Refuge Sunday School, and several years ago he rendered valuable assistance in connection with a night school in St James' parish. His aim throughout life appeared to be to improve as much as lay in his power the social and spiritual welfare of his fellow men, and to help forward the interests of the town and neighbourhood. After Mr Jackson's death on Sunday the flags on the Town Hall, the Harbour Office, the Baths, the Gas Company's Office, Cab Stables, the Infirmary, and other public buildings and shipping were flying half-mast as a mark of respect to the deceased.

An old and esteemed townsman passed away on Monday morning in the person of Mr Robert Jackson, joiner, of Fox Lane. For many years Mr Jackson had suffered from paralysis of the muscles, but was able to get about until as recently as last week, and only took to his bed on Friday. The deceased, who was born near Millom, and served his time with the late Mr Kitchin, joiner, of Holmrook, came to Whitehaven about 35 years ago. He was with the late Mr William Cain, joiner, for some years, and afterwards succeeded to the business. Mr Jackson was an old volunteer, having been a member of the Rifle Corps for something like a quarter of a century, being for many years a colour-sergeant. Some years ago he was awarded the long service medal. The deceased was one of the best marksmen West Cumberland has produced, winning many prizes both for battalion and company shooting, while he was also successful on several occasions at Wimbledon. He also took part in other shooting competitions in Cumberland and Westmorland, with conspicuous success. Mr Jackson was fond of all outdoor sports and before his health broke down was one of the most active and prominent members of the Bowling Club. Afterwards he still continued to take a warm interest in the doings of the club, and during the fine weather was frequently to be seen at the green, watching the play. He was a genial and a kindly disposed man, and his hosts of friends will hear of his death with deep regret. Mr Jackson, who was 61 years of age, leaves a widow and two sons and two daughters.

Wm Lumb, Esq., coroner, held an inquest on Monday at the house of Mr Gilliat, Duke-street, on view of the body of Mrs Sarah Jackson, 69, a widow, who had resided in George-street. It was shown by the evidence that deceased lived alone and that on Saturday night last a nephew of hers had left Whitehaven by steamer for Liverpool. About half past six o'clock on that evening she was seen by a witness going down the North Wall, and from her having asked if the Liverpool steamer had passed, it seems probably that she intended going to the end of the pier to see the steamer off. About half past seven on the same evening, PC Howard, from information received, went on to the north sands and found the body of deceased washed up; he conveyed it to the house of Mr Worthington, Old Crown, George-street, and it was subsequently removed to the Police Station. The deceased not being known, Supt. Little caused notices to be posted of the finding

of the body. On Saturday night deceased's son, who is in the employ of Mr Ainsworth at Cleator, missed his mother, and on Sunday morning, after searching for her at the chapel she attended, and at other places, he chanced to see the notice and at once proceeded to the Police Station and identified the body. A verdict of accidentally drowned was returned.

It is with deep regret we notice the demise of our old and much-respected townsman, Mr Thomas Jackson, formerly corn merchant and manure manufacturer, which event took place at his residence, Belgrave-road, St John's Wood, London, on Tuesday last. Mr Jackson had successfully carried on business in Whitehaven for upwards of 30 years (having been succeeded by Mr Towerson) and was well known throughout a wide district for his integrity and business habits. For the last five years, during which he suffered from paralysis, he had resided in London. Although not a prominent public man, Mr Jackson nevertheless, during his residence amongst us, took great interest in everything calculated to benefit our town and trade. He was for many years a director of the Whitehaven Joint Stock Bank, a member of the Whitehaven Turnpike Trust and one of the Commissioners of Income Tax. The deceased at the time of his death was 59 years of age, and was unmarried. His remains are intended to be removed to Whitehaven; and the interment, we understand, will take place on Saturday next at the Cemetery, the funeral cortege proceeding from the Black Lion Hotel, King-street, at ten o'clock in the forenoon.

Thomas JACKSON fell asleep Good Friday 1896. And Mary his wife died 27<sup>th</sup> August 1922.

We regret to announce the death of Mr T Jackson of Dell Croft, Whitehaven, which took place on Friday morning, after a very brief illness, and created widespread regret. Mr Jackson was pursuing his business up to within a very short time of his death, and only a week before he took part in an adjourned meeting of the subscribers to the Playground, when he resigned his position as honorary secretary, after a term of service extending over twenty years, and only a day or two after he had a run with the Cumberland Foxhounds. Mr Jackson had suffered from kidney complaint for some time, with periodic attacks of the disease, and having caught a cold, he fell ill on Wednesday. There was nothing apparently to indicate the gravity of the illness or to cause any apprehension, and almost without warning of the approaching end, he passed quietly away about seven o'clock on Friday morning. Mr Jackson was a son of the late Mr William Jackson of the firm of Messrs J and W Jackson, timber merchants, Whitehaven, and the younger brother of Mr John Jackson of Hensingham House, the present head of the firm. In his youth and early manhood Mr T Jackson spent a considerable time in South America, being engaged in commercial pursuits at Buenos Ayres. Returning to England he entered the business of the firm, and in 1874 he became a partner with his brother. Maryport was added to the business as an importing centre about 1889, and since then Mr T Jackson has taken an active part in the supervision of the firm's operations there. Mr Jackson was a keen sportsman and equally well known both in the cricket and hunting field. He had not taken any active part in cricket for some time, save an occasional match, but for many years when the Whitehaven club occupied a much higher position in the cricketing world than at present, he was one of the best players in the team. He was a clever bat and an excellent field. Although he took no active part in the team, he was as keenly interested in its welfare as ever, as indeed he was in all that pertained to the interests of the Ground to which he had devoted twenty years of active and appreciated service. He was also a good supporter of the Whitehaven Athletic Sports, but took no part in public affairs. Mr Jackson leaves a widow but no children. He was 58 years of age.

The very sudden death announced at Whitehaven of Mr Henry Montagu James, the managing director of the Whitehaven Colliery Company. Mr. James was well-known in the North of England and Northern Ireland coal trade, and had served as chairman the Cumberland Coalowners' Association and of the Conciliation Board, in which capacities his services were most highly valued. Mr. James was brought into Cumberland by the Mr William Fletcher, ex-M.P. for Cockermouth, and chairman of the Cumberland County Council, as his partner, on his opening the Moresby coalfield. When Sir James Bain and his friends leased the extensive Whitehaven Collieries from the Earl of Lonsdale, Mr. James became general manager, and under his control the mines have been largely developed. On the occurrence of the Wellington Pit disaster Mr. James received a severe shock, the effects of which he never really threw off. He was a very popular employer, while in Whitehaven he was held in high esteem. He was not fond of public life, although he served as the first chairman of the Moresby School Board, was an original member of the Whitehaven Town Council, but

business claims compelled him to withdraw from Municipal life. He represented the Lord of the Manor on the Whitehaven Harbour Board, and was a past president of the Whitehaven Scientific Association. A devoted Churchman, he took especially interest in the musical part of the services, and was a generous supporter of Church funds. He was Conservative in politics. Mr. James, who was unmarried, was about 77 years of age.

The awfully sudden death of Mr John Jenkins of Keekle Grove, manager for Mr John Stirling, created a painful shock to the residents of West Cumberland on Monday last. On Sunday Mr Jenkins attended both the morning and evening services at the Presbyterian Church, Cleator Moor, and on the previous Thursday he took part in meetings at Whitehaven, when it was remarked how well he appeared. On Sunday night he was taken suddenly ill and shortly before Dr Eaton arrived, death had resulted from syncope. Dr Eaton, who was Mr Jenkin's medical attendant, had for some considerable time prescribed for him for heart disease. Deceased, who was most popular not only with his workers but every one whom he was thrown in contact with, and they were very many, will be greatly missed at Cleator Moor. It is only two or three weeks since, at the meeting of the Cleator Moor District Council, he spoke in most sympathetic terms of the death of a

valuable colleague, Mr Kirkconel, who had been associated with him in public work on the Moor as long as we can remember.

The greatest sympathy is felt for the widow and family. Mr Jenkins, who was 66 years of age, was a native of Bannockburn, and came into the district 50 years ago when he entered the services of Threapthwaite Coal Company, and went from there to Cleator as a clerk in the employ of Mr Ainsworth. Next he entered the service of Mr John Stirling at Knockmurton, and for over a quarter of a century he acted as agent for Mr Stirling at the Montreal Mines, Cleator Moor.

He, like the late Mr Kirkconel and the late Dr Speirs, took an active interest in the public affairs of the district. He was elected a member of the Local Board in 1871, and has been on the Board continuously since that time. He was one of the retiring members, and had been nominated again. He was a member of the Whitehaven Guardians, and had also been an overseer of the parish since 1887. He was a very popular and straightforward man, and will be much missed at Cleator Moor. He was an elder of the Presbyterian Church, Cleator Moor, and the principal supporter of that church since it was established. In politics he was a Conservative, and a vice-president of the local Conservative Club. He leaves a widow and a family of three sons and three daughters to mourn his loss. The circumstances of his death were reported to Mr Webster, coroner for the Egremont Division, but he did not deem an inquest necessary.

We regret to record the death of Mr W. C. Johns, the superintendent of stores for the Whitehaven Colliery Company, which took place yesterday (Friday) morning at his residence, George Street, Whitehaven, after a short illness. Last Tuesday week Mr Johns went on business to Aikbank Farm, and was caught in the heavy rain, and as the result of the wetting, it is stated, contracted a chill. Pneumonia afterwards set in and to this Mr Johns succumbed. The news of his death was yesterday received with profound regret by those who knew him, for he was greatly esteemed by a large circle of friends and acquaintances. He leaves a widow and large family (nine girls and one boy) for whom the utmost sympathy is felt in their sad bereavement. Deceased, who was about 49 years of age, was a native of Cornwall, who had resided in this part of the country for many years. For some time he was in the employ of Lord Muncaster at Muncaster Castle, where he had charge of the large gardens. Leaving there about the year 1875, he entered the service of the Earl of Lonsdale, succeeding Mr McManus, superintendent of stores at the Granary Yard. This was during Mr R. F. Martin's agency in respect of the Whitehaven Colliery, and he continued in that capacity from that period until Lord Lonsdale leased the colliery in 1883, after which he entered the employ of the Whitehaven Colliery

Company, and has remained ever since in their service as superintendent of stores. He was very much liked, his affability of manner endearing him to all who had either business or social relations with him. He was a man possessed of extensive knowledge as regards the value of stores and goods which are used at the collieries, and his opinion was regarded by engineers and colliery managers as being very valuable indeed. He took a great interest in horticultural matters, and was secretary to the Whitehaven Horticultural Society, in succession to Mr Bewlay, and the success of the last annual exhibition in the Granary Yard was in a great measure due to his untiring efforts. Deceased, who was a staunch Conservative, had been a member of the General and Finance Committees of the Whitehaven Conservative Association for many years, and during his career had taken part in many political contests in the borough of Whitehaven and also in the county divisions of Cumberland. He was also a prominent Freemason and belonged to Lodge 119, of which he was a Past Master. He was a provincial officer for Westmorland and Cumberland. He evinced considerable interest in the Whitehaven cricket field and bowling green, and was a member of the Athletic Committee, on several occasions doing duty as an official at the annual sports. Deceased was gifted with a capital voice, and was a musician of no mean order, and he frequently gave his services in the past on behalf of many charitable and worthy objects. Under the old management of the Whitehaven Colliery he will be remembered as a notable figure at the annual "Goat" suppers which were then held, and at which he not only had much to do with the arrangements, but also contributed greatly to the success of the evening's entertainment. Deceased formerly lived in the Granary Yard, but removed to George Street when the house he occupied was required by Lord Lonsdale's estate department and for the yeomanry staff. The late Mr Johns was selected for the stores department at the Granary Yard out of many applicants by the late Mr Martin, the mining agent for Lord Lonsdale's Whitehaven Colliery and his West Cumberland royalties. It is a matter of extreme regret that the deceased's career should have cut short in the prime of life. Deceased was brother-in-law of the late Mr G Starkey, who died a short time ago.

A man in his prime – he was about 46 years of age, who hitherto had enjoyed excellent health, he was struck down on Thursday with appendicitis, and passed away shortly after noon yesterday. The news of the sad occurrence was received with sincere regret by all who knew him, and the greatest sympathy goes out to his widow and family of five children. He was a man who displayed sterling qualities both in business and private life, and his upright dealings, his kind and sympathetic disposition, and his quiet and unassuming manner combined to make him one of the most respected residents and tradesmen in Whitehaven. In his business as a grocer and confectioner he proved, by his steady, hard work and perseverance, very successful, and at the time of his death had several shops in Whitehaven, as well as in other parts of the district, including Maryport, Workington and Parton. Being of a retiring nature he took no active part in public affairs and in this respect, therefore, did not follow in the steps of his father, Mr James Kennedy of Quality Corner, who for some years was a member of the Whitehaven Town Council. Mr Kennedy was associated with the meeting of Christians in Sandhills Lane, and held office in the Assembly. Here he was held in high esteem by his fellow workers in religious life, and will be greatly missed by all attending that place of worship. The funeral will take place on Friday.

Mr Kitchin had been seriously ill for some months past, and the announcement of his death caused general regret in the town, where he was well known, and to which he had in many ways during a long term of years rendered valuable service. He was the son of the late Mr William Kitchin, who with the late Mr William Wilson founded the well-known firm of Wilson and Kitchin, chemists and druggists and drysalts, King Street, Whitehaven. On leaving school Mr Archibald Kitchin was apprenticed to his father's business, in which he had a distinguished career. He was devoted to chemistry, and in its analytical branches he gained a wide reputation, enjoying for many years a practice which only a man of exceptional ability could command. He was a Fellow of the Institute of Chemistry, and also a Fellow of the Chemical Society. Upon the retirement of Mr Wilson, the deceased gentleman's father took him and



his brother, Mr W. H. Kitchin, J.P., into partnership, and since their father's death the brothers have carried on the business. Mr A Kitchin was of a retiring disposition, and accordingly as a public man he was not so prominent as many of those who take an active part in debate. Whenever he felt called upon, his opinions, based upon wide and practical experience, were always to the point and convincing. He was a member of the Town Council and Harbour Commissioners from the time was incorporated until a few years ago, when he and his brother retired almost simultaneously. The deceased gentleman, who represented Trinity Ward, rendered excellent service in an administrative capacity especially in regard to electric lighting, in regard to which he was quite an expert. The Scientific Association, of which he was a member from its inception, has lost a learned and valuable supporter. He was a past president of the Association, and throughout was ardently devoted to its interests, having frequently lectured at the Rooms. While yet the sudden death of Mr John Whittle in London was still fresh in the minds of the people of Whitehaven, it became known that Mr William Kitchin, another of our trustees, and also one of the oldest tradesmen in the town, had breathed his last. Mr Kitchin had been suffering from heart disease for some twelve months – in fact, had been failing for a few years – and his death had been anticipated by his friends for some time. Mr Kitchin had been a member of the Whitehaven Trustee Board since the adoption of the new Act of Parliament in 1859, when he was one of the successful candidates for St James's ward, and retained his seat from that time till his death. He was born at Cleator, his father being in business there, but afterwards came to Whitehaven where he carried on a successful business for upwards of 36 years. Mr

Kitchin, although one of the trustees of the town, never took any active part in public affairs; he was of a retiring, unobtrusive character, and of a very benevolent disposition.

We have this week to record the death of Mr William Kitchin, who expired at his residence in Irish-street, Whitehaven, on Thursday afternoon, having reached the ripe age of 80 years. Mr Kitchin was a native of Whitehaven, and served an apprenticeship with Messrs Randleson and Foster, chemists and druggists. He afterwards joined the late Mr Wm. Wilson, who had been a clerk with the same firm, on establishing the business of Wilson and Kitchin, which has been carried on upon an extensive basis for the past fifty years. the business is still carried on by Mr W. H. Kitchin and Mr Archibald Kitchin. The eldest daughter of Mr Kitchin married Dr Bowes, of Herne Bay, the younger brother of Mr Bowes of the Clydesdale Bank, Workington, and his second daughter is the widow of the late Mr John S. M'Gowan. Mr Kitchin married for his first wife the daughter of the Rev Archibald Jack, Congregational minister, of Whitehaven, by whom he had four sons and two daughters, four of whom survive. He afterwards married Miss Hunter, who pre-deceased him by a few years. Mr Kitchin took comparatively little interest in public life, being of a retiring disposition. He was, however, a member of the Whitehaven Trustee Board for about fifteen years, resigning some five years ago. He was also on the committee of the Whitehaven Infirmary, and likewise a trustee of the Whitehaven Savings Bank. Mr Kitchin until a few years ago was a prominent member and deacon of the Whitehaven Congregational Church, in which he took a considerable amount of interest during the greater part of his life. For the past three or four years Mr Kitchin has been entirely unfitted for business, and his existence, as we have stated, was peacefully terminated on Thursday afternoon.

Mr Joel Abraham Knight of Woodbank, Whitehaven, a gentleman well known and respected in this district for his labours in connection with religious and benevolent institutions, died on Thursday at the age of 76.

He was for some years secretary to the Whitehaven and West Cumberland Infirmary, but was obliged to give this up on account of failing health, but since resigning he was on the committee of the institution and was a very valuable member. Recently Mr Knight, who was a widower without family, resided with Mr Joseph Sibson at Woodbank. On Sunday week he attended service at the Presbyterian Church, but in the early part of the following week there were signs that his strength was giving way. On Thursday morning Mrs Sibson found him in an unconscious state, and sent for his niece, Mrs J R Thompson, of High Street. He did not regain consciousness and expired in bed soon afterwards. Mr Knight was born in London and educated at St Paul's School. He was in business in Kendal and Manchester up to 1863, when he retired. He married Miss Catherine Fox, daughter of Captain Henry Fox. In consequence of failing health he resided for above two years near Keswick and afterwards came to Woodbank. His wife died about six years ago. Mr Knight took great interest and an active part in Sunday School Work in Manchester and Whitehaven, and was for several years connected with the Senhouse-street Sunday School. He was treasurer of the Town Mission, and of the Benevolent Society, and secretary to the British and Foreign Bible Society, and also took great interest in the charitable institutions in the town. The mortal remains of Mr Knight were interred on Saturday at the Whitehaven cemetery, the funeral service being conducted by the Rev A W M'Dougall, Presbyterian minister.

It appears that after leaving work on Thursday afternoon, the deceased went to the Auction Mart in the hope of getting some employment, as he had been in the habit of doing in market days. He was engaged by Mr Oliver Hodgson, butcher, Whitehaven, to drive two cows to Mr Jonathan Stalker's farm at Demesne. All went well until the beasts diverged from the highway near the cemetery, and crossing the Croft Pit tramway, they got into the brickworks. Knowles was attempting to drive them back the same way and while upon the line the second time he saw the waggons coming down. In his anxiety to save the animals he was caught by the waggons and shockingly mutilated. . .

On Friday last an accident, which unfortunately had a fatal termination, happened on the Furness Railway, not far from Green Road Station. It appears that Mr Joseph Leeson, a young man residing in Hugh Street, Bransty, whilst following his vocation as a stoker, had occasion, through the temporary absence of the guard, to go and uncouple two trucks which had to be shunted at Green Road. For this purpose, the young man, who was most reliable and expert at the job, preferred to do the work by hand, in preference to using the "Shunting stick" which is provided for that purpose. He therefore went along the top, and on arriving at the place where his services were required, laid down full length on the sheet which covered the track, in order the more safely to perform the task he had undertaken. He had succeeded, and gave the signal to the driver to move on, when for some cause or other, unexplainable, he fell off, and when next seen by the driver he was lying on the line, the trucks having gone over his thigh. He was at once picked up and placed on the engine and conveyed to the Barrow infirmary, but owing to the great loss of blood he expired shortly after reaching that institution. When the melancholy tidings reached Whitehaven in the afternoon, quite a gloom rested over the neighbourhood, particularly so where he resided. Mr Leeson was a particularly steady young man, respected and beloved by everyone who had the pleasure of his acquaintance. He was of a very quiet and retiring disposition, and his leisure moments were spent in the perusal of works of an ennobling character, which rendered him a pleasing companion. The deceased was 26 years of age, his birthday having been the one preceding that on which the accident happened. The deepest sympathy is felt and expressed for his widowed mother and brother and sisters in their sad bereavement, the father having been buried just twelve months ago, after a long illness, and deceased had been since that time her main support.

Painfully Sudden Death at Whitehaven

On Thursday evening the death took place, with painful suddenness, of Mr Barnabas Lowndes, a well-known Whitehaven resident. Mr Lowndes, who resided in Commodore Street, Bransty, had a garden at the side of the New Road, and he was engaged there during the afternoon, putting in a new mould. After partaking of a hearty tea he returned to the garden to the purpose of "sweeping up," and while thus engaged he had a seizure which proved to be fatal. He fell prostrate on the ground, and a little girl, who first saw him lying there, raised an alarm. Mr Lowndes expired a few minutes later, death taking place shortly before six o'clock. Mr Lowndes, who was much respected throughout the town, came to Whitehaven from Dudley Port, Staffordshire, about 32 years ago, to take up the position of stationmaster at Bransty Station, where he remained for eleven years. He then retired from railway service, being succeeded at Bransty Station by Mr Richardson. Mr Lowndes was very active despite his advanced age, and as recently as Monday, by his prompt and timely action, prevented what might have been a serious accident on Bransty. It appears that some horses, which had arrived by the Isle of Man boat, became startled at the bottom of Brandy Brow, and three of them turned up the Sea View Road. Mr Lowndes happened to be present, and succeeded in turning the runaway animals up the road towards Bransty. Had the horses gone on in the direction they were pursuing they would have inevitably fallen down some steps on to the New Road, and either been killed or seriously injured. Mr Lowndes, who was 70 years of age, leaves a widow and grown-up family of three daughters and a son.

Lucas was injured whilst following his employment on Tuesday, and died at the infirmary on Wednesday. James Bertram Matthewson, of Wallsend, said deceased had lodged with him for six weeks. On Tuesday evening witness was informed that deceased had been injured, and proceeded to Newcastle Infirmary. Deceased told witness he had been crushed under a fall of stone. A shot firer named Barnes deposed that on June 2<sup>nd</sup> he commenced work at the Rising Sun Pit. He was shot-firing when deceased came down the pit about three o'clock. Witness visited the spot where deceased was hewing about 4pm, and found it to be quite safe. He then fired two shots and on re-examining the place it again "jowled" solidly. Soon after Lucas was buried under a fall of stone whilst engaged getting coal away. He was brought to bank as speedily as possible and conveyed to the infirmary.

For nearly 40 years Mr Lumb held the responsible office of chief agent to the Earl of Lonsdale, an office the functions of which he discharged to the eminent satisfaction of his lord and not less to the satisfaction of the public and the tenantry – so much so that, on his retirement in 1861, he was presented with a subscription testimonial, worth 200 guineas, consisting of a massive vase and a pair of silver salvers; and on the same occasion the officers of the Whitehaven Colliery made a beautiful presentation to Mrs Lumb. Mr Lumb was one of the founders and first Directors of the prosperous Whitehaven Joint Stock Bank; he was a promoter of the Whitehaven Junction and Whitehaven and Furness Railways, for many years a Director of both, and vice-chairman of the latter; he was for some time chairman of the Whitehaven Board of Guardians; for thirty-four years a trustee

of the Town and Harbour, and a number of years chairman of the Trustee Board: and a magistrate, a Deputy-Lieutenant of the County and chairman of the Whitehaven Petty Sessions. It need not be said that he was an excellent man of business; and his social qualities were such as to make his memory very dear to his friends.

**Joseph Burrell, soldier in the Coldstream Regiment of Guards, at present recruiting in this town, was brought up on remand from Thursday for re-examination upon a charge of feloniously assaulting Elizabeth Madders Mr Paitson attended as before to conduct the prosecution; the prisoner was not assisted by any legal adviser.**

**The complainant having been sworn again, deposed that she was 37 years of age and was the wife of Thomas Madders, who kept a tavern in Mark Lane in this town. On Thursday the 9<sup>th</sup> instant her husband went to Liverpool to attend the funeral of his sister, and as there was no one there left at the house but the prisoner who was billeted there, the complainant and her two children, a brother of the complainant agreed to stay with them during her husband's absence. The following day, however, the brother quarrelled with her and went away declaring that he would not come back. This was on Friday night, and the prisoner had previously gone to bed. The complainant after the lapse of half an hour, with her clothes on laid down on a sofa in the sitting room on the first floor, leaving the gas burning in the room. The prisoner occupied a bed in the room above. The complainant fell asleep but was some time afterwards partly aroused by something touching, as she thought, her pocket. She did not see anything and accordingly went to sleep again. A short space of time elapsed when she was again awoke and found the gas had been put out, and the prisoner, who was undressed, was perpetrating the felony with which he is now charged. The complainant resisted but the**

prisoner completed his purpose. On getting away from him, she threw up the window, and called, "Murder, police," and Police Constable Brown came up. The complainant went downstairs and having opened the door told him what had occurred. The prisoner had followed her down stairs and in hearing of the police constable said if she had any charge against him she had better make it, upon which she replied that he must either go away or return to his bed. She declined to give the prisoner in charge until she had seen Superintendent Clarke about the affair. A man named Sewell was sent for and remained in the house with her until 7 o'clock next morning when the complainant became so ill that an acquaintance named Jane Gillman was required to come and attend to the business of the house. To both Sewell and Gillman she stated what had occurred to her. The husband returned home on the following Sunday morning and the next day prisoner was given into custody. The complainant declared that she was quite sober at the time as she had not tasted intoxicating liquor during the whole of the day...

Dr l'Anson proved that he had been called in to attend the complainant professionally, and found her in a state of great distress and much excitement. She was suffering under the symptoms of premature labour, but these subsided in a day or two. There must have been some strong and exciting cause to bring on such symptoms, and the abuse she stated to him was exceedingly likely to have produced them. He had examined the complainant's person but had not discovered any marks of violence... the depositions were then taken and the prisoner was fully committed to Carlisle gaol to take his trial for the felony at the ensuing Assizes.

In our obituary this day will be found recorded the death of Mrs Madders, wife of Mr Thomas Madders, publican, of Mark-lane, Whitehaven, who, our readers will perhaps remember, lately preferred a charge of rape against a private in the Coldstream guards, who was billeted in her house, and which took place during her husband's absence at the interment of his sister in Liverpool. Mrs Madders was advanced in pregnancy at the time of the unfortunate occurrence, from which she was afterwards subject to much suffering. The offender was committed by the magistrates at Whitehaven at the time and is now a prisoner in the County gaol awaiting his trial.

Sarah MADGIN 1831 – 1899. Better known as Sal Madge. A colliery surface worker. Most popular of well known characters in nineteenth century Whitehaven. Original memorial erected by Friends of Whitehaven Museum in 1993 was vandalised and kindly replaced in 2012 by Robertson Memorials Whitehaven.

The death took place on Friday last of Sal Madge, a Whitehaven worthy, who was well known throughout the Western part of the county if indeed her peculiar figure and her eccentricity were not known over a wider area. Sal had been a remarkably strong woman all her life up to a few months ago when increasing age and an attack of bronchitis began to tell upon her. She fought pluckily against her illness, indeed Sal was endowed with more of this quality than most of her sex, and in spite of her weakness she persisted in following her work at Wellington Pit. This was not at all arduous. She had worked hard all her life at the Collieries and when she was no longer able to crack her whip and drive her horse at the pit, the management very considerably found her work of a very easy kind. She attended the pit up to within a few days of her illness which terminated fatally as stated. She was about 69 years of age and for fully sixty years she had worked continuously at one or other of the pits. She was born at Penrith and came to Whitehaven when very young, in fact she commenced to work at the pits when little more than an infant, and as she grew up she developed a most masculine deportment. Her eccentricity of dress and masculine bearing established her as a celebrity far and near. She wore her hair cut short, parted down the side, a cloth peaked cap, waistcoat, jacket and scarf and shirt. "Her face had defied a thousand storms." She possessed a powerful voice and her gait was manly. She dearly loved her "cutty". From these peculiarities it can well be imagined by those who have never seen her in the flesh that she bore a most manly appearance. She first worked in the capacity of a driver on top of the old Wilson pit, which ceased working some fifty years ago. She then

went to Raven Hill and drove horses at Howgill Brake for several years, and afterwards was employed at Croft Pit and Raven Hill. At the latter place she drove three horses for many years and afterwards she drove at Wellington Pit. . . She did not altogether discard her own sex but was more fond of the society of pitmen she knew and with whom she would play cards and hold her opinion with any of them. She was not only a great favourite with the officials of the Colliery but also with her fellow employees who all speak of her with respect. She was in many ways a remarkable woman. Few of her sex have ever led so arduous and strange career, and her death removes one of the last remaining worthies of the town. The funeral took place on Monday afternoon and was very largely attended. Many folks also congregated in the vicinity of her lodgings in Mark Lane, and in the streets on the way to the burial ground to watch the cortege pass. It was a simple little funeral and on the coffin lay just one cross of daffodils, a touching tribute by some friends of this strange woman.

Terrific Storm at Sea

Great Destruction of Shipping and Loss of Life

We have to record this week particulars of one of the most wide-spread and heart-rending storms that ever ravaged the English and Irish coasts. On Friday night and during Saturday, a terrific gale from the north-east swept the various channels and coasts which lay in its course. It is at present difficult to say what is the full extent of the damage of property and loss of life resulting from this disastrous visitation, but judging from the numerous reports before us from various quarters, the losses that will devolve upon the shipping interest are enormous, and the sacrifice of human life, it is to be feared, will be correspondingly great. . . a vessel, supposed to be the Hero, of this port, is reported to have been seen off Kish Bank on Saturday, with sails blown away, but this report requires confirmation.

FOUNDERING OF THE BRIG HERO OF WHITEHAVEN

Whitehaven, Monday - The following statement has been received by Mr John Jackson, ship broker at this port, from Mr John Tomlinson of Dublin: -

February 15<sup>th</sup> - the master of the Wanderer, of Dublin, reports as follows about poor Magrath. That on Saturday the 9<sup>th</sup> inst, about 10 o'clock (morning) saw the Hero off Burford Bank (between Kish and Dalkey), standing up from the southward, in company with another Scotch vessel called the Ellen, since ashore in Kingstown Harbour. When abreast of each other, they were so close that the master of the Wanderer called out to the Hero to keep away, and poor Magrath waved his hand that he would do so. The Wanderer had reached at the time, and when passing there were three of the crew of the Hero at her wheel, and two others pumping. Immediately after a sea struck her and swept all before it, carrying away both gangways, bulwarks &c; and shortly after, on the master of the Wanderer looking back, saw her disappear and supposed foundered. The Wanderer was in company with eight vessels about the same time, all of which are ashore. The master of the Ellen also states he was in company with the Hero for some time, and confirms the sea breaking over her.

**DEATH OF CAPTAIN MANN** We regret to announce the death of Captain Thomas Mann, late harbour master, which took place on Saturday midnight under painfully sudden circumstances at his residence, 3, Hilton Terrace. For a short time past he had not been enjoying his usual health. He, however, was quite able to go about, and only a few hours before he died he endeavoured to fulfil a business engagement. He was a member of the Committee of the Whitehaven Building Society and on Saturday evening about six o'clock he left home to attend the usual meeting, but as he approached the office he felt a pain in his side. He complained to some of his colleagues of feeling unwell, and on their advice he returned home. He gradually grew worse and despite every attention he succumbed about midnight. The sad news created a painful

impression in the town in which, for the greater part of his life, he had been one of its best known and respected residents, and deep sympathy is felt for his widow and only son.

Capt. Mann was born in the village of Seaton, near Workington, a village that has produced many distinguished sailors, but early in life he came to Whitehaven with his parents. He served his apprenticeship as a carpenter in the well-known shipbuilding yard of Messrs. Brocklebank, and on the completion of his apprenticeship he went to sea in this firm's vessels, trading to the Far East. His first voyage was as carpenter's mate on the Florence Nightingale. His employers subsequently gave him the berth of chief carpenter on the Juanpoor, a vessel they themselves built and in which he made three voyages to Japan. He then joined the Queen of the Sea in which he made one voyage to Bombay. At the end of this he was appointed captain of the brigantine Smiler, of which the late Mr. James Stiven was managing owner, and subsequently took charge of the brig Argestes, of which Mr. Stiven was also managing owner. Both vessels were engaged in the general coasting trade, and Capt. Mann sailed them with great success. He left the last-named vessel to become Harbourmaster of Whitehaven in succession to the late Mr. Anthony Nicholson. He was appointed to this position by the Town and Harbour Trustees on the 17<sup>th</sup> January, 1876, and retired on the 25<sup>th</sup> June, 1899, and during the whole of these twenty-three and a half years he gave entire satisfaction and had the confidence of all masters trading to the port. On his retirement the Harbour Commissioners unanimously resolved to retain him as consulting harbourmaster at a salary of £25 a year. He was also presented with a handsome testimonial subscribed by those connected with the shipping and general trade of Whitehaven, and in an illuminated address which accompanied it, a high tribute was paid to the zeal, ability and fidelity of his services as Harbourmaster, and the port's freedom from accidents during his tenure of the office justly emphasised. Capt. Mann took a practical interest and was a generous supporter in many institutions having as their object the welfare of those of his old calling. For many years he was Chairman of the Lifeboat Committee, and the local representative of the Shipwrecked Fishermen and Mariner's Society, and in the latter instance he rendered invaluable service. He was in his 71st year, and leaves a widow and one son.

Whitehaven Harbour Board - THE LATE CAPTAIN MANN

The Chairman said since they last met together an old servant of the Commissioners had passed away very suddenly. He referred to the late Captain Mann, whose death, he was sure, they all very much regretted, and especially the suddenness of it. He himself had a chat with Captain Mann on the day before his death, and little did he imagine that that would be the last opportunity he should have of speaking with him. He had had an acquaintance with Captain Mann extending from his boyhood, and he also knew his family well, and he felt sure he was expressing their (the Commissioners) sentiments, as well as his own and those of the general public, when he said they regretted very much the sudden and unexpected decease of Captain Mann.

Quiet, kindly and inoffensive, Mr Martin was greatly respected by all who knew him, and he did a large business with the gentry of the neighbourhood, who had a deservedly high opinion of his abilities in his own line. #### DEATH OF A LOCAL MARKSMAN

Corporal G J M'Allan died very suddenly at his residence, Preston-street, Whitehaven, on Thursday morning last. Deceased had been in failing health for some time, being troubled with spasms of the heart, which had occurred very frequently of late, but his death came as a very painful surprise to his many friends. Deceased was at work on New Year's Day but he did not return after dinner, feeling unwell, but in the evening he was in his usual spirits. He retired to bed about twelve o'clock, but got up again shortly afterwards, being troubled with a fresh attack. He sat down on the bed side, when suddenly he fell forward and but for the presence of some of his family would have fallen into the fire. He was assisted into bed again, and expired almost immediately.

The deceased came from the Bridge of Allan, Scotland, and was in the employ of the Furness Railway Co; he had been in Whitehaven about 14 years. He was a prominent member of the Whitehaven Rifle Corps and had been connected with the Volunteer Force for some 30 years. On one occasion he tied with Captain Mitchell for the Lord Lieutenant's Cup at Cummersdale, but in the shooting off was unsuccessful. On a future occasion M'Allan won the bronze medal of the National Rifle Association, and represented his county in the Prince of Wales' prize at Wimbledon. He also won Sir James Bain's cup the first year it was competed for, and he generally figured well in all the company's prize lists. On the shooting range he was ever ready with his kindly encouragement and advice, taking great interest in the recruit and was quite as anxious for their success as his own. Deceased was 52 years of age the day before his death; he leaves a widow and four children. His remains were interred at the Whitehaven Cemetery on Sunday, with full military honours. The band, under the leadership of Bandmaster F Skyrn, played the Dead March in Saul. There was a good muster of his late comrades to pay a last tribute of respect (including Captain Wood, five sergeants and five rank and file of the Workington Corp, of which M'Allan was formerly a member) the parade state being: Two officers, 6 sergeants, and 73 rank and file. Captain Jackson was in command. The firing party was under the direction of Colour-Sergeant Burnyeat. A good muster of artillerymen were also present.

Whitehaven Regatta, which has been postponed time and time since 1875, came off on Friday afternoon last. The weather was fine but squally, and in consequence a high sea was running. There was a very large attendance of spectators on the piers, and no doubt the boat-racing would have been heartily enjoyed but for a melancholy accident which occurred in the evening in connection with the race for second-class sailing boats. Amongst the eight boats which put in an appearance to compete was a new boat the property of Mr Kennaugh, sail maker, of Whitehaven, named the Mystery. This boat was only launched on the morning of the race, and it had been expected that her iron keel would have arrived in time to be fitted on before the race. It did not arrive, however, and ballast was used. The boats started for the race, all pretty close together. It was evident that the Mystery was carrying too much canvas, or that she had insufficient ballast

in her, for she bent right over with the wind. The flag-boat to the north was safely rounded, and the competing boats were proceeding to the westward when suddenly the Mystery heeled over and foundered immediately. So suddenly did she disappear that grave fears were entertained that before resistance could be on the spot her crew, consisting of Capt. T. Armstrong, Mr Kennaugh (owner), Jas. McAllister, sailmaker, Ginns, Whitehaven, and another man named John McIntyre, who had built the boat, would all have been lost. Two of the competing boats, the Margaret and the Rapid, had observed the Mystery go down, and they shortened sail at once and steered round. They reached the scene of the accident in a very short time, and Armstrong and McIntyre were rescued by the crew of the Margaret, while the Rapid succeeded in saving Kennaugh. McAllister was observed on the water, and a rope was thrown to him. He was too far gone, however, to do anything to save himself, and immediately sank. The men who were rescued were then brought into the harbour, and the sad news of the death of McAllister, who has only been married a short time, was made known. The affair cast quite a gloom over the proceedings, and the remainder of the sports - two boat races, a duck hunt &c - were abandoned. . . On Saturday a number of boats were out grappling to try and recover the lost boat, as it is conjectured the body of McAllister is fast to some part of it. The search was unsuccessful, but we understand it is to be continued by trawl-boats, which will have a better chance of coming upon the Mystery.

**August 23<sup>rd</sup> 1879 Carlisle Express and Examiner**

On Saturday afternoon last an inquest was held by Mr W W Lumb deputy-coroner at the Globe Hotel, Whitehaven, touching the death of James McAllister, aged 32 years, who was drowned on the 25<sup>th</sup> of July by the upsetting of a sailing-boat which was taking part in a race in connection with the Whitehaven regatta. Capt. Armstrong of Whitehaven, who was in the boat, gave evidence to the effect that the accident had occurred through a puff of wind shifting the ballast. When they were in the water deceased caught hold of him by the shoulder, but he did not see him afterwards. Henry Storey, pattern maker, Parton, proved that on Friday while he was out in a boat with some other persons, they discovered deceased's body floating near the place where the Mystery went down. The body was brought to Whitehaven. It was impossible, owing to the state it was in, to recognise it, except by the clothing upon it. After hearing all the evidence, the jury returned a verdict of "Accidental death" and that no one was to blame for the occurrence.

Terrible Colliery Explosion at Whitehaven

A little before midnight on Tuesday evening last an explosion occurred in a new seam of coal in the William Pit, Whitehaven, by which four men lost their lives, and four others were seriously injured. The William Pit, which is situate on the north side of the town, and in close proximity to the Bransty railway station, is owned by the Earl of Lonsdale, who is also the owner of the Wellington, Croft and Henry Pits, all adjoining the town of Whitehaven. The district where the explosion occurred, as we have already stated, has just recently been opened out, and is known as the "Countess" district. The seam in question is between two and three miles in a northwesterly direction from the William Pit shaft. This seam has been reached by a "dip" drift somewhere about 150 yards in length and for ventilating purposes, and to provide a travelling road, a brick wall was north-westerly built down the centre of the drift. The miners, it appears, descended about nine o'clock; the party consisting of Henry Lynch, Thomas Colvin and John McGuinness – who were deputed to pump the water up the drift – and two hewers, named Edwin Martin and James Geddes. In the "Forster" district, which is at the head of the drift, a number of miners were also on the night shift. All went well till between eleven and twelve o'clock, when Lynch, Colvin and McGuinness were working at the pumps and Martin and Geddes were at a working place some 50 or 60 yards distant, waiting till the water was pumped out to allow them to work. One of their safety lamps was standing on a stool, and another on a bucket, while the men were taking their clothes off to commence work, when, by some means or other, an accumulation of gas suddenly exploded. The men were all thrown down and Martin fell into a pool of water

and remained unconscious for some time. When he recovered from the effects of the shock he made his way up the drift to the "Forster" district, and passed some of the men who had been engaged at the pumps on the way. Thomas Williamson, a deputy-overman, having in the meantime heard the explosion, was making his way towards the "Countess" district when he met Martin, who informed him of what had occurred, and in consequence Williamson, after warning some other men respecting the danger from after-damp, left his lamp and ran down the drift in the dark into the place where the explosion had occurred, seized hold of the helpless man Geddes, and brought him up the drift. Heroic as the rescue in this case undoubtedly was, it was a little too late to save the life of the unfortunate miner. Geddes was afterwards removed in an unconscious state to a lamp station, about three-quarters of a mile from the scene of the explosion. Martin, after communicating with the deputy-overman, proceeded to the shaft and was drawn to the surface, after which he travelled home, notwithstanding the serious injuries he had sustained. News of the catastrophe quickly spread in the town. After Martin reached the surface, Dr M'Laughlin, assistant to Dr Lumb, descended the pit and proceeded to where Geddes had been taken. Dr M'Laughlin found him sinking fast and in a short time he died. Information of the explosion, in the meantime, had been conveyed to Mr Liddell, Lord Lonsdale's colliery agent, and Mr Harker, manager of the pit, and both of these gentlemen proceeded at once to the scene of the disaster, at which they arrived about half past two on Wednesday morning. They directed their attention, first of all, to the ventilation, which was found to be seriously impaired owing to the brickwork doors and stoppings being blown down or injured by the shock of the force. Men were accordingly set to work to repair the damage, and by eleven o'clock it was considered safe to explore the drift in search of the three men. The exploring party had not proceeded far down the drift before they came across the dead bodies of Lynch, Colvin and McGuinness. The whole of the men were lying on their faces. They had run a distance of 100 yards from the place where they were employed before being overcome by the after-damp. Lynch was severely burned on different parts of the body, but the other two men had apparently escaped the flames. The old man Colvin, before leaving the pumps, had had the presence of mind to seize his coat which he had thrown over his shoulder. About noon the bodies were brought to the surface and deposited in one of the offices to await the arrival of the coroner and jury, who viewed them early in the afternoon. There were some other men injured by the force of the explosion. The following is a list of the killed and injured.

#### STORM IN WEST CUMBERLAND

On Friday morning a schooner named the Tug, belonging to Maryport, was entering Maryport harbour from Dublin in tow of a steam-tug, when a heavy sea struck the schooner and swept overboard a sailor named John McKaig. The sea was so rough that it was impossible to rescue the poor fellow and he was drowned. McKaig resided in Maryport and has left a widow and five children.

The funeral was one of the largest that has ever been held in Whitehaven, the deceased being a gentleman who was universally respected. The grave space and surroundings were beautifully decorated. Most of the business premises in the town were closed as a mark of respect. Mr McKelvie was a native of Whithorn.

We regret to announce the death of Mr John McKelvie, solicitor, of Whitehaven, which took place at his residence at Lowther street Whitehaven on Tuesday afternoon last. The deceased gentleman was a native of Whitehaven, and was in the fiftieth year of his age. He served his articles with Mr Hodgkin, solicitor of Sandhills Lane, Whitehaven, and subsequently became partner with that gentleman, who held several important public offices in that town, including that of registrar of the County Court, clerk to the Board of Guardians, superintendent registrar of births, deaths and marriages. Mr Hodgkin disappeared from Whitehaven in 1866 in a most extraordinary manner. He was a widower with a small family, in most comfortable circumstances, and was one of the most popular men in the district. He suddenly disappeared without any apparent cause, and was traced to London, thence to Liverpool, from there to New York, and

after that all trace of him was lost and so far as we know he has never been heard of since. Mr McKelvie succeeded Mr Hodgkin in the appointment of Clerk to the Board of Guardians, superintendent registrar of births, death and marriages, and other appointments. He was also Clerk to the Rural Sanitary Authority, the Assessment Committee, the Commissioners of Taxes, Solicitor to the Building Society and for some years held the appointment of Coroner for the lordship of Egremont. Some time ago, however, he resigned the Clerkship to the Board of Guardians, the office of Coroner, and other public appointments, although it was universally acknowledged that no gentleman better qualified to discharge their duties could possibly have held the offices. Greatly esteemed as a lawyer, for the quiet effective style in which he placed every point before the Court, he will be greatly missed in the legal profession of Whitehaven. For some time past he had not been in the best of health, and about ten days ago he was attacked and confined to his house by diabetes mellitus. Dr Henry's assistant, who attended him, had no hope whatever of his recovery, and he died on Wednesday afternoon. Deceased was a member of the order of Freemasons, in which body he had held various offices. He leaves a widow and five children.

**SAD DEATH OF A WHITEHAVEN PUBLICAN - FATAL RESULT OF A SMALL WOUND**

On Sunday afternoon, Mr T. C. McKenzie, of the Crown and Anchor Inn, Tangier Street, Whitehaven, died under sad circumstances. The deceased, who was fifty-five years of age, was a fitter by trade, and was employed at Messrs Stout's foundry, in Newtown, Whitehaven. During the afternoon of Friday, March 24<sup>th</sup>, while deceased was engaged repairing an engine at Robinson's Cement Works, Barrowmouth, a piece of steel wire ran into the palm of his right hand. Thinking the injury was not of a serious nature and would soon heal, McKenzie went to his work as usual on the following day. However blood poisoning set in, Dr Tawse having to be called in on March 30<sup>th</sup>. Deceased continued to get worse, and died about four o'clock on Sunday afternoon. Deceased leaves a widow and grown-up family for whom much sympathy is felt. He was very well known and respected in the town. Yesterday (Tuesday) afternoon Mr Gordon Falcon, coroner for West Cumberland, held an inquest on the body, at the Crown and Anchor Inn. Mr John Waugh was chosen foreman of the jury. Thomas McKenzie identified the body as that of his father, and said he had been employed at Messrs Stout's foundry as an engineer. Thomas Branch, 16, South Row, Kells, who works at Messrs Stout's foundry, said he was working with the deceased on the 24<sup>th</sup> ult at Robinson's cement works. A little bit of steel wire was sticking out of the lint gear of the engine and as deceased was reaching past his right wrist caught it. Deceased observed at the time that he had scratched his wrist and showed the injury to witness. Deceased came to work next day, but did not then complain. As far as witness saw it only seemed

a mere scratch. By the Foreman: Deceased's wrist did not bleed. The scratch was only a very slight one. Another Juryman: Was the wire rusty? No, it was greased. Dr Tawse, medical practitioner, Whitehaven, said he saw deceased on March 30<sup>th</sup>, and he found the wrist was swollen and matter coming from wound. The arm was also swollen and red, and blood poisoning had evidently set in. Witness continued to attend deceased, who also suffered from acute bronchitis. This together with the blood poisoning caused his death. By the Coroner: He attributed his death primarily to the blood poisoning. The Coroner said the case came under the Factory Act, and, strictly speaking, the inspector should have proper notice to attend. He had, however, wired the inspector that morning that he thought it was very simple, and that although it came within his province his presence was really not needed. He had received no answer to the telegram, and he thought he was perhaps away from home, but he did not consider there was any necessity to adjourn the inquiry. The jury were of the same opinion, and returned a verdict that deceased died from the effects of an injury accidentally received.

The following shocking case of accidental poisoning occurred at Newcastle under Lyme on Friday evening: - Mr M'Nish, Governor of Stoke on Trent Workhouse, had resigned his office on account of ill health, and retired upon a pension, taking a house in Newcastle, to which he removed only on Thursday in last week. On Friday he went to spend the evening with his wife and daughter at the house of a relative in Newcastle. This relative is a teetotaller, and Mrs M'Nish took with her a small bottle containing, as she supposed, gin for her husband's use in the course of the evening. About nine o'clock Mr M'Nish, who was in good health and unusual spirits, sat down to enjoy his pipe and a glass of gin and water. He poured a small quantity of the liquid from the bottle into a glass, and filled it with water. He took a draught, and spluttering out upon the floor all he had not swallowed asked if poison had been given him. It was then discovered that the bottle contained not gin but iodide of potassium. In a state of convulsion he was led to a sofa, a doctor was sent for, and strong remedies were applied for the ejection of the poison. This was effected, but the retching was so violent as to produce exhaustion, which ended in death an hour afterwards.

It appears that a friend, who is an amateur photographer, had, just before the removal from the workhouse, photographed as souvenirs the governor and his family and different parts of the establishment, and by some mistake had left at the workhouse a bottle of iodide of potassium, which in the hurry of removal



became mixed up with some bottles belonging to Mr M'Nish, and was supposed by Mrs M'Nish to contain gin. The bottle was not labelled, and no examination of its contents had been made.

The unfortunate man was fifty-six years of age but of infirm health. If he had been a younger or a stronger man it is probable he would have recovered from the effects of the poison, as he succeeded in vomiting the whole of it, though exhausted by the effort.

An inquest has been held, when evidence corroborative of the above outline was given, and the jury returned a verdict of "Death from accidental poisoning". The Coroner said the jury wished to express an opinion that bottles containing poisons and used by amateur photographers, should have the words "poison" distinctly labelled on them.

**CORONER'S INQUEST AND STRANGE CONDUCT OF THE WIDOW OF THE DECEASED**

We last week briefly noticed the death of a man named John MITCHELL of this town, who was supposed to have died in consequence of having taken poison, and that owing to the absence of Mr Burns, surgeon, who attended the deceased in his last moments, the inquest was deferred until the following day.

On Tuesday the jury were accordingly summoned for two o'clock, and after viewing the body, expressed a wish to have the opinion of Mr Burns, as to the way in which death had been occasioned. That gentleman also examined the corpse of the deceased, but being unable to satisfy himself on the point required, the inquest was adjourned until five o'clock, and in the meantime it was determined that a post mortem examination should take place. Mr Burns and Mr King accordingly attended; the widow of the deceased however refused to admit them, but on being told of the impropriety of her conduct and the consequences to which it might lead, she consented to admit Mr Burns, but persevered in her refusal to allow Mr King to aid in the operation, or even enter the room. Her subsequent conduct will be found detailed in Mr Burns's evidence before the Coroner.

At five o'clock the Jury again assembled, and on the strange conduct of the widow of the deceased being communicated to Mr Hodgson, the coroner, he deemed it necessary to order her attendance at the Public Office, where the Jury were sitting, and Green, the officer, was despatched for that purpose. She not only bolted the door of her house, and held the officer at defiance, but peremptorily refused to attend to the summons. On being told that the body of her husband would not be allowed to be interred until the jury were satisfied on every point relative to his death, she seemed perfectly unconcerned, and observed that if not allowed to carry his remains to the church she could inter them in the cellar!

#### May 16<sup>th</sup> 1837 Cumberland Pacquet (Continued)

On the return of Green, who communicated the reception he had met with, and the refusal on the part of the widow to comply with the request made to her, the Coroner issued a warrant to compel her attendance, and again despatched the officer, who presently returned with his charge. The inquiry was then proceeded with.

Mr Burns, surgeon, sworn. He stated that he was called upon to attend the deceased on Sunday the 7<sup>th</sup> instant, about five in the afternoon. He found him in bed, in a state of insensibility, perspiring profusely; the pupils of the eyes were contracted, his respiration was difficult, the pulse was weak and irregular, and he considered him in a dying state. From these symptoms he considered that the deceased had taken opium or some other narcotic drug. He remained an hour with him, and again visited him about two hours afterwards, when he found him in nearly the same state but weaker. He did not see him afterwards during his life. By the direction of the coroner's inquest that morning he viewed the body of the deceased, and although there was apparent evidence that the deceased had taken laudanum he could not positively state that that was the fact. He afterwards made a post mortem examination, and having extracted the contents of the stomach and placed the same in a basin for the purpose of an analytical examination, he was prevented from doing so by the widow of the deceased seizing the basin and throwing its contents into an earthenware vessel containing water, but from what he could discover from the smell he had no doubt but there had been laudanum on the stomach.

He wished to have the assistance of Mr King, a surgeon in Whitehaven, and that he might also be present at the post-mortem examination, but the widow of the deceased refused to admit him. When he was first called to the deceased, he inquired of his present widow of the deceased had taken anything that might occasion his death; the daughter of the deceased produced a bottle, which she took from a drawer, and he found that it had contained laudanum. The deceased's family told him that they found the bottle on the floor of the bed-room in which the deceased was lying, and from all the circumstances above stated he had no doubt but the deceased died in consequence of having taken laudanum. When first called to the deceased he thought of resorting to the stomach pump, but he found him in too weak a state to admit of its operation.

Evidence was then given as to the state of the deceased's mind, from which it appeared that for some time past he had been labouring under an aberration of intellect, and the jury returned a verdict "That the deceased, not being of sound mind and understanding, did, on the 6<sup>th</sup> and 7<sup>th</sup> days of this month, take and swallow a quantity of laudanum which caused his death."

The widow of the deceased was present during the inquiry, and occasionally conducted himself with so much impropriety as to call forth reproof from the Coroner, as well as from different members of the jury. At the conclusion of the investigation the Coroner severely reprimanded the widow for her strange conduct

throughout the whole inquiry, but especially for throwing away the contents of the stomach of her late husband, and thereby preventing the test which the nature of the case rendered so extremely desirable. She had ample grounds to thank the jury for their leniency: her improper conduct was sufficient to excite suspicion, and so glaringly bad as almost to justify the jury's coming to a very different conclusion to that which had just been recorded.

The inquest on the body of John Henry Moss, aged 22, assistant to Mr John Taylor, chemist of Lucius-street, Torquay, who committed suicide by taking a dose of prussic acid early on Tuesday morning, was held last evening, before Mr S Hacker, County Coroner. The evidence showed that the deceased rose at six o'clock on Tuesday morning, and after playing with one of Mr Taylor's little girls for a time, and doing some work about the shop, went up to his bedroom. Shortly afterwards he was discovered there lying across the bed, and there was a strong smell of poison in the room. Mr Taylor's daughter, who discovered the deceased, told her mother and she called Mr Taylor, who found that deceased was quite dead, he having drunk a large dose of prussic acid, enough to kill half a dozen persons. On the washstand, close to the bed, was a large store bottle of prussic acid, which had been taken from the shop, and a glass from which the poison had been drunk. Deceased was the fourth son of a wholesale stationer of Whitehaven, Cumberland. He had been bright and cheerful, and the only suggestion to him why he should have committed suicide was that he had worried over an examination for which he was preparing. The jury returned a verdict that deceased came to his death by taking poison while in a state of temporary insanity.

We regret to announce the death of Mr Joseph Mortimer Moss, eldest son of Mr W H Moss, which took place at 1 High Street Whitehaven, on Saturday. The interment took place on Wednesday at the Whitehaven Cemetery, the obsequies being conducted by the Revs R W G Hunter and J C Harrison. The whole of Mr Moss's employees attended the funeral, four of the oldest hands – Messrs Macdonald, Maguire, Barrow and Jones – acting as bearers. Much sympathy is felt for Mr and Mrs Moss in this their second bereavement within about a year.

### **Lamentable Pit Accident at Whitehaven - Two Men Killed**

An accident involving the loss of two lives occurred at William Pit, Whitehaven, on Thursday afternoon, and, as may be imagined, caused a very painful sensation throughout the town. The victims were two young men— Thomas Horrocks, aged 27, who lived at 73, Strand Street, and John Mossop, aged 23, of Woodville Terrace. Both men were bricklayer's labourers, and were employed by the Whitehaven Colliery Company at William Pit. They went to work at six o'clock on Thursday morning, and were on a double shift. The work they were engaged at was the building of a side wall in No. 5 Drift, the bricklayers who were with them being Jonathan Johnston and Andrew Kerr. It was about four o'clock when the accident happened. A large stone in the roof, just above the heads of the unfortunate men, Horrocks and Mossop, suddenly came away, and, falling straight on to them, killed them instantly, the neck of each man being broken. The bodies of the poor fellows were removed to the surface and carried on stretchers to their respective houses, crowds of excited people, who had gathered near the pit top, following. Mossop, it is stated, had only been at the pit about ten days, and formerly worked at the Lonsdale Furnaces. He was unmarried, and lived with his parents. Horrocks was also a single man, and resided at the house of a married sister (Mrs Marshall). The stone which fell from the roof measures 10ft by 7 ft and is seven inches thick. Yesterday (Friday) afternoon, Mr Gordon Falcon, Coroner for West Cumberland, opened the inquest at the Police Court. Mr John Waugh was foreman of the jury. Mr LT. Helder, representing the Whitehaven Colliery Company, and Mr S. Turner, manager at William Pit, were present. The members of the jury were taken in wagonettes to view the bodies, the home of Mossop being on the outskirts of the town.

John Wm Marshall, coalminer, High Strand Street, Whitehaven, identified the body of Horrocks, who was his brother-in-law. Mossop's body was identified by William Mossop, 12, Woodville Terrace, brother of the deceased. The inquiry was adjourned until next Tuesday afternoon for the attendance of the Mines Inspector.

The sudden death of Mr John Benn Mossop at his residence, Corkickle, Whitehaven, on Sunday evening, adds another to the heavy list of death amongst leading townsmen of Whitehaven during the last twelve months. Mr Mossop was one of the oldest commercial and business men of Whitehaven. Connected for about 50 years with the business of T.C. Dixon and Co., an old-established and extensive wine and spirit business extending over West Cumberland and the Lake District, Mr Mossop had for the last 20 years had the sole interest in the business, besides having established previously the supplementary firms of J B Mossop and Co., and the Ennerdale Aerated Water Co. The contributed success of these undertakings was ensured by his foresight and industry. He was of a kindly, generous temperament, and stood high in general esteem as a straightforward man of business. He took no part in public affairs, beyond being one of the managers of the Savings Bank, but he gave ready support to many local enterprises. Lately he had somewhat failed in health, though there was no immediate anxiety, and while at his office on Saturday morning, conversing with his eldest son on business matters, he was suddenly prostrated by a seizure, from which he never rallied. Without recovering consciousness, he died suddenly after nine o'clock on Sunday evening. Mr Mossop would have been 65 years of age on the 30<sup>th</sup> June next. He leaves a widow and two grown-up sons. The funeral takes place at Corkickle on Wednesday.

Ship Launch at Whitehaven

On Saturday morning last, Messrs J Shepherd and Co., shipbuilders of this town, launched from their yard a beautifully modelled brig, built for a Whitehaven owner; Mr Thomas Middleton having been appointed managing owner. The dimensions of the vessel are as follows: - Length, for tonnage, 97 feet 8-10ths; breadth, 20 feet 5-10ths, depth 13 feet. Register tonnage, 180 N.N.M and classed A1 at Lloyds for nine years. She was named the Ann Middleton, after the wife of the managing owner, by Miss Middleton in the usual manner. She has been built specially for the Pomaron trade, but we believe it is the intention of the owners to employ her in the West Indian trade, and she will be under command of Captain Mossop, late of the Highland brigade. After the launch the builders and owners, with a few friends, returned to the builders' offices, where they partook of refreshment, and drank success to the vessel which had just been launched.

March 3<sup>rd</sup> 1868 Cumberland Pacquet

In this case Thomas Middleton, of this town, charged an apprentice to the sea named John Lancaster, with deserting from his ship the Ann Middleton. The case, it will be remembered, was adjourned for the production of some of the crew to speak to alleged cruelty to the boy by the master. Mr Webster appeared for the apprentice and Mr Mason for Mr Middleton.

The first witness examined was John Johnstone, who said he was an apprentice with Captain Mossop in the "Ann Middleton". He had previously been in the "Highland Brigade" with Captain Mossop. During the time he was in the "Highland Brigade" and while on a voyage from Quebec to Briton Ferry, he saw the master strike the defendant. He struck him over the back with a ropes end two or three times. He recollected the ship being in Demerara some time ago, when he saw the mate strike the boy for breaking a wooden sword used for making mats. . . Captain Mossop said on the day in question the mate made a report to him about the defendant having broken the sword, and all the hands being brought to a standstill in consequence. He called the boy aft, reprimanded him, and cautioned him about destroying property belonging to the ship. The lad answered him in a very improper manner, whereupon he gave him a slap on the side of the head and told him to go forward. Defendant then told him he would make him pay for it, and gave him more insolence. The Captain then took a ropes end to him. He had never previously beaten him. This being all the evidence the two magistrates, Capt. Powe and Mr Gibson, who sat at the previous hearings, consulted as to their decision. After a short pause Mr Gibson said they found that the defendant was not improperly beaten, and he would have to go back to his ship. Defendant said he "would go to gaol first" and was then committed for one month. He however relented after an hour's incarceration and will be transferred to his ship.

May 18<sup>th</sup> 1869 Cumberland Pacquet

There is too much reason to fear that the Whitehaven brig, Anne Middleton, has gone down with all hands. The Anne Middleton was 180 tons register, and Mr Thomas Middleton of this town was her managing owner. On the 29<sup>th</sup> January last she sailed from Girgenti in Sicily for Ipswich, with a cargo of sulphur, and has never been heard of since. For weeks those interested in the vessel or her crew had been almost "hoping against hope" but the vessel is now so long overdue that there can be little doubt as to her fate and that of her unfortunate crew. When she sailed from Girgenti she had on board a crew of eight, all told. The master (Captain Mossop), the mate (John Stevenson) and three apprentices belonging to Whitehaven. Captain Mossop leaves a widow and one child, Mr Stevenson was just married before he went on his last voyage. The names of the apprentices are John Lancaster, Peter-street; John Johnston, Duke-street; and John Kelly. The vessel was partially insured. The Anne Middleton was built by Messrs Shepherd and Co. of his town and was launched in January 1867.

The body of another victim of the Wellington Pit Disaster was recovered on Thursday morning. It was found under a fall in No 3 North Level, and was identified as that of Wm Mulholland, aged 64, a shiftsman, who lived at 45 Back Row, Newhouses. The body was removed to the surface during the day and an inquest was opened by the Coroner (Mr Atter) in the afternoon.

After the jury had visited the pit head to view the body, Mrs Mulholland gave evidence of identification. She last saw her husband on the day of the disaster, when he left the house a little after six o'clock. She had been at the pit top and saw one of her late husband's stockings. She was perfectly satisfied it was his stocking – it was of brown worsted. There was also a cord round his left wrist. He always had something – either a strap or a cord. She would have the funeral on Sunday and would like the coffin taken home from the pit on Saturday night.

Asked by the Coroner if the coffin would not be re-opened.

Witness said he did not want to see any more, for fear she would not forget it.

John Mulholland, son of the deceased, collier, Back Row, Newhouses, also identified the body by the high cheek bones. His father had no teeth in front but had one tooth at the back. Asked by the Coroner where the body was found, witness said in No 3 Level, about 50 yards from Rake's Brake.

The Coroner: Anywhere near to his working place? Witness: Yes. His place was from the friction gear to the terminus wall. He had all that mile of road to travel.

The Foreman said the identification was quite satisfactory.

The Coroner pointed out that Mulholland was the oldest man working on that shift.

Only four bodies now remain unaccounted for.

On Saturday afternoon last an inquest was held at the Whitehaven and West Cumberland Infirmary by Mr W W Lumb, deputy coroner, on view of the body of Captain Daniel Murphy, 63 years of age, who met his death on Friday last. Deceased belonged to Whitehaven and had been master of a coasting vessel sailing from that port. It appears that on Friday he was looking over the harbour when he fell a considerable distance and was seriously injured. He was picked up and conveyed to the Infirmary as quickly as possible. Dr Henley, the house surgeon, attended him and found him suffering from concussion of the brain, compound fracture of the left arm, and fracture of the ribs. The unfortunate man was insensible when admitted into the institution, he never regained consciousness and died shortly afterwards. An inquest was held on Saturday evening, when the jury returned a verdict of "Accidentally killed."

The death took place at the Catholic Presbytery, Whitehaven, at near midnight on Friday, in his seventy-third year, of the Rev Hubert Gregory Murphy, O.S.B., rector of the Whitehaven Catholic Mission. The deceased belonged to a very old Catholic family in Dublin, being one of the sons of the late Mr J J Murphy, QC, Master in Chancery in Dublin. Father Murphy has been in Whitehaven for nearly thirty years. He took a great interest in education and at the time of his death was committed to the erection of a new school for boys at St Begh's. He was one of the oldest members of the Whitehaven Board of Guardians, in which elections he was repeatedly returned at the head of the poll. His labours at the time of the Whitehaven Colliery disaster were most devoted, and won the warm appreciation of all sections of the community. His services to the church were recognised by the parishioners and townspeople in a practical manner in 1911, when he celebrated his golden jubilee, on which occasion he was the recipient of a chalice, a purse of gold and his portrait in oil.

Although Father Murphy had shown signs of failing powers for some time, he celebrated Mass on Friday morning and afterwards had a seizure, from which he never rallied.

On Tuesday last intelligence reached Mr Superintendent Little at Whitehaven from Bedminster, that a boat with the words "Richard of Whitehaven, Owen Murphy" painted on her stern, containing the dead body of a seaman, was found by the steamer Prince Cadogan, Thomas Evans master, floating in the Bristol Channel 50 miles from Bristol, and was towed to that port. . .the boat is newly painted lead colour, has two iron straps inside the stern, with "Richard of Whitehaven" painted on one side and "Owen Murphy" on the other, in yellow paint. The description of the boat agrees in every particular with that of the Richard, and the body is doubtless that of James Slane, one of the crew, whose description is also recognised. . . The Richard, of which Mr John Bragg was managing owner, left Cardiff with a cargo of coals for Dublin on the 10<sup>th</sup> instant, and nothing has been heard of her up to the receipt of the above report. When she left Cardiff she had on board five hands, Owen Murphy, the master, aged 60 years, who has a wife and family; David Coulthard, aged 47, the mate, who has a wife and four children (both the master and mate are natives of Whitehaven); James Slane, whose body was found in the boat, and a couple of ordinary seamen, aged from 18 to 20 years. It is feared that the Richard, encountering one of the recent gales on the Welsh coast, foundered, and the crew in taking to the boat must all have been lost except the man who was found in the boat, and who is believed to have died from exposure. (NB the body was later identified as that of the mate, David Coulthard of 15 Quay street, Whitehaven)

A fatal accident occurred on Sunday night week to a portion of the crew of the Orozimbo of this port. When that vessel was entering the Dublin River it grounded, and Captain Murphy and three of his seamen, named William Benson, James McCormick and Thomas Wallace, got into a boat for the purpose of casting anchor lower down the stream, in order, if possible, to warp the vessel off the ground. While endeavouring to effect their purpose the buoy rope caught the boat and upset it, by which they were plunged into the water. Benson and McCormick succeeded in getting hold of the boat, and their united cries for assistance being heard from the shore, a steam boat put off to their rescue. On her arrival at the scene of the disaster, they were taken up in a state of insensibility; but Capt Murphy and Wallace, a native of this town, were unable to struggle successfully with the waves, and were drowned. Captain Murphy was an excellent seaman, and was highly respected by all who knew him. He has left a wife and family resident in George-street in this town. Wallace has also left a wife and one child, who reside here.

Mr Nairn, who had spent many years abroad in the Australian Colonies, carried on the building trade at Hensingham, at which place he owned considerable property. For some time past, he had not enjoyed very robust health, and in October last, accompanied by his only daughter, with a view to improving his health, he proceeded on a voyage to Madeira, the Canary Islands, and from thence to Cape Colony, and was on his return home when he died. Deceased, who was well-known and respected, was a member of the Hensingham Parochial Committee.

He was also interested in agricultural pursuits, and was a supporter of the West Cumberland Agricultural Society, at whose annual shows he was a regular and successful exhibitor, winning prizes from time to time in the light horse section.

Mr Hinde, who was 51 years of age, leaves a widow and two children, who have the deep sympathy of many friends in their bereavement.

On Saturday morning one of the hands of the Fairie, of Whitehaven, named Robert Newton, a strong young man, and a native of that town, met his death under the following simple circumstances.

The vessel had been moored the preceding night beside the Dublin draw-bridge, ready for moving seawards early next morning. About seven o'clock a.m. in order to help in hauling her through this swivel bridge, Newton mounted the gangway and from thence leaped to the bank, a distance perpendicularly of only six feet. On alighting, he was observed in a bending attitude, with his hand pressed on his right side. Mr Quirk the master, asked if he was hurt. Alarmed on finding him unable to speak, but only to point to the ground, he instantly apprised the crew, and despatched a message for a doctor. Meantime, deceased had staggered to the wall and fallen unconscious. When Dr Savage arrived restoratives were applied, but all that medical skill could do to effect resuscitation was vainly tried. The injured youth expired ten minutes afterwards. An inquest was subsequently held before Mr Magee and a jury, and a verdict returned in accordance with the medical testimony - namely that death resulted from injury to the brain and spinal marrow and the rupture of a blood vessel consequent on the shock received in the manner stated. Only a day or two ago an uncle, who was chief proprietor of the ship died, leaving to his short-lived nephew a large amount of property, value some thousands. Shortly after the fatality, a conversation sprang up among the crew with reference to the leap, and its melancholy upshot, and one veteran of two-and-sixty summers, with a temerity characteristic of the profession, and sufficient to make one fancy he was wooing a like fate, recklessly leaped to the ground, boasting he had often before accomplished more hazardous achievements. This person was a witness at the inquest, and related, with apparent pride, his remarkable agility - Telegraph.

We regret to announce the death of Mr James Nicholson, accountant, Duke Street, Whitehaven, which took place on Sunday morning somewhat suddenly. He went to bed on Saturday night apparently in his usual health, and died shortly after midnight with scarcely any warning. Twelve months ago deceased had a severe attack of rheumatism, but he seemed to have got fairly strong again. Dr Fisher, who was called in, certified that death was due to failure of the heart's action. Mr Nicholson was a native of Egremont, but had spent most of his life in Whitehaven, and had become an old standard of the town. When the Furness Railway was being built he was employed on the section between Whitehaven and Bootle, by the contractors, Messrs Brotherton and Rigg, as a timekeeper. He was subsequently engaged under the late Mr Dees, father of Mr J G Dees, as accountant at the Cleator Moro Furnaces, and afterwards for between thirty and forty years he filled a similar post at the Whitehaven Firebrick Works, still under Mr Dees. Latterly he had lived in retirement. He was well-known in Whitehaven and neighbourhood, and respected by all who knew him. He leaves a widow and three sons and four daughters. He was 72 years of age.

At the Carlisle Assizes yesterday, before Mr Justice Stephen, Robert Tear, carter, Whitehaven, and his wife, brought an action against John Dickinson, auctioneer, Whitehaven, and James Martin, carver and gilder, Whitehaven, executors on the estate of the late Captain Nicholson, Whitehaven, to recover £235 18s 6d, lent money &c. the deceased Captain Nicholson had a son whom he trained for the medical profession, and afterwards set him up in practice in Whitehaven, but his habits were so wild that he gave way to drink and ruined himself. At the request of Captain Nicholson, Mrs Tear took in Dr Nicholson and gave him lodgings, food and clothing for his wife, himself and child, during part of 1879, and again in 1880. The doctor was mixed up in a divorce case, and Mrs Tear said she was instructed by his father, who wished to be kept out of the affair, to defend his son who was co-respondent. She paid away a large sum of money for this purpose, and subsequently lent the captain £100 without security, a payment of £10 being made some time afterwards to prevent the transaction being Statute run. The defence was a denial on the part of the co-executors owing the money, and the Statute of Frauds and the Statute of Limitations was pleaded. It was proved that the father had not been living on good terms with his son through the latter's intemperate habits, and did not agree to incur any debts whatever in respect of his son, and, least of all, in respect of the divorce proceedings. The jury, after two and a quarter hours, returned a verdict for the plaintiff for £165 13s and costs. Judgement was entered for that amount and costs, and his Lordship granted a stay of execution until the first week in next sittings.

**TEAR v DICKINSON - Application for a new trial**

In the Queen's Bench Division of the High Court of Justice yesterday (Wednesday) morning, before Mr Baron Pollock and Mr Justice Manisty, the case of Tear v Dickinson and another came on for hearing.

Mr Gully QC for the defendants, said he had to move for a new trial in this action, which was tried before Mr Justice Stephen at Carlisle in July 1887, resulting in a result for the plaintiff for £165 18s. Plaintiffs were Robert Tear and his wife, who kept a second hand clothes shop at Whitehaven, and they sued defendants as the executors of one Captain J G Nicholson, a retired master mariner at Whitehaven, to recover £235 18s for money lent, and for money paid on behalf of Captain Nicholson's son, who was a doctor practising at Whitehaven, and for which it was said his father pledged his credit. The son took to drink, and there was a divorce case - Huggins v Huggins, in which young Nicholson was the co-respondent; and Mrs Tear said she paid the expenses for defending the case. There was no evidence in writing that the money had been lent to Captain Nicholson or that he had ever paid any interest on any of the principal except £10, which Mrs Tear and another witness said he paid, and which was referred to in reply to the plea of the defendants that the claim was barred by the Statute of Limitations. No claim was ever made on Captain Nicholson between 1870 and 1880 when the money was alleged to have been borrowed and paid, and 1887, when he died; and when the claim was first made on the executors, it was for £119 for money alleged to be paid on account of the son. Nothing was said about money being lent. . . Judgement for plaintiff for £119 with costs.

THE LATE MISS MARY NICHOLSON

It is due to the memory of this estimable lady to make a few comments upon a life that was spent in endeavouring to mitigate the sufferings of her fellow creatures, not only in Whitehaven but in a much wider field of action. Miss Nicholson was a member of the Society of Friends, and held the position of a minister in that denomination. She was unostentatious in her manner, never courted popularity, and her influence was always used for the good of others. She was remarkably free from selfishness and her good deeds were not even fully known to those with whom she was intimately acquainted. Her life was that of a practical Christian, and her whole aim to raise others to a higher standard of life and action than generally prevails. Her mind was highly cultivated and refined; its vigour was not in any degree impaired to the last. In the year 1856 Miss Nicholson went, under the auspices of the Society of Friends, on a religious mission to the Northern States of America, and was absent about two years. The interment of this excellent lady took place on the 9<sup>th</sup> inst, in that portion of ground allotted to the Society of Friends in Whitehaven Cemetery, and was attended by a large number of persons from various parts of this county, chiefly members of her own persuasion. After the remains were placed in the grave the company retired to the chapel, where the service was performed by various persons and produced a solemn impression on all who were assembled. (Herald)

The death took place very suddenly on Sunday morning of Samuel Nicholson, a retired brass moulder, of 44, Scotch Street, Whitehaven. Mr. Nicholson, who suffered from heart affection, had not followed any regular employment for about three years, but was not confined to the house, and on Sunday morning appeared to be in his usual health. He got up about ten o'clock and, after partaking of breakfast, commenced to peel potatoes for dinner. While thus engaged he suddenly fell forward, and expired before the arrival of Dr. Muriel, who was immediately sent for. Deceased, who was 62 years of age, leaves a widow and grown-up family. He was well known and much respected in the town. For many years he was in the employ of the late Mt. C. D. Gordon, ironmonger, as a brass founder.

The funeral of Mr Thomas Nicholson, the respected and zealous superintendent of the Whitehaven Refuge Sunday School, took place on Monday afternoon, and was an affecting and solemn scene. A dense crowd of people, including very many of the poor, who could best appreciate the inestimable worth of the services rendered them and theirs by the deceased, crowded the streets and followed the cortege: and as the latter passed the school, it was joined by upwards of 400 of the scholars, who had assembled in the schoolroom, and under the command of their temporary superintendent, Mr A McGill, assisted by the several teachers, had been arranged, and were in readiness waiting.

On arrival at the cemetery and while divine service was being performed inside the chapel, the children were formed round the grave and on each side the walk leading thereto, so that the corpse and mourners passed down between them; after which they were all drawn round the grave and when the coffin had been deposited, they sang in soft, sweet and solemn tones the appropriate hymn commencing

"Why should our tears in sorrow flow  
When God recalls his own?"

The teachers, who also seemed as though they could not sufficiently show their great respect to the memory of their departed leader, performed the duties of bearers, and assisted the corpse in and out of the hearse, and also to the grave.

The remainder of the burial service having been gone through by the officiating clergyman, the Rev Canon Dalton, each took their last sad look. The poor children, who all along showed signs of their grief, seemed almost overcome when they passed the grave, and took their farewell look at what contained the dust of him to whom they were so much attached. They were again rearranged and marched to the head of the Ginns, where, after a few touching remarks had been addressed to them by Mr A M'Gill, they retired to their respective homes, deeply impressed with the solemnities of the afternoon.

**BATHING FATALITY AT BRANSTY - Advice to Bathers**

Yesterday (Wednesday) afternoon, an inquest was held at Mr T Shippen's, Shipwrights' Arms, Bransty, before Mr Lumb, coroner for East Cumberland, and a jury, over whom Mr Jos. Harkness was appointed foreman, to inquire into the circumstances connected with the death of a boy named William Noble, who was drowned whilst bathing in Bransty reservoir on Tuesday afternoon. The deceased was twelve years of age, and the son of Mr William Noble, commercial traveller for Mr A Kennedy, wholesale grocer. The jury having viewed the body at no 23 Hugh Street, Bransty, the residence of the deceased, the following evidence was adduced: -

William Noble said that the deceased, who was his son, would have been 13 next month. Deceased's life was insured. The reservoir where he was drowned was railed all round and properly secured and protected. The railings seemed to be between four and five feet high. Boys were in the habit of bathing in the reservoir. It was not a safe place to bathe in. he thought that every endeavour was made to get his son out as soon as possible. Deceased and others had been cautioned not to bathe there.

Tom Hardie (12) said that deceased, himself, Edward Humphreys and a boy named Scott went to bathe in the reservoir about a quarter to four on the previous afternoon. They climbed over the railings and he and deceased went into the reservoir. Billy said, "Watch me swim," and Humphreys said, "I back you a penny you can't swim." When he got into the middle he fell on his back and began flapping about. They had been racing and were very hot when they went into the water. He did not think deceased was seized with cramp. Nobody had ever told him not to bathe in the reservoir, which was very deep. The water was dirty and it was not a good place for bathing. He knew they had no business to go there.

By jurymen: There is a gate to the reservoir, which is locked. The water is so deep in parts that it takes a man overhead. I have seen Mr Connor chasing boys away.

A Juryman thought that it was a very dangerous place, and ought to be covered over.

The Coroner: What do you think caused the boy to sink? Could he not swim?

Witness: yes, but he was too tired to battle with his hands.

A Juryman: I think he must have been taken with cramp.

Witness in reply to a question said that deceased had swam across the reservoir many a time.

Samuel Burney, coalminer, 2 Bransty-villa, said that the reservoir was private property, and was used by the Whitehaven Colliery Company. It was fenced all round with a good fence. Boys often bathed there. The water varied in depth. Where the body was found the water was six feet six inches deep. The place was not suitable for bathing. No one had a right to bathe there. He heard that a little boy had been drowned in the reservoir about twenty minutes to five on Tuesday afternoon, and he went at once to the place. He had to climb over the railings. George Atkinson, son of Mr Atkinson, pork merchant, was there and they both used their best efforts to recover the body. He was in the water twenty minutes. A young man named Bell also assisted. The water was so muddy that it was with great difficulty witness found where the body was lying. The body would be in the water half an hour before it was got out.

The Coroner said that the witness was to be complimented upon what he had done. He had been very courageous. . .the jury returned a verdict to the effect that deceased was accidentally drowned whilst bathing in the Bransty reservoir, which they considered to be a dangerous place. It was suggested that some measures should be taken to prevent boys bathing in the reservoir, and the Coroner said that the Colliery Company would no doubt do all they could to stop the practice.

Deceased, who had reached the good old age of 72 years, belonged to a very old Whitehaven family of the name of Dobbins, and was left a widow two years since. Mrs Nulty leaves a family of ten to mourn her loss. Deceased was very highly respected by a large circle of friends in the town and district. After an illness extending over twelve days, deceased passed away on Saturday last. The funeral service was impressively read by Mr J Davidson, the town missionary.

DISASTERS AT SEA. During a heavy gale on Monday morning, the brigantine Bransty was seen to be drifting towards the Long Rocks in Dundrum Bay, upon which she soon struck. The Pyrella Lifeboat, of the National Lifeboat Institution, at once proceeded to the wreck, and was fortunately enabled to save the crew of six men. It was only with the greatest difficulty that they were rescued, and the captain had his leg broken while getting into the lifeboat. The vessel is likely to become a total wreck.

Yesterday morning at eleven o'clock, R F Dill, Esq. MD, Coroner for the Borough of Belfast, held an adjourned inquest in the General Hospital on the body of a man named James O'Donnell, who met his death from the effects of injuries received by falling into the hold of the Whitehaven steamer Queen, on the 23<sup>rd</sup> October last. Mr John Rea appeared on the part of the next of kin of the deceased, and Mr Alexander O'Rorke was present to watch the proceedings on behalf of the steamship company. Before the inquest was proceeded with, the Coroner and the jury proceeded to Donegall Quay, where the Queen was lying, and viewed the place where the accident occurred.

James Coyd deposed – I am a seaman on board the Queen of Whitehaven. I saw the deceased, James O'Donnell, coming on board the Queen, walking under the planks, on the night of the 23<sup>rd</sup> October. I saw him return again, and soon afterwards I heard that he had fallen into the hold. I then had deceased brought out of the hold and placed on a car. The deceased was shouting from the pain which he was suffering. It was dark at the time. There was a lamp on shore near the vessel. There was sufficient light on board to enable people to take care of themselves. The deceased fell about twelve feet. The deceased was engaged in shipping a horse at the time. When I was engaged in loosing the cravat of the deceased, after he fell, I smelled spirits upon him. After the deceased fell I said, "That's the fruit of drink." A friend of the deceased said, "No, its wine." I did not observe that the deceased was under the influence of drunk before he fell. The planks were from the vessel to the shore, and were used in loading. The vessel is a paddle steamer, and has a quarter-deck. There was no light over the hold, nor any light in the hold. The passengers are obliged to come on board on the quarter-deck. I never saw the vessel better lighted than she was on the night in question. The smell which I felt was the spirits. I don't know that it was wine. I won't swear that the deceased was drunk or incapable of taking care of himself. I did not tell the deceased that he should not go the way which I saw him going.

Other persons who were on board the vessel at the time were next examined, and gave evidence of a similar nature.

Mr Nolan, a brother-in-law of the deceased, was examined and stated that Mr O'Donnell was a tailor and draper in Whitehaven. He was over in Belfast for the purpose of buying a carriage and pony. The deceased was not of intemperate habits. He occasionally drank a glass of wine but never touched whiskey. He leaves a wife and five children. . .

The jury found "That James O'Donnell, who died in the General Hospital on the 2<sup>nd</sup> day of November, came to his death from injuries received by falling into the hold of the steamship Queen, of Whitehaven, on the 23<sup>rd</sup> October 1867, and the jurors do further say that there was neglect and carelessness on the part of said steamship company in not having sufficient light, and in not having a proper fence at the hold of said ship at the time deceased met with the injury."

#### MELANCHOLY OCCURRENCE IN IRISH STREET

On Saturday morning last, about ten o'clock, an accident occurred in the timber-yard of Messrs. John Jackson and Co., Irish-street, whereby a boy named Joseph Orange, aged eight years, was killed on the spot, and another boy, named William Steward, about a year younger, had his leg broken. It would appear that Orange and Steward were playing on some planks which were piled up against a wall, when, from some cause, a number of the planks fell, the two boys being underneath. Orange, as already stated, was killed instantaneously; and Steward (who resides in Irish-street) was removed to' the Infirmary. The father of the

deceased Joseph Orange is John Orange, who resides in Cross-street, and is a messenger for the Parkside Mining Company. On Saturday afternoon Thomas Howson, Esq., held an inquest upon view of the body of the deceased, at the Golden Ball, Irish-street. The following gentlemen were sworn upon the jury: —Mr. William Kitchin (foreman), Mr. William Brown, Mr. William Storey, Mr. James M'Naughton, Mr. James Egerton, Mr. Jonathan Townsley, Mr. John Bennett, Mr. Joseph Bewley, Mr. John Walker, Mr. Thomas Shillito, Mr. Matthew Mossop, and Mr. James Nicholson. The following evidence was adduced: Miles Dobson, a boy of 13 or 14, son of Henry Dobson, brewer, Irish-street, deposed that he saw deceased and Steward get upon the wall of Messrs. Jackson's timber-yard. He could not see them upon the planks, but on hearing some planks fall he ran round. He lifted one of the planks and got Steward out. There were three or four planks on the top of Orange, so that witness could not get him out. He helped some women to take off the planks. Orange did not cry or make any noise. Witness thought the boys had got on to the planks from the top of the wall, and that they had been amusing themselves by jumping off. He had seen them playing there before.

Elizabeth M'Leary said she lived in Spedding's-court, next to the timber yard in Irish-street. When she was in her own house she heard a terrible crash, and a child's voice cried, "Oh, my mother." She went with a neighbour woman into the yard. The deceased was so covered with planks that they could only see his feet. Witness said, "Speak to me," but he never spoke. They tried to lift the planks, but there were many upon him that they could not so. They ran round into the other yard, and got a man to help to remove the planks. Deceased was quite dead. His mouth and his nose were bleeding. The planks, over his body, seemed as if they had come down from against the wall. Children are always playing at that place. They sway upon the planks, and make swings of them. She had seen them get on and jump off the heap to the ground.

Thomas Christian, a labourer with Messrs. Jackson, and who lives in James's-place, assisted to remove the planks. Deceased was lying upon his belly, and witness thought there were two deals lying across his back. The deals were about 25 feet in length. They were piled by James Stephens in the way that deals are usually plied. Children played there every day: they could not be kept off. James Stephens, who resides at the Barracks, said he was a labourer in the employ of Messrs. Jackson. He piled some deals in the yard against the Irish-street wall. He finished them a week last Thursday; they were piled all safe, and so that a man could not pull them down. There would be 28 deals piled against the wall, and 21 piled next to that. The pile would be 5 ½ feet in height. Witness thought the deals might have been displaced by children jumping upon them from the wall. He had seen children try to throw the piles down. When the men were away at dinner, the children would try to cant bits logs over.

The Deputy-Coroner, in summing up, said he did not think they could find any other verdict than one of accidental death. It did not seem that there had been negligence of any kind. The occurrence was much to be regretted, but there was no help for such things. The Jury then returned verdict of "Accidental death."

Yesterday (Tuesday) morning the death took place at 8 Howgill Street, Whitehaven, of Mr David Ord, who for many years was a familiar figure in local musical circles. Mr Ord had reached the advanced age of 85 years, and until about a fortnight ago enjoyed comparatively good health, despite the fact that owing to an unfortunate accident he had for the past five or six years been very lame, and could only go about with the aid of crutches. He was a native of Whitehaven, and at an early age displayed musical talent, the

development of which led him to prominence as a violinist not only locally but in many parts of the country. Mr Ord however did not entirely confine his attention to music. He was also much interested in the photographic art, and was one of the first to take up this work in Whitehaven. He, in fact, combined the two – music and photography – from a business point of view, and for some time had a studio in Duke Street. Ultimately he left Whitehaven and was away from the district for about thirty years, part of which time he had an extensive photographic business in Belfast. During this period he was also very actively engaged in musical work, largely in the orchestral line. On returning to Whitehaven he again took up photography in the town, having a studio at Richmond Terrace, where he also continued the profession of music teacher. Eventually he gave up photography, and devoted the whole of his time to musical matters. For many years he acted as teacher of the violin at St Bees Grammar School, and for a considerable period he was closely identified with musical societies in Whitehaven and Workington, more particularly in oratorio work. On these occasions he invariably took the lead in the orchestra as “first violin” and he will be remembered by many of his old friends as the leader of the orchestra at the Whitehaven Choral Society’s performances in Mr Mitchell’s time as conductor. As a player and teacher of the violin Mr Ord had a great vogue in the district, and in his day he was much sought after. Mr Ord was held in high esteem by many people in West Cumberland. He was one of the best type of men – resolute and upright in everything and at the same time possessed of a cheery and sympathetic disposition which gained him numerous friends and admirers, who will hear of his death with some regret.

#### October 3<sup>rd</sup> 1871 Cumberland Pacquet

The melancholy tidings reached Whitehaven on Thursday that the brig Manley, of this port, Captain Borrowdale managing owner, had been lost and that the crew, with a single exception, had met with a watery grave. The Manley traded between Whitehaven and Newport, but on Wednesday night she was bound from the latter port to Dublin with coal, when she encountered a severe storm in the Channel, and foundered off Drogheda Bar. The names of the lost are: John Graham, master, no 11 Schoolhouse Lane; Henry Allison, mate, High-queen-street; John Housby, cook, James’s Place; Thomas Hinde, apprentice, West Strand; John Reed, apprentice; and a Manx boy, also an apprentice. The captain has left a wife to mourn her loss; Allison a wife and three children, and Housby a wife verging upon her confinement. The boy Reed was a fine lad 14 years of age, who had been bound apprentice from the Workhouse. Wm Lacey, the only one who escaped, reached the shore in a very exhausted state, after desperate efforts to save his life. He is an able bodied seaman, and lives with his mother at a place called the Windmill, above Rosemary Lane. On Friday evening the following telegram was received by Mrs Graham from Constable Sweeney, Dormanstown, County Meath: “Body found, inquest tomorrow. Telegraph disposal of body. Watch and money on person.”

The Liverpool Mercury publishes the following: “The lifeboat refused to put off to the rescue, as their craft could not go over the bar. The crew of the brig had climbed up into the rigging, and an attempt was made to get them off with the rocket apparatus, but without success. Night came on and the poor men were left in their perilous position. Next morning the vessel had disappeared, and six of the crew were drowned, one man only, as we have said, being saved.”

The Dublin Evening Mail gives the following account of the wreck: “On Wednesday afternoon the brig Manley, of Whitehaven, for Dublin with coals, was caught in the storm then blowing, and driven ashore at Belly town near Drogheda. The vessel immediately commenced to break up, and some of her crew threw themselves into the sea and made for the land. Two ladies, Miss Jane Campbell and Mrs Fox, Girley, Kells,



while standing on the beach apart, looking at the wreck, saw a man struggling in the water and evidently at the last effort. He was so exhausted that every attempt to keep his feet resulted in his being swept under water, and he had sunk once or twice when the two ladies observed him. Both the heroic women at once dashed into the water, and when they reached the now senseless man were up to their armpits in the waves. They seized the poor creature with a hand each, and thus succeeded, though with great difficulty, in getting him to land. He was removed to Mrs Grant's hotel, where restoratives were applied, and he was soon able to thank his deliverers.

**The Royal National Lifeboat Institution and the Loss of the Brig Manley**

On Thursday a meeting of this institution was held at its house, John-street, Adelphi . . . the minutes of the previous meeting having been read, rewards amounting to £201 were voted to the crews of various lifeboats for services rendered during recent storms, when no less than 49 lives and four vessels were saved by the boats. . . The silver medal of the institution and a copy of the vote inscribed on vellum were granted to Miss Jane Campbell of Drogheda, Ireland, in acknowledgement of her brave conduct during a strong eastern gale, in wading into a heavy surf and saving one of the crew of the brig Manley of Whitehaven, which had been wrecked near Drogheda Bar. The poor man was in a very exhausted state when rescued, as he had been a long time in the water, and had floated some distance with the aid of a life-buoy, and he would inevitably have perished had it not been for the noble conduct of Miss Campbell in rushing, at great peril, to his rescue and then using proper means to restore him to consciousness. The thanks of the institution, inscribed on vellum, were also presented to Mrs Fox, of Kells near Drogheda, in testimony of her most valuable services in aiding and encouraging Miss Campbell to accomplish her mission of mercy. The institution decided to station an additional lifeboat near Drogheda, on the south side of the mouth of the Boyne.

#### FATAL PASTIME AT KELLS

Difficulty with Witnesses

#### DEAD BOY'S PLAYMATES AFRAID TO SPEAK

An inquest was held in Kells Reading Room on Saturday afternoon by Mr E Atter, coroner for West Cumberland, with reference to the death of James Parker, aged 14, who, as reported in Saturday's issue, was found drowned in a quarry pond at Kells on Friday afternoon. Mr J Henderson was foreman of the jury. Isaac Parker, collier, 14 South Row, Kells, the father of the boy, said his son went to Monkwearthorpe School and was in the habit of coming home between half past three and four o'clock in the afternoon. He did not know until Thursday night that he had been going to the quarry. He had warned him many a time not to go near it, and a week or a fortnight ago he told him he would give him a "hammering" if he heard of him being there, because one or two boys had been drowned in the pond before. He did not see the boy on Thursday. Robinson Parker, brother of the deceased boy, said the latter came home from school about a quarter to four on Thursday afternoon. He just came into the house for a piece of bread and went out again. He very often did that. Witness did not see anyone waiting for him outside but he knew a boy named Tom Glaister was one of his companions. His brother did not say anything to him about going to the quarry. He had heard his parents tell him not to go there. He had seen lads sailing on a raft on the pond about a week ago. John Young, who lives with his parents at 22 South Row, Kells, and attends Coach Road School, said he saw James Parker on Tuesday afternoon and he asked witness if he was going on the raft which was on the quarry pond. Witness said he was not but he went to see the raft along with Parker, William and Tom Sewell, Wm Lowery and George Garrett. The last-named and Parker got on the raft and afterwards Lowery, Garrett and a boy named Choyce went on. Witness was at the quarry again on Wednesday with Lowery and another boy but he did not see anyone go on the raft that day.

Wm Lowery, aged eight, who also lives at Kells, said he and some other boys went to the quarry on Thursday after school. Amongst the boys were John Young, Tom Garrett, Choyce and the deceased. The latter was on the raft and on getting off said he would go home for a piece of bread. Garrett went with him, and witness did not see him again. As soon as Parker had got over the wall of the field witness and the other lads also went home. There was no one at the quarry when they left. Witness had been told not to go to the quarry. He once went on the raft but got a "welting" for it.

The Foreman: Are you sure John Young was with you on Thursday? Witness: Yes.

George Garrett (12) who lives at 2 South Row, Kells, said Parker and he came home from school together on Thursday night. Parker went into the house, and witness also went home and he did not see him again. Witness had not been at the quarry pond that week.

The Coroner: We have been told you were there.

Witness: no, sir.

The Coroner: Did you not leave the quarry with James Parker when he said he was going home for some bread? No, sir, I was not with him there. Parker told him he had been on the pond on the previous Saturday. Lowery, re-called, said it was the witness's brother Thomas who was with Parker.

Witness said his brother went out to play at Low Kells on Thursday night.

Thomas Garrett (9) stated that he was not with Parker on Thursday night after they returned home from school. He had only seen the raft once and was not at the quarry on Thursday.

The Coroner (to Lowery); he says he was not there on Thursday.

Lowery: he and James Parker were on the raft.

Garrett: I was laking football.

Lowery repeated that Garrett was on the raft with Parker.

Garrett: I went to see where James Parker was, and his mother said he was not in.

By the Coroner: Parker told him he was coming out in a minute but he did not wait for him as he wanted to go and play football.

Have you ever got a thrashing for going to this place? Yes, sir.

Is that why you are afraid to tell the truth now? No, sir, I am telling the truth.

The Coroner said as regards the boys he was afraid it was utterly useless endeavouring to try to get at the truth. . .

The jury returned a verdict that James Parker had been accidentally drowned and made a recommendation in accordance with the Coroner's suggestion with regard to the removal of the raft.

An inquest on the body of Jonathan Parker who was found drowned in the quarry pond on Tuesday, was held in the Sunday Schoolroom, Hensingham, by Mr Ed. Attar, Coroner for the Lordship of Egremont, and a jury of which Mr Taylor was foreman.

Wm Cooper, 23 Bedford Street Hensingham, shop manager, said he was the son in law of Jon. Parker, who came to live with them at the beginning of this week. Prior to that Parker lived with his daughter who had

removed to Workington. He was 77 years of age, a widower, and a retired coalminer. He had been fairly healthy lately but at times suffered from heart weakness and fits of depression. Parker had no other trouble to affect him that witness was aware of, nor did he consider him weak minded. He did not think the removal of his daughter had affected him any. He had never threatened to do away with himself, and they never had the least suspicion. Witness last saw Parker about 8.45 am when he partook of a good breakfast and afterwards went out for a walk as was his custom. He asked him to put on his top coat before leaving, which he did. He was never previously away more than an hour at a time. As he did not return, witness went out to look for him at his son's at Mill Hill, Hensingham, as he went there occasionally, but he had not been there. Parker suffered from dizziness at times. Returning, witness met Mr Gregory, who told him that the body of his father in law was in the quarry pond. There was a dangerous footpath leading to the pond.

The Foreman said he did not wish to imply that he had fallen from the footpath. Witness: No. He wished on behalf of the bereaved family to thank PC Horsfall for the sustained efforts he made in trying to restore the life of deceased. He deserved their deepest gratitude for his valuable aid, and so did all who helped to restore animation.

William McKew, Distressed Sailor, Hensingham, said he was a quarryman. He was going to see the circus at Cleator Moor on Tuesday about 12.30 am, when he saw something in the water and came down to ascertain what it was, and found the deceased lying on his back in about two feet of water. He did not disturb the body but ran for PC Horsfall. His idea in not removing the body was that the police constable had to be the first acquainted with the matter.

The Coroner: it is a mistake to have that idea. Probably if you had removed him from the water he would have been brought round. Witness: I could not have removed him myself. Besides I have had no experience in ambulance work. I would not be away more than a few minutes.

Dr Norton said he was called to see the body about 2.30pm yesterday and pronounced life extinct on his arrival. The body had been drowned. There was no appearance of any struggle and his clothing was not in any way displaced.

PC Horsfall deposed that he was informed of the occurrence about 12.35 and proceeded to the place and found Parker lying partly on his side in about two feet of water. He administered Sivester's system of artificial respiration for about 1 ½ hours without success. . . The jury returned a verdict of "Found drowned."

On Saturday afternoon Mr E Atter, coroner for West Cumberland, held an inquest at Whitehaven Police Court with reference to the death of Wm Parkinson, who was crushed between a bogie and a full sett whilst following his employment as a bogie hand in William Pit, Whitehaven, on Friday morning. Mr C Brownrigg was foreman of the jury. There were present: Mr A D Nicholson, H.M. Inspector of Mines; Mr O F Ormrod (Messrs Brockbank, Helder and Ormrod) who attended on behalf of the Whitehaven Colliery Company; Mr S Turner, manager of William Pit.

Robt. Parkinson, collier, 10 Bransty Road, who has been in the employ of the Colliery Company for 23 or 24 years, said Wm Parkinson was his son and was 17 ½ years old He had worked at William Pit for about 3 ½ years as a haulage hand. On the day of the accident he was on the first shift and left home at 20 minutes past four.

By the Foreman: Deceased, as a bogie hand, looked after the clutch bogies.

Witness, in reply to the inspector, said his son was quite qualified to do the work upon which he was engaged.

Richard Atkinson, haulage hand, who had been employed by the Colliery Company for about 15 years, said he was working with Wm Parkinson on Friday morning. Parkinson came out of where witness was working with the full setts. Witness was about 150 yards away when the accident happened. This was about 10.30 or 10.45. Robert McKee knocked a bogie off, and just then a lad named Robt. Robbs ran out-by, and said

there was a lad fast in-by. Witness went to the place, and saw Parkinson lying across the road between a bogie and a full tub. The coupling of the bogie had hold of him by the shoulder and they had to get assistance to release him. This took about a quarter of an hour. Witness thought Parkinson had either been stooping down trying to couple a tub off, or else lifting the chain to prevent it from dropping. He thought he must have lost his footing and fallen. He had not seen an accident of that kind before. The rope might at any time be stopped by some person "knocking" in another part of the mine.

By the Inspector: It was about 160 or 170 yards off that he saw the bogie knocked off the way. The rope would stop then, and it would be then that Parkinson was caught.

By the Coroner: There were no marks of blood except at one place, and there were no signs of Parkinson having been trailed.

Robt. Robbs, bogie hand at William Pit, said Parkinson had worked with him for some time. Parkinson had been doing his work all right on Friday morning, and witness was some distance away at the time of the occurrence. He was returning when he accidentally trampled on Parkinson's leg, and he then found him lying fastened under a bogie and first tub. Witness went for assistance, and the full tubs had to be pushed back to release the body. Parkinson had a light but it had gone out.

By the Inspector: This was the fourth sett Parkinson was bringing out that morning. When witness left Parkinson the latter had three "lockings" in the wheels and one was in the last tub. All the bogies were on the rails.

John Rothery, under manager at William Pit, explained the duties of Parkinson and the witness Robbs. The latter came a certain distance with Parkinson and then returned, leaving Parkinson to proceed to the "landing place" with the full sett. The bogie was a means of attachment to the full setts, and there were 16 tubs on a sett, the gradient being in favour of the load. If there were not sufficient lockings in, the bogie might detach itself, and from the position of Parkinson's body, witness thought the lad must have been picking the bogie chain up when he stumbled between the bogie and the full sett.

The Coroner: There would have been no risk if the bogie and the tubs were stationary. There must have been some movement of the rope to move the bogie and the sett.

Witness said the bogie might be "at rest" and the tubs at motion. He did not see anything to show that the deceased had been trailed in any way. He had passed the lads about forty minutes before the accident, when they were preparing to hang the sett on. Parkinson was then doing his work all right, and the sett had been properly made up. He could not swear as to what scotches there would be in, but it was usual to use from four to six at that place. Parkinson was a very quiet and careful lad . . . The Coroner said the evidence seemed to have been given in a satisfactory manner, and the accident appeared to have been unavoidable. The jury at once returned a verdict of "Accidental death."

We regret to announce the death of Mr John Pearson, corn merchant, which took place at his residence, Hamilton Terrace, Corkickle, Whitehaven, on Sunday morning, in his eighty-fifth year. Mr Pearson, despite his great weight of years was able to pursue his private and public duties with remarkable energy up till March last when he contracted a cold and since then had been more or less confined to the house. On March 1<sup>st</sup> last the Whitehaven Board of Guardians, of which he was a member, through the Chairman, congratulated Mr Pearson on the attainment of his eighty-fourth year and expressed a hope that he would long continue a member of the board, but as a matter of fact he was only able to attend the next meeting, immediately after which he was laid up, suffering from a severe cold. He was able to drive out on one or two occasions, but he gradually sank and passed peacefully away as already stated. The news of his death was everywhere received with regret for it not only removes one of the most picturesque and worthy figures in the public life of the Town, but one whose unassuming and genial disposition no less than his striking earnestness made him alike respected and admired. Mr Pearson's private life had been somewhat varied. Born in 1816, he had the misfortune to lose his father when only two years old, and consequently had no schooling beyond learning the alphabet at a dame's school. He applied for admission at Piper's Marine School but had not sufficient influence to obtain it. As a lad, he was employed for some time at the grocer's shop which was rebuilt and is occupied by the Mayor. Here he remained until he was 16, when, feeling the need and value of an education of some kind, he was bound apprentice to the editor of the "Whitehaven Herald" which was then being printed and published where Messrs Moss and Sons' premises now stand in Lowther Street. Whilst on the "Herald" he took part in the Coronation procession, printing Coronation songs on an old-fashioned printing press, carried through the town on a lorry. Shortly after the end of his seven years' apprenticeship, which during the early part of it entailed a very hard struggle to "make ends meet," he commenced business as grocer in the shop now occupied by Mr Tom Spedding, Roper Street, where he remained till 1849, when he took over a tallow chandlery business, carried on where Messrs Wilson and Kitchin's premises now stand in King Street, and took the late Mr H Hampton as partner. This firm was dissolved in 1857, when he joined Mr Tomlinson in the grain business in the large warehouse in Preston Street, opposite the Goods Station. That partnership continued till 1865, when he established himself at the grain trade in partnership with his son, at their present address in Queen Street. He has taken a share in many enterprises in the district, chiefly connected with mining, amongst which are Kinniside Lead Mines, Birker Copper Mines, Haycastle Colliery, Dyke Nook Mining Company, Frizington, and in searching for iron ore at Rowray and Egremont, besides other similar ventures. He was one of the promoters of the New Gas Company, established for the purpose of reducing the price of gas, and succeeded the late Mr Paitson, solicitor, as its chairman until it was sold to the Old Company, now known as the United Company. He was also for many years director of the Savings Bank, of which he was a trustee. He was also a Guardian of the Poor for the township of Whitehaven, the duties of which office his long acquaintance with the inhabitants specially qualified him for, so that when in 1894 he was left out in the cold through the abstention of friends, who did not consider it necessary to vote, he was co-opted by his fellow Guardians unanimously at the first opportunity. For some years he was a member and subsequent chairman of the Whitehaven and Preston Quarter Burial Board. As a private ratepayer he took an active part in the agitations for introducing Ennerdale water into the town, and the sewerage of the town, and also in the School Board contest of 1876. Whilst a strong Liberal in politics he had not been a candidate for municipal office with exception of leading a forlorn hope in Newtown Ward in 1858, and coming forward in obedience to pressure from friends as a candidate for Trinity Ward six years ago, when he was beaten by Mr Richard Cousins. He had been an abstainer all his life and at one time took a very active part in temperance agitation. Mr Pearson was the oldest member of the Whitehaven Congregational Church both in standing and age. He joined that church some sixty-eight years ago on conscientious grounds, his "forbears" small statesmen in the neighbourhood



of Arlecdon having been Churchmen. Since that time he had been actively engaged in various branches of its work. For many years he was teacher in the Sunday School whilst the late Mr William Wilson was superintendent, and afterwards became superintendent of the "Bethel" Mission School, which post he held until 1894, when an attack of illness prevented him continuing to give the constant attention with position required, and so compelled him reluctantly to give it up. For 19 years he was treasurer of the church and this office he vacated in accordance with a new rule which renders periodical retirement compulsory. Afterwards he was re-elected deacon, which office he continued to hold. He had also represented the church as a delegate to and member of the committee of the Cumberland Congregational Union for many years, subject to the retirement rule, and had occasionally been delegate to the meetings of the Congregational Union of England and Wales, the highest authority of the denomination. He leaves one son and a daughter. Flags were raised half-mast at the Harbour Office and other buildings in the Town on the announcement of the sad news.

**DEATH OF MR MILES MILETHWAITE, OF THE HOLLINS, HENSINGHAM.**

We regret to announce the death of Mr Miles Postlethwaite, of The Hollins, Hensingham, near Whitehaven. The circumstances attending the demise of the deceased gentleman are somewhat sad. He was a great traveller, having visited almost every part of the globe as a gleaner of information into the forms of government, habits and customs of the people of the various countries he visited. On Monday Mr T. Brown, town clerk of Whitehaven, had the melancholy intelligence conveyed to him from the Official Registrar of the East Africa Protectorate that his client and friend, Mr Postlethwaite, had died at Mombasi, in that territory, on the 14<sup>th</sup> November, from smallpox. It appears from the information to hand that Mr Postlethwaite had only been five weeks at Mombasi, having arrived there from Zanzibar. More than this of the deceased gentleman's movements immediately prior to his death is not known.

Mr Postlethwaite served his time to the iron and steel trade, taking a seat, immediately on completing his education, in the commercial office of the large iron and steel firm of Bolckow, Vaughan, and Company, Middlesbrough, where he remained several years. In 1878, upon the demise of his father, the late Mr John Postlethwaite, solicitor, Whitehaven, then the present Town Clerk's partner, the deceased became entitled to the Hollins estate, and settled down there for some time as a quiet, unobtrusive country gentleman, but the spirit of travel was upon him, as evidenced for many years by the fact that he has only paid short visits to the very prettily situated mansion and grounds, with the farm lands and pastures attached to it, at The Hollins, his time being mostly spent abroad. Following up his commercial training Mr Postlethwaite worked his own iron ore Royalty, which is known as the Postlethwaite Moor Row Mines. He was also one of the owners and lessors of the Postlethwaite Eskett Mines. The deceased gentleman was a JP for Cumberland. He was also one of the largest shareholders and a director for some years of the old Moss Bay Iron and Steel Company. He was a Liberal in politics, and president of the Hensingham Liberal Club, but took no very active part in political controversy. He never married, and his immediate relatives left to mourn his loss are one brother and two sisters. Deceased's medical attendant, who paid him every attention in his last illness, was Dr McDonald, the principal medical officer of the East African Protectorate. Mr Postlethwaite will be much missed about Hensingham as an employer of labour especially. It was often remarked that "he meade wark," and there is no doubt he did, by training, planting, and improving The Hollins estate in every way he could think of. He was a good landlord and a kind master. The deceased was born on the 29th day of May, 1857, and was therefore in his 43rd year.

Railway, Warrington, and afterwards with Mr Silcocks, general merchant, Poulton-le-Fylde. The funeral will take place at the Cemetery, Whitehaven, tomorrow (Thursday) afternoon, at 3.10 pm. The officials at Moor Row have been authorised from the Barrow office to run a special mourning train, leaving Moor Row at 2.35pm to Corkickle Station and returning to Moor Row after the burial service.

An old and much respected resident of Whitehaven departed this life suddenly on Saturday last in the person of Mr John Potts of Corkickle. Mr Potts had just taken a ticket at Drigg Railway Station to return home by the train due at Whitehaven at 4.20 in the afternoon. He crossed the line to the side at which the train would pull up, and then had sat down under the station shed and was smoking a cigar, when he dropped forwards off the seat. Dr Squires of Whittingham (a visitor to Seascale) was present on the platform at the time; but medical aid was useless and in no more than two or three minutes Mr Potts was no more. Intelligence having been sent to Whitehaven, Dr Jackson, who had been attending the deceased, and Mr H J Whiteside, the deputy coroner, went to Drigg the same evening. Death was certified to have taken place from apoplexy, and an inquest was not deemed necessary. The body of the deceased was removed to Whitehaven by the last train the same night. It transpired that deceased had complained to some of his customers of not feeling very well. Mr Potts was formerly for many years manager for Mr George Wilkinson, draper and clothier, Market Place, Whitehaven. Subsequently, for a short time, he was in business in King Street on his own account. His health broke down and he has perhaps never been the same man since. For the last sixteen years he has travelled for Messrs J and J Tyson, King Street. Mr Potts was for a great number of years identified with the Methodist Free Church, Catherine Street, as a local preacher and Superintendent of the Sunday School in connection to that place. He was often called upon to preside at school and chapel anniversaries, where he was always well received, and his well-known face and familiar soldier-like form will long be remembered by the attenders of the Free Methodist churches in the Whitehaven circuit. He was quiet and unassuming in demeanour, of a religious cast of mind, he was not conspicuous in any other connection: but he will be remembered by many obscure ones for his kindness to the poor. #### SUDDEN DEATH OF A CARLISLE MAN IN WHITEHAVEN

Mr William Henry Rayson of Scotch Street, Whitehaven, died suddenly on Thursday. Mr Rayson was a son of Mr George Rayson, formerly lemonade and soda water manufacturer of Botchergate, Carlisle. He had been in Whitehaven for about 22 years as a manure merchant, and was well known to a large section of the public attending the various markets in the district, and his pleasant manner and kindly nature won for him many friends. For a considerable time he had suffered from bronchitis. On Thursday afternoon last he was taken ill at his office and went home in a conveyance. Dr l'Anson was called in, and notwithstanding that everything possible was done for him, Mr Rayson died after great suffering from inflammation at a quarter to twelve the same night. He was in his 50<sup>th</sup> year, and leaves a widow and one son.

**December 2<sup>nd</sup> 1899 Burnley Express**

The death occurred on Sunday at the Skipton Grammar School of Mr J B Rayson, M.A., classical master. Mr Rayson had only been ill a few days, and after attending a rehearsal of the Skipton Choral Society on the preceding Tuesday night, he took a chill which developed into pneumonia, and this, acting on a weak heart, caused death. Mr Rayson came to Skipton Grammar School after graduating at St John's College, Cambridge, with classical honours, in 1882, and for 17 years he had occupied his present position and was regarded with much affection by both past and present boys. He was then transferred to Moor Row fitting sheds, and a few years ago was removed to the Corkickle sheds, of which he had charge until failing health compelled him to give up his work about eighteen months since. He was confined to his rooms only for a few days before his death. Mr Richardson was a man of genial and kindly disposition, and will be missed in many quarters. He took a warm interest in the Whitehaven Working Men's Institution, of which he was one of the oldest members, and at one time filled the position of president. He was also a member of the committee of the Whitehaven and West Cumberland Building Society, and gave his very best attention to the interests of the society. He was greatly esteemed and admired by his fellow committeemen, who deeply regret his demise. Mr Richardson, who was 65 years of age, leaves a widow and, in her sad bereavement, she has the sincere sympathy of many friends.

J H Richardson, the Whitehaven Recreation half-back, received fatal injuries whilst playing for his county against Yorkshire at Leeds on Saturday. He had been chosen as first reserve, and accordingly succeeded Lomas at half-back, where up to the time of the accident, which was early in the game, he had played a really clever game. The accounts of the unfortunate player's sad death as published in most papers are somewhat inaccurate, and what really occurred, as witnessed by a Cumberland supporter, was as follows: - R Stephenson, the Cumberland and Parton full-back was waiting for the ball, kicked by a Yorkshire player, between the Cumberland twenty-five and the goal line, and near touch. Richardson evidently thinking he could intercept the ball first, also made for it, with the result that he collided with Stephenson, bouncing off him severely, and evidently being much hurt in the abdomen. After half-time, however, he resumed, and soon shone in a very dashing run from half-way to the Yorkshire twenty-five, where he passed. This exertion seemed to be his undoing, apparently having given the old sore part a twist, for he at once fell exhausted and in agony. After temporary attention in the dressing room, he was removed on the ambulance to the Infirmary, the report on entry being "severe abdominal injury." So serious was his condition that it was deemed necessary for him to undergo an operation. This took place on Sunday night at the Infirmary. At midnight there was still hope of his recovery, although he was still in a critical condition, but on Monday afternoon the unfortunate young man died from his injuries.

The sad accident has naturally caused great regret throughout Northern football circles, and especially in the Whitehaven district, where Richardson was very popular with all classes, his cleverness on the field and his pleasant manners winning him hosts of friends. The Recreation Club in particular and the county also have sustained a severe loss by his tragic death. He was one of those players who could, as indeed he had often been called to, fill any position behind the scrimmage, and apparently had a bright future before him. Last season he played against Cheshire, and only three weeks ago against Northumberland and Durham, at Workington, in which match for the greater part of the game his cleverness was conspicuous. He commenced his football career at the age of 15 years, when he played full back for the Whitehaven Hornets, a junior combination. From that team he went over to the late Whitehaven Rugby Union Club, and played for the second fifteen at full-back for a season. He afterwards secured a place in the first fifteen at half-back, and on the Club being disbanded he joined the Recreation, for which club he has rendered capital service at full-back, centre threequarter, and in the half-back position. In fact he was one of the most useful and capable members the club was possessed of. Richardson lived with his parents at the Ginns, Whitehaven, and would have been 22 years of age on the 15<sup>th</sup> day of this month. He was about 5 ft 6 in in height, and weighed about 11 st. He was the holder of prizes for both cricket and football, and was a member of the Whitehaven Artillery Volunteers, with whom he has been at camp at New Brighton on various occasions, and was a favourite with his comrades. Locally he was known by the sobriquet of "Pudding Hill. . ."

The deceased's remains will be interred on Sunday at the Whitehaven Cemetery at 2.30 pm. The funeral will be a military one, as deceased was a member of the 1<sup>st</sup> CVRG Artillery, and is well-known amongst the various corps throughout the county. Besides the Artillery Band the Borough Band will also be present, and several local football clubs, as well as the representatives of the county will be present.

A worthy representative of a generation fast dying out has just passed from amongst us. As will be seen from our obituary column, Mr Peter Richardson of the Retreat, near Whitehaven, died at his residence on Saturday last at the great age of 64. The life of the late Mr Richardson was an illustration of the benefits resulting from perseverance and - - honesty of purpose. Painful Fatality at Liverpool**

An accident of a very painful character occurred in the Mersey on Monday se-enight, on board the Coburg, Captain Gibson, about to leave for Philadelphia. It appears that William Robinson, son of Capt. Wm Robinson, Carter Lane, Whitehaven and another boy, supposed to have belonged to Liverpool, were upon the lower topsail yard, haling on the topsail sheet, when the latter lost his hold and in falling seized young Robinson. Both were precipitated to the main deck. They were picked up insensible, and Robinson died soon after the accident. Nor did the other lad survive long. This was only the Liverpool lad's first voyage; his companion had made a previous one.

**Coroners Inquests - Tuesday January 24<sup>th</sup>, before Mr C Aspinall, Coroner of Liverpool**

**On the body of Joseph Roper, 46 years of age, a master mariner who resided at 125 Grove-street. On Thursday week deceased complained to his wife of a pain in his stomach. She got him a draught and he appeared for a time to be better, but last Thursday he became very ill and a doctor was called. On Friday morning about 1.20 the wife of the deceased was awakened by hearing a peculiar noise in his throat, and on a doctor coming Roper was found to be dead. For the last three years deceased had followed no regular employment, having originally lost it through drinking habits. Evidence was given that Roper had been seen several times the worse for drink just previously to his illness. A post mortem examination had been made, which showed that death had resulted from inflammation of the bowels which was partly natural and partly due to drinking habits. Verdict, "Death from natural causes accelerated by drink."**

Lord Lonsdale's Butler Found Dead

About eight o'clock on Monday morning Mr William Sessions, 70 years of age, butler, was found dead on the floor of his bedroom at Whitehaven Castle. The deceased, who was an old and trusted servant of the Lowther family, had been ailing for a few days but declined to have a doctor called in. On Saturday night he stayed with his wife at his residence in Catherine-street, and passed a very restless night, but on Sunday he was a little better and proceeded about 8.30 to the Castle for the night. He spoke to the housemaid, Annie Buckingham, before retiring to his room, but made no complaint in regard to his health. As the usual time at which the deceased arose had passed, and he made no response to calls, Mr Streepton and Mr Gowan broke the bedroom door open and found him, as already stated, lying on the floor, dead. Dr Welby I'Anson,

who was called in, stated that the deceased had been dead for some time, having apparently died as he was getting into bed. In the doctor's opinion death was due to heart disease.

The Maryport Advertiser adds:

He was 70 years of age and had been in the employ of the Lowther family for the long period of forty-one years. He first entered the service of the late Colonel Lowther, grandfather of the present Earl, at Barleythorpe, and he was subsequently removed to Lowther Castle, where he remained till eight or nine years ago when he succeeded the late Mr Barker at Whitehaven Castle. He was one of the oldest, if not the oldest servant of the Lowther family by whom he was highly esteemed. He was a faithful and trustworthy servant and his death will be widely regretted for he was one who possessed a kindly and genial bearing and made many friends. He leaves a wife and family.

Mr Shippen in 1886 was one of the injured persons in the railway accident in Bransty Tunnel. He was at that time in the employ of the Furness Company and was engaged on the engine at the time of the accident. Ever since that unfortunate occasion Mr Shippen has been ailing more or less and had not been out of doors since June last. He had, however, only been confined to his bed since Sunday, and his death so suddenly was not expected. The deceased's long connection with the district both as a railway employee and host of the Shipwright's Arms rendered him a well-known man, and no one could have been more highly respected. His manner was characterised by an open geniality and kindness which won him many friends far and wide, and his death will be received with general regret and sympathy for Mrs Shippen and family. He was 76 years of age. The deceased was a keen sportsman. He was extremely fond of the greyhound and turned out a few good dogs. He was a great friend of Sir Thomas Brocklebank's trainer of greyhounds, and Sir Thomas who had a very high regard for Mr Shippen frequently sent him a puppy. The interment of Mr Shippen's remains will take place on Monday.

We learn with much regret that Mr William Smith, formerly editor and proprietor of the now defunct Whitehaven Herald, died at Whitehaven on Saturday last. Mr Smith was a veteran journalist of the old school, and his career was identical with that of the majority of the newspaper editors of the last generation. An Ayrshire youth of fine taste, great industry and some ambition, he commenced life as a shorthand writer and acquired some reputation as a swift and accurate reporter of public meetings. He went to Whitehaven first as editor of the Herald, and in that capacity the duties of editor, sub-editor, reporter and general manager all devolved upon him, and when in course of time he became proprietor of the paper his labours by no means diminished. He worked indefatigably and conscientiously in the face of many difficulties, at a time when Liberalism dared scarcely show any front at Whitehaven, and took a very active part both personally and in his paper promoting the political independence of the town. Failing health compelled him to give up work some years ago, but he carried with him into his retirement the respect of all, and while his services to the Liberal party will never be forgotten, his most determined opponents will admit that his writings were always marked by fairness and personal courtesy.

#### DREADFUL SHIPPING DISASTER AT WORKINGTON

On Friday morning last tidings reached Whitehaven that a vessel was ashore at Mossbay Workington, that she had gone to pieces, and that all hands had perished. This proved to be too true, and the unfortunate ship turned out to be the brigantine Amyntas of Liverpool, a vessel that had been bought by the master, Captain Snooks of this town, only some nine months previously. In addition to the crew there was also on board Captain Snooks's wife and family. It appears, from what we have been able to learn, that the Amyntas was a brigantine of about 200 tons burthen, and of North American build. She belonged to Liverpool, and was commanded by Captain Snooks of Whitehaven, who was also part owner. Some time ago the Amyntas left Swansea with a cargo of coal for the Workington Hematite Iron Company, and proceeded to Holyhead, where she remained till Thursday morning last, and then left for Workington, it probably being the intention of Captain Snooks to try and reach the last named port the following tide. The weather was very mild on Thursday morning, there was scarcely any wind and the sun shone brightly; but about noon the sky became gloomy and overcast, the wind began to rise and it increased in violence until the evening, when it blew a complete hurricane from the south-west, and the rain fell heavily and almost continuously. The storm raged

with unabated violence during the whole of Thursday night. About daybreak on Friday morning the steam-tug Confidence left Workington Harbour to take a vessel in tow which was outside, and after leaving the channel, persons on board the tug observed a large quantity of wreck floating on the sea about 300 yards from the pier. This wreck, it was afterwards discovered, was that of the ill-fated vessel Amyntas. It is thought that the vessel must have gone ashore just inside of the Mossbay Ironworks, but whether she had parted from her anchors or had been driven ashore, nobody can tell. About eight o'clock on Friday morning, a person named Abraham Vaughan, employed at the North Side Ironworks, found the body of a man which had been washed up by the tide, at a slag bank near the Ironworks. The man had nothing on by his singlet, and it is thought that when the wreck took place, he had stripped himself with the intention of trying to save his life by swimming ashore. About the same time a woman named White found on the shore at the North Side the body of Captain Snooks's youngest daughter, a girl about seven years of age. The girl had nothing on but a pair of stockings, a pair of drawers and a chemise. The two bodies were taken to the Railway Hotel. During the morning a third body, apparently that of the mate, was washed up on the south side of the harbour. He was dressed in a Guernsey jacket and a pair of duffle trousers, had what is called a "sou-wester" had upon his head, and a pair of stockings covered his feet and legs, but he had no boots on. He had a watch in his pocket, which had stopped at a quarter past six o'clock. His body was taken to the Cement House on the Quay. Shortly afterwards the body of the captain's eldest daughter, apparently about eleven years of age, drifted ashore on the north side. The poor little thing was dressed in a black frock, and her face was sadly excoriated in consequence of being dashed about on the beach by the waves. She was taken to the Railway Hotel and her corpse was laid beside that of her sister. Whilst a number of men were engaged in removing her to the inn, intelligence was received in the town that the corpse of her mother had been washed ashore at a place called Seaton Point, and a number of persons at once set out in search of it. The news of the sad occurrence spread with great rapidity through the town, and, as may be imagined, produced the most intense and painful excitement amongst the inhabitants. Large numbers of people assembled on the quay in the morning, and no sadder sight has ever been seen in Workington than the bringing up of one dead body after another from the sea shore. It is supposed that the crew of the vessel consisted of five or six hands, all told, and in addition to these, as we have already stated, there were on board of her when she went to pieces, the wife and two daughters of the captain. A clock, which was kept in the companion of the vessel, and which has been washed ashore, had stopped at twenty five minutes past five. The whole of the bodies were removed to the Railway Inn to await the coroner's inquest. The following is the list of the names of the deceased: -

John Snooks, master, Scotch-street, Whitehaven, aged 34 years.

Eleanor Snooks, aged 34 years, wife of the captain.

Mary Ellen Snooks, aged 10 years, daughter of the captain.

Marion Snooks, aged 7 years, daughter of the captain.

Thomas Hind, mate, of Whitehaven, aged 22 years.

The sixth, seventh and eighth bodies were those of seamen, names unknown.

#### THE INQUEST

On Saturday an inquest was held on view of the bodies at the house of Mr Ward, the Railway Inn, Workington, before Dr Henry Bell, coroner, and the following jury: -

Messrs Thomas Potts (foreman), Joseph Blackburn, James Johnstone, John Milburn, William Lawrence, Samuel Call, John White, John Fawcett, Henry Holliday, Robert Walker, John Gaskarth, and Joseph Musgrave.

The whole of the bodies were laid out together in a room in the house, and presented a melancholy spectacle, all their faces being much excoriated with the friction caused by their contact with the sand.

The jury having viewed the bodies, and returned to the jury-room, the Coroner said he was much afraid that they would not be able to get much evidence in this case, as nobody seemed to know anything about it, for the unfortunate circumstance took place during the night, while a severe storm was raging, and when no human eye was able to see the wreck. There were only two questions that the jury would have to consider,

one was whether the vessel was seaworthy, and the other was whether the captain had used sufficient judgment in the management of her. He was afraid that they would not be able to ascertain much upon the latter point, as the whole of the people on board had perished. The first thing they would have to prove would be the identity of as many of the bodies as they could.

The first witness called was William Hind, who said he was a seaman and lived at Whitehaven. The deceased, Thomas Hind, was his brother and was mate of the *Amyntas*. He identified his body. He also knew the master, John Snooks, his wife Eleanor Snooks, and also their children Mary Ellen and Marion. He had seen all their bodies, and identified them. Captain Snooks was his uncle. He did not know the three seamen. He had no knowledge of the deceased since the ship left Swansea, but she had been put into Holyhead for some time. She was loaded with Welsh coals for Workington. He had never seen the vessel and did not know what state she was in. A juryman observed that he understood that the vessel was only eight years old, and had been purchased by Captain Snooks only last April. . .

John Matthews, Custom House officer, produced several articles that had washed up which he, as the receiver of wrecks, had taken possession of. Amongst them were a cabin clock and a watch, which belonged to the mate. The former had stopped at 25 minutes past five o'clock, and the watch at a quarter past six. The inference is that the vessel must have gone to pieces about five o'clock in the morning. There were also some Masonic documents, showing that Captain Snooks was a member of one of the Scotch lodges; and a letter written by his elder daughter from Holyhead to a companion in Whitehaven, dated the 25<sup>th</sup> December, and which had evidently not been posted. It was as follows-

“Holyhead, December 25<sup>th</sup> 1872

Dear Katie - I sit down to write you a few lines, hoping you are well. Dear Katie, I wish you a Merry Christmas and a happy New Year. It is my mamma's birthday and I am quite well myself but tired of the ship. Dear Katie, it is an awful day and I often think of all my companions when it is blowing. My grandmamma sent us a newspaper and I read that your house had to be sold, and the other beside you.

I remain, your affectionate companion, Mary Ellen Snooks

I hope I will be spared to see you all. I will send you a nice piece of pottery from Holyhead. We are going to Workington in the ship, and from Workington to our own house in the train. Goodbye.”

The simplicity of the child's letter, especially the remark as to her dislike of the ship, drew forth a unanimous expression of sympathy on the part of all present.

The Coroner afterwards asked the jury if they were wishful to have the inquiry adjourned for further evidence. He understood that they had heard all that could be produced at present, but if they thought that it was desirable to have an adjournment, to see if any more of the bodies could be identified, they could have it, but still he did not think that it could serve any good purpose, as their verdict could not by any possibility affect any one else. According to his opinion, the only conclusion that they could arrive at was that these bodies had been found on the shore near Workington but how they had come by their death there was no evidence to show. The jury returned a verdict accordingly. . .

As soon as the inquest was over the friends of Captain Snooks had his remains and those of his wife and daughters and of Thomas Hind, removed to Whitehaven, to the house of Captain Hind, Birley-court, Duke Street, and arrangements were made at Workington for having the three seamen interred at Workington the same afternoon.

On Sunday the remains of Captain Snooks, Mrs Snooks, their two children and those of young Hind, were removed from Birley-court, to the Cemetery, in five vehicles belonging to the Whitehaven Cab and Posting Company. Long before the time appointed for “lifting,” the top of Duke-street, and round into Scotch-street were completely blocked by people who were anxious to show their sympathy for the mourning relatives. All the way to the cemetery the route was blocked with sympathising spectators, and when the place of burial was reached we should say there would not be less than from four to five thousand people present. Captain Snooks was an Oddfellow, and a number of the Brethren followed his remains to the grave. The burial service was impressively read by the Rev J B Dalton of St James's Church. Captain Snooks and his wife

and children were interred in one grave and their nephew Thomas Hind, the mate, was laid in one by himself immediately adjoining. A sadder sight was probably never witnessed in Whitehaven Cemetery.

Whilst he was in London acquiring the details of his business, he constructed a handsome gold watch, which was exhibited at the Inventories Exhibition.

**It is with sincere regret we have to record the death of Mr James Steele, assistant overseer for Whitehaven. Few men were better known or more genuinely respected than Mr Steele, whose good humour, tact and readiness to oblige everyone made him popular with all classes. Mr Steele would have been 62 years of age on the 5<sup>th</sup> of next month. He was a native of Whitehaven, and many years ago was a grocer and provision merchant in the town, his place of business being where Messrs Jackson and Murray's auction mart is now situated. In August 1863, Mr John Thexton, who had held the post of assistant overseer for Whitehaven, died, and Mr Steele was immediately afterwards appointed to the vacant office. For more than 30 years he has held the post, and on all hands it is admitted that he was one of the most painstaking of officials. When the Revising Barrister held his annual courts, Mr Steele was invariably congratulated on the accuracy of his lists, and such was the faith of the political agents on both sides in his integrity and straightforwardness, that his word was almost invariably taken in cases where a vote might be gained or lost. Mr Steele was deputy registrar of births for the late Mr W S Hamilton up to the time of that gentleman's death, and on Mr Mageen being appointed relieving officer and registrar, Mr F Kendall of the Union Hall, was then appointed deputy. For some time past Mr Steele had not been in good health, but his cheerful and lively disposition dispelled the idea that anything very serious was the matter with him. Recently he had an attack of influenza, but up to Tuesday last he was going about performing his duties. On that day he attended business at the Union Hall, Scotch Street, where he remained for about two hours, and is supposed to have caught a chill. He afterwards called at the house of Mr Greenop, joiner, in Queen Street, one of his most intimate friends, where he remained for some time. On Wednesday morning Mr Steele was confined to his house. Dr Muriel was called in but inflammation of the bowels had set in, and he expired between twelve and one o'clock on Thursday morning, the primary cause of death being certified as influenza; the secondary, peritonitis. On Saturday last his wife left Whitehaven on a visit to her married daughter, Mrs Mitchell of Liverpool, having gone there to consult an oculist about her eyes. Mr Steele's death being quite unexpected, information as to his condition was not sent in time to his wife to allow of her return to see him whilst alive. Deceased leaves a widow and grown-up family of five sons – all of whom are in situations in London – and one daughter who is in Liverpool.**

There is too much reason to fear that the Whitehaven brig, Anne Middleton, has gone down with all hands. The Anne Middleton was 180 tons register, and Mr Thomas Middleton of this town was her managing owner. On the 29<sup>th</sup> January last she sailed from Girgenti in Sicily for Ipswich, with a cargo of sulphur, and has never been heard of since. For weeks those interested in the vessel or her crew had been almost "hoping against hope" but the vessel is now so long overdue that there can be little doubt as to her fate and that of her unfortunate crew. When she sailed from Girgenti she had on board a crew of eight, all told. The master (Captain Mossop), the mate (John Stevenson) and three apprentices belonging to Whitehaven. Captain Mossop leaves a widow and one child, Mr Stevenson was just married before he went on his last voyage. The names of the apprentices are John Lancaster, Peter-street; John Johnston, Duke-street; and John Kelly. The vessel was partially insured. The Anne Middleton was built by Messrs Shepherd and Co. of his town and was launched in January 1867.

Sad Death of a Whitehaven Tradesman - the Result of Inhaling Acid Fumes

On Tuesday afternoon Mr William Strathern, plumber, who carried on business in King Street, Whitehaven, died suddenly. One of his sons, Mr John Strathern, was engaged cleaning some brasses in a bath of nitric acid, when his father, who had been in feeble health for some time, said he would assist in the cleaning of the brasswork, and he proceeded to do so. Whilst at work he inhaled the fumes of the nitric acid, and was compelled to retire. Afterwards he became very sick and he was put to bed. The members of his family, imagining that Mr Strathern was suffering from a cold, applied hot water bottle to his feet and applied a poultice to his chest to relieve his breathing. Afterwards, as there appeared no improvement in his condition, Dr Jackson was sent for, but when he arrived the deceased was breathing his last. Death was immediately due to heart failure. He had been in business in Whitehaven for a very long period. He was a native of Glasgow and arrived at Whitehaven as a young man over fifty years ago. For a number of years he was in partnership with a Mr McColl, afterwards conducting business for himself, and in recent years he was joined by his two sons. His energies were otherwise devoted to religious work. He was one of the oldest members of the Whitehaven Congregational Church, of which he was a deacon. For a number of years he had entire charge, as superintendent of the Seamen's Bethel in Lowther Street, and he gave much energy to conducting cottage services. Throughout his life he was an earnest temperance man, and he was always ready to help any good movement. Mr Strathern was held in high esteem in the town, and there are many, the poor especially, by whom his death will be felt as a personal loss. He was in his 75<sup>th</sup> year.

Death has made extraordinary havoc amongst the master plumbers of Whitehaven during the past few weeks. No fewer than three well known tradesmen have been removed from amongst us during that brief period. First Mr Holloway passed away, then Mr Walker and this week we have to record the death of Mr William Strathern. In connection with the latter, one who remembered his former partner, Mr M'Coll, tells a thrilling story. After Mr M'Coll left Whitehaven he emigrated to Australia, and went into the interior of

that country. For a considerable period there were no tidings of him, but at last word was brought that a skeleton had been discovered in the bush, and from letters and other documents found upon the clothing there was no room for doubt that the body was that of Mr M'Coll. He had wandered in the dry season far beyond the reach of water, and death was considered to have been due more to thirst than starvation as particles of food were still lying near his body when found.

The Coroner asked if there was someone present who wished to speak about Edward Taggart.

John Taggart, an elderly man, came forward and stated that he lived at 6 Arrowthwaite, Whitehaven, and had worked on the brake at Ladysmith Pit. He was the father of Edward Taggart, a single man, who lived with him and who was a collier working at Wellington Pit. He was living with witness on the 11<sup>th</sup> of May. Witness last saw him at half past four on the 11<sup>th</sup> of May, when he was going down on the afternoon shift with another brother. The bodies of the other two brothers had been found. He had only examined one of the bodies which had not been identified, and he could not say any of the others were his son – it was impossible, added witness, as they were not found in his district. He had not read the description of the property which was found on the unidentified bodies.

The Coroner: What was it you wanted put before the jury and myself? Witness said he thought his son had been unidentified and closed up as one – it has been a mistake.

Witness, in reply to further questions, said Mr McMillan saw the bodies, and he knew Edward Taggart very well.

McMillan was called and stated that he knew Edward Taggart. He did not know whether he went down the pit on the night of the 11<sup>th</sup> of May. He could not swear that Taggart was one of the three men who had been unidentified. Witness had assisted Inspector Dowthwaite and PC Wilkinson at the pit head, and a description had been given of the brothers Taggart. The first two unidentified came out of No. 5 and 6 District, which was another part of the pit which Edward Taggart worked in.

By the Coroner: He could not say one of the three who had been buried unidentified was not Taggart. The features were not good in any of them. Of course, there was a distinctive mark on one of them which the

Coroner had mentioned – the loss of a finger end and this man also had a brass watch which had a crack across it.

The Coroner: And a photograph in the watch? – No, I don't think so. Not in that watch.

The Coroner: Probably it was my mistake.

Witness said the brass watch was marked "John Forrest" the maker, and "William Tell." Continuing, witness said they were told that Taggart had a boil on his neck and that he wore a neck strap. The last body had no neck strap on.

The Coroner addressing Taggart said he wished it known that he had done all he possibly could to have his son identified, and from what he saw he felt sure that there had been some mistake and that someone else had been buried for him. He (the Coroner) was extremely sorry. The only satisfaction to the father was that his son had been given a Christian burial . . .

LOSS OF THE "WEST CUMBERLAND" - A Whitehaven Man Drowned

Intelligence reached Maryport on Tuesday evening that about midnight on the previous Wednesday the SS West Cumberland, of Maryport, sank after being in collision with the barque Minero, about 60 miles of Cape Finisterre, whilst on a voyage from Carthage to Mostyn on the River Mersey. The captain of the steamer and twelve of the crew were rescued by the steamer Mounts Bay, which was expected to arrive in London yesterday. The mate and four of the crew got on board the barque, which put about to return to Cardiff. Unfortunately, Mr W Albert Thornber, the second engineer, was drowned. Mr Thornber is the son of Mr M H Thornber of Meadow-view, who is a draper in the establishment of Mr Taggart, King-street, Whitehaven; and sad to relate he ought to have been married this (Thursday) morning to Miss Wilson, daughter of Mrs Wilson of the Queen's Arms, Bransty. He was a very promising young man, and was well-known in the town and district for his swimming feats, having carried off several prizes. . . The West Cumberland was a very fine vessel and has made very successful voyages. It formed one of the fleet of Messrs Hine Brothers, Maryport, and was built on 1879 by Messrs Joseph L Thompson and Sons, Sunderland. She had a carrying capacity of 1850 tons, and was under the command of Captain Kirkpatrick, though when the collision took place she was in the charge of the first officer, Mr Brown.

**FATAL ACCIDENT AT BIRKENHEAD**

An inquest was held yesterday at the Victoria Hotel, Birkenhead, before Mr Churton, borough coroner, on the body of John Huntley Tiltman, second engineer of the steamship Menelaus, lying in the Wallasey Dock. It appeared that on Saturday the deceased, who was about 25 years of age, was engaged with others in hoisting wood out of the Menelaus, when he accidentally fell into the hold of the vessel, a depth of 23 feet, and injured himself internally. He was removed to the Borough Hospital in a state of collapse, and died on Sunday. A verdict of "Accidental death" was returned.

**DEATH OF MR TILTMAN, LLOYDS' SURVEYOR**

We regret to announce that Mr Tiltman, one of Lloyd's surveyors on the Tyne, died at his residence, Linskill Terrace, North Shields, last night after only two days' illness. Mr Tiltman was at the office on Wednesday, though he was then ailing. He was attacked violently with diarrhoea, which swept him off in two days. Mr Tiltman was in the prime of life, and was highly esteemed in the iron shipbuilding yards in which his district particularly lay. Besides being an accomplished naval architect, Mr Tiltman was a gentleman of very considerable scientific attainments, and had probably one of the best and most complete collections of British moths and butterflies in the kingdom. The deceased gentleman was about 40 years of age, and leaves a widow and a young family.

A Medical Man Drowned at Frizington

Last week Mr Thomas Todhunter, a medical man residing at Arlecdon, lost his life under very melancholy circumstances. The deceased was only 25 years of age, and was the son of Mr Joseph Todhunter of Jericho, near this town. Before commencing practice upon his own account, he was a pupil with Messrs Clarke and Thompson, surgeons of Whitehaven, and afterwards went to Arlecdon, where he began business for himself. On Monday he had been visiting some patients at Cleator Moor and on his return home the same night he called upon Mr Ryrie of the Parkside Hotel to ask him to support, at the Board of Guardians on Thursday, his application for the office of public vaccinator for the Cleator district. About eleven o'clock he bade Mr Ryrie good night and took his departure. He was never seen alive again, and as he failed to return home, the man who looked after his horse made his absence known on the following day to his parents, who at once communicated with Police-constable Kirkpatrick. Not far from the Frizington Hotel there is a deep and dangerous sheet of water which is entirely unprotected, and on Tuesday morning a boy picked up a hat and stick which had floated to the side of this pond. The water was then dragged by PC Kirkpatrick, and after a long search the officer succeeded in laying hold of something – in about 10 feet of water – which, when dragged to the shore, proved to be the body of the missing man. His purse and money were found safe in his pocket, and his watch had stopped about twelve o'clock. There appears to be little doubt that Mr Todhunter, on returning homewards, was deceived by the appearance of the water in the gloom of the night, and accidentally fell into the pond, which is in some places not less than ten feet deep at the edge. The unfenced and unprotected state of this pond – which is the property, we understand of the Parkside Mining Company – lying so near to the public road, has for some time been generally and justly complained of by the inhabitants of the district. Mr Todhunter, who was unmarried, was a young man of much ability and most kindly disposition. His sad death at so early an age has produced great and universal sorrow in and around Arlecdon, and deep sympathy in Whitehaven and the neighbourhood with his relations. An inquiry respecting the death was held last Thursday morning, before Dr Bell, coroner, and a jury, at the house of Mr Ryrie, Frizington, and after hearing the evidence the jury returned a verdict that deceased was found drowned, but there was no marks of violence upon him. They considered the pond where deceased was drowned extremely dangerous, and recommended that something should be done for the protection of the public.

#### February 20<sup>th</sup> 1873 Whitehaven News

A very painful impression was created in this town yesterday by the circulation of a report (which unfortunately proved to be too true) that Mr John Tyson of Lowther-street, had died very suddenly at an early hour that morning. The deceased gentleman, who was in the 64<sup>th</sup> year of his age, had a "stroke" a few weeks ago; and upon medical advice being taken, it was found that he was suffering from a serious affection of the heart. His medical attendants - Dr I'Anson, Dr Ablett and Dr Joseph Wilson - at once recommended that he should cease from a number of his multifarious labours. This advice was taken, and Mr Tyson had so far recovered as to be able to attend to business, both public and private. Only on Monday week, he was present at the monthly meeting of the Town and Harbour Trust, and to an ordinary observer seemed at that time much in his usual health. On the Thursday morning following, he was, we believe, amongst the directors of the Shipbuilding Company who witnessed the launch of the new vessel, the Eskdale. On Tuesday forenoon, he went to his shop in King-street, and was there seized with symptoms of his illness. He was, however, quite able to walk home without assistance. In the afternoon he was attended by his medical men. In the evening he retired to rest about his usual hour; and about half past one o'clock on Wednesday morning he passed away suddenly, but without pain.

The life which has thus been so suddenly brought to a close was a very busy and also a very useful one. Upwards of a quarter of a century ago Mr Tyson succeeded to the business of his brother, the late Mr Joseph Tyson, draper, and in the course of years, such was his industry and business ability, he made it a very prosperous concern - perhaps none more so in Cumberland. Mr Tyson was at two different periods a member of our Town and Harbour Trust. We believe he held a seat at the board prior to the passing of the Act of 1859, after which the town was divided into wards. He was again appointed a trustee in May 1869, when he was unanimously chosen by the trustees to fill the vacancy in the representation of Trinity Ward, caused by the death of Dr Fidler. In November 1870 the act of the Trustee Board was homologated by the voters of the ward, who then unanimously appointed him a trustee for the ensuing period of three years. Mr Tyson, at the Trustee Board, always showed a deep interest in everything connected with the welfare and prosperity of the town. At the same time, he never thought of troubling the board with long speeches; his remarks being generally short and very much to the point. By Mr Tyson's death a vacancy is created at the Burial Board, he being one of the representatives of the township of Whitehaven.

#### February 20<sup>th</sup> 1873 Whitehaven News (Continued)

It was no doubt the profound interest which the late Mr Tyson felt in the well-being of the town that caused him to take an active part in the affairs of the Shipbuilding Company, of which he was one of the first promoters and directors. He had, we know, always strong faith in the future of Whitehaven; and even during the long period of depression which preceded the establishment of the Shipbuilding Company, we have heard him express himself in very sanguine terms as to a day of prosperity which should dawn upon Whitehaven. His anticipations have proved well founded, although he has not himself been spared to see that full measure of commercial prosperity in Whitehaven, for which he never ceased to hope and to labour. Mr Tyson was largely connected with the railway interest. For a year or two he has been one of the directors of the Whitehaven, Cleator and Egremont Railway; and he was also one of the original shareholders in our other two local lines - the Whitehaven Junction, and the Whitehaven and Furness Junction. It may also be mentioned here that he was the vice-president of the Building Society.

In another and still higher sphere our deceased townsman showed himself not less diligent. He was a vestryman of St Nicholas's Church, which he regularly attended as his place of worship. He was also one of the managers of St Nicholas's National Schools, and in that capacity he evinced the genuine interest he felt in the cause of education. Mr Tyson was a Conservative in politics, and at the contested election in 1868 he took an active part in the return of Mr Bentinck.

Mr Tyson was one of those men whose character it is very difficult to portray in a single sentence or even a paragraph. It is not the language of mere eulogy to say that he was a man full of fine impulses and most generous disposition; and having said thus much, it is needless to tell that he was a warm-hearted friend and singularly "approachable," if the word may be allowed in this connection. To say that he was a man

strictly upright would be almost less than the truth, for he was not only upright but downright, to make a somewhat subtle distinction. The former word expresses his desire to do what was right between man and man; the latter word best expresses his utter repugnance to anything like meanness or chicanery. But, after all, what better or higher compliment can we pay him than to say that he lived so as to be missed as his death; for that he will be "a missed man" was clearly evident from the expressions of regret heard on all sides yesterday.

Mr Tyson was twice married and leaves a widow and a family of three sons and two daughters. As a husband and father, he was much beloved, and was worthy of all the affection given him.

**June 14<sup>th</sup> 1889 Carlisle Patriot**

On Monday, Mr Lumb, coroner for West Cumberland, held an inquest at Whitehaven on the body of Mr Edward Tyson, draper, of the firm of Tyson and Sons, who had been accidentally drowned on Saturday evening by falling over the North Pier. From the evidence adduced, it appeared that the screw steamer Cumbrian had discharged a quantity of boards at the North Wail, and these were scattered over the pier, almost blocking up the pathway, and extending a distance of about 70 yards in length. A watchman named W. H. Grayson was employed on Saturday night in watching the timber to see that none of it got into the water. About midnight Mr Edward Tyson went down the pier, and although the watchman tried to prevent him going past the timber, he did so, the watchman following him. After going round the end of the lighthouse, he came back by the other side of the timber, and in doing so, he fell into the water. Mr Tyson shouted "Watchman!" and Grayson, having got the lifebuoy from the lighthouse, threw it to him, exclaiming at the same time, "Keep up as long as you can." The buoy went to within three feet of Mr Tyson, but he never spoke and did not move. Two boatmen, who were at the other side of the harbour, hearing cries that a man was drowning, brought their boat across, and recovered the body, but life was then extinct. Inspector Blenkinsop deposed that the timber was dangerous on the pier. Pieces were projecting on the footpath, and although there was a light when he was there, he had great difficulty in threading his way. On Saturday night it was very dark. —The Coroner, having expressed sympathy with the wife and relatives of the deceased, said that the wood had been thrown down anyhow, and the pier could not be walked in safety. The jury returned a verdict of "Accidentally drowned." and recommended that greater care should be taken in stacking wood on the pier.

Mr Tyson was the only son of the late Mr John Tyson, draper, King-street, by his second wife. He was educated at Carlisle Grammar School and subsequently served his apprenticeship with Mr William Peile of this town, as a mining engineer, and whilst with him had experience at the Abergorki and Llethy Shenkin and other collieries in South Wales, besides mines of various kinds in this district. He remained with Mr Peile for some time, and afterwards began business in Lowther-street. He successfully passed the examination for a colliery manager's first class certificate. About five years ago Mr Tyson removed to Eskdale, taking Rydal Mount, where he lived for three years, and he then left to enter on a fine large house he had built, The Ferns, where he died. Mr Tyson was very popular in Eskdale, from his free and sociable manners, his kindness and his taste for all outdoor sport; and, a capital mimic and comic singer, he sang frequently at various concerts. He was vice-chairman of the hunt committee, in which he took a great deal of interest, and a vice-president of the football club, which he frequently accompanied to matches. Mr Tyson was a strong Conservative, and could always be depended upon to work hard for the party, and he gave a good deal of assistance during Mr Duncombe's recent candidature. He was also a Freemason, and a member of Lodge 119 in this town. Mr Tyson was in the 41<sup>st</sup> year of his age and he leaves a widow but no family.

After a few months' experience in the smaller towns, she was engaged by John Ellsler for juveniles and boys' parts, at Wood's Theatre, Cincinnati, Ohio. Playing here with the late Edward Sothern, she was recommended by him to the management of the theatres at Buffalo and Albany, where she undertook the full line of leading business in the legitimate and romantic drama, being then known as the youngest leading lady in the United States. . . Coming to Britain she adopted the family name of Deering, and began touring with her own company in 1882, playing the leading roles in a repertoire of Shakespearian plays and old English comedies. an altogether unusual performance for an actress was her appearance as Richard III, a role which she sustained some 200 times. In 1883 she became lessee of the Agricultural Hall, Walsall, and improved and reconstructed it, rechristening it the Theatre Royal, but finding it unsuccessful, relinquished it eighteen months later. In 1887 Mr Ernest Stevens joined Miss Deering as acting manager, and two years later they together leased the Theatre Royal, Whitehaven, in which town they were married. . .

GERTRUDE MARY JONES v REV MOTHER MARY AUGUSTA

Mr William Anderson (instructed by Mr J Hunt) for the defendant, moved that this action be remitted for trial by the Judge of the county court of Waterford. The section is brought by Miss Gertrude Mary Jones against the defendant, Miss Mary Jane Whelan, who is the superioress of the convent of the Sisters of Mercy in Dungarvan, and whose name in religion is Mother Mary Augusta, to recover damages for an alleged breach of contract to receive the plaintiff as a lodger and boarder. An affidavit of the defendant stated that she made no contract with the plaintiff to receive her as a lodger and boarder. Early in the month of January last the plaintiff applied to be admitted as a postulant into the convent of the Sisters of Mercy, representing that she was ready to come into the convent at once, and was ready to defray the cost of her outfit. After some correspondence defendant, at the end of the month of January, agreed to receive her as a postulant on trial, and she was informed that she could be expected in the convent on the following week. The plaintiff wrote to say that she would come at some time in February. She fixed several different days in that month for coming, but did not come on any of them. In February plaintiff declared that she was unable to get the necessary outfit, and was told to come with such outfit as she had. At the end of February or the beginning of March she wrote naming a day on which she would come, but mentioned that she would stop in Kilkenny to see some friends. She gave no address in Kilkenny, and defendant did not hear from her until the middle of May, when she wrote to say that she was coming to Dublin. Defendant then refused to take her into the convent. Ladies entering the convent usually brought with them the sum of £500 at least. In January defendant would have received the plaintiff without the usual fee, but under the circumstances mentioned she refused to receive her at all. According to the rules of the order postulants who had not taken the final vow might leave the convent or might be sent away by the superioress, and the plaintiff at the time she applied for admission was well aware of this. The affidavit further stated that at the time the plaintiff applied for admission she was an inmate of St Martha's Home No 3, Lower Gloucester-street, and deponent

believed she was not now in any employment or in the receipt of any money. An affidavit of the plaintiff made to resist the motion described her as of High-street, Kilkenny. She denied that any day in February was fixed for her entering the convent. She received a letter on the 30<sup>th</sup> March from the defendant stating that the Bishop had consented to her entering it. The cause of her detention in Kilkenny was that on her arrival there she found an aged relative in very precarious health, and at the instance of the Dean of Ossory she remained to care him in his illness. Before the defendant's letter of the 25<sup>th</sup> of May, refusing to receive her, she had provided an excellent outfit at a cost of £50. The house No 3, Gloucester-street was not a benevolent institution, but a hotel which was only frequented by respectable Catholic ladies - - - the Court remitted the case for trial in the County Court, and directed that the writ should be amended by the defendant's name Mary Jane Whelan being used.

A gloom has been cast throughout the Luton football community and indeed throughout the whole football world by the death of a well-known Luton professional footballer, Samuel Wightman, on Wednesday, as the result of an injury sustained at a match at Brighton on Easter Monday between Luton Town and Brighton and Hove Albion.

Wightman played at right back, and the match was a return game, Luton having beaten Brighton here on Good Friday by 1-0. The affair occurred about ten minutes after half-time, when the home team were leading by the only goal scored. Wightman, it appears, had cleared the ball by kicking into touch, then Goodwin, Brighton's outside left, came into him. The referee, (Mr Shallcross) awarded a free kick, and Wightman had to have the assistance of the trainer (W Lawson). He was unable to resume, and walked off the field. He was thoroughly examined by two doctors, who thought it would be all right for the injured man to go home. Mr E Gibbs was in charge of the team, and Wightman was taken to Luton as soon as possible. He was conveyed to the station in a cab, and caught the 7.10 train to London. The Metropolis was crossed in a taxi, and when the deceased was placed in the train at St Pancras he had to lie on the seat until Luton

was reached at 11.5 pm. He was in pain throughout the journey, and seemed to get gradually worse. He was at once taken by cab to see Dr Rose, who examined him and advised him to go home. The next morning the doctor saw him again and on his advice he was removed to the Bute Hospital where he was operated upon by a London specialist about 8 o'clock on Tuesday evening for peritonitis. It was recognised, however, from the first that there was little hope of recovery and indeed, it is extremely doubtful if anything could be done for him if he had been taken to the hospital in Brighton straight away. His relatives were summoned and at a quarter past one on Wednesday afternoon he passed away. He was conscious to within five minutes of his death and did not seem to realise how serious his condition was. His brother from Whitehaven unfortunately arrived too late to see him alive, although he travelled all night. Before Wightman died his depositions were taken by Colonel Carruthers, and yesterday (Thursday) a post-mortem examination was made by Dr Bone.

The sad affair has, of course, deeply affected his colleagues in the team for he was extremely popular. His large-hearted style of playing had made him a favourite with the home spectators, who recognised that his vigorous kicking had save Luton from many a tight corner, and his loss no doubt makes Luton's chance of escaping relegation smaller than ever. On Monday, for instance, before his injury, he played a grand game, and his name was mentioned in all the London papers as one of the outstanding players of the match. The Luton Directors are making frantic efforts to secure a back for Saturday's encounter with Swindon, but if they cannot do so, Smith of the Reserves will be played.

Wightman, who was generally known to his admirers and friends as Sammy, joined the Luton Club about the middle of last season, in order to strengthen the defence, and so put an end to the series of reverses which the Club was experiencing. His inclusion in the team served its purpose admirably, and from that day Wightman was a great favourite. He was a man of fine physique, standing well over six feet and weighing over thirteen stone. He began his career with Moresby Park School team as a full back, and remained with the junior team until he was eighteen, when he signed on with Workington as a professional. After remaining there for a season he went to Merthyr Town. Middlesbrough, however, recognised his ability, and at the end of four months signed him on. He did not have the best of luck and refused to re-engage, and did not start playing again until he went to Luton last season.

The deceased's home was at Whitehaven, where his mother and brothers are now living, and the body is to be removed there for the funeral, which will probably take place on Sunday morning. . .

On Friday night last, a sad fatality occurred at Croft Pit, Whitehaven, whereby a pit deputy, named Thomas Williams, lost his life. About five o'clock, it is supposed, the deceased went into an old working in what is known as the Jubilee District of the pit, for the purpose of giving the workmen a signal respecting the thickness between them and the disused portion of the mine. The air in the place was foul, and it is supposed that the deceased knew of this, because he was an experienced man, one of those whose principal duties was to examine for gas. He had left his lamp outside and gone in without it. There was a drift being driven

up to the place, to break through it into another direction. The deceased was away longer than usual, and ultimately Thomas Smith, hearing a noise, went to see what had happened. Going into the place, he found Williams, who had been overcome by foul gas, lying on the ground in an unconscious condition. He gave an alarm, and the body was rescued by some workmen. Smith was also gassed but shortly afterwards recovered. Artificial restoration was applied for two hours to try to bring Williams round, but without avail. Dr Harris was called but the man was beyond recovery, and the body was removed to his home. Williams was about 27 years of age and resided at Gore's Buildings, Scotch Street, Whitehaven. He had only been married some eighteen months.

With regard to the death of Williams, an extraordinary rumour was current in the town on Wednesday morning, to the effect that Williams was not dead and that several medical men had been called in to see him. It is hardly necessary to state that there was nothing whatever in the rumour, the funeral of Williams taking place on Wednesday afternoon, the funeral cortege being followed by some thirteen or fourteen cabs, containing relatives and friends. The deceased was a member of the Order of Free Gardeners and a number of that body were also present.

The remains were interred at the Whitehaven Cemetery on the 26<sup>th</sup> ult, and were followed to their final resting place by the children who attended the Sunday School established and conducted by the deceased at Harrington, where his loss will be as severely felt as it will be deeply and universally lamented.

Cockermouth heard with the deepest regret yesterday (Friday) morning of the death of Mr Thomas Williamson, of Oakhurst. For some months he had been ailing, though he had been for most of the time able to take outside exercise in his carriage or bath-chair, and it was not until about three weeks ago that he was compelled to take to his bed. He passed peacefully away about one o'clock yesterday morning in his 80<sup>th</sup> year.

Mr Williamson, who was a native of Whitehaven, played a very important part in the commercial and public life of West Cumberland. He was formerly head of the well-known firm of Messrs Williamson and Sons, shipbuilders, Workington. Originally intended for the medical profession, circumstances changed his plans, and he became associated with the business of shipbuilding commenced by his father at Harrington in 1838. This was started in a small way, the work at that time being solely in wooden shipbuilding and repairing. The business prospered, and the tonnage of the vessels built gradually increased. In 1854 Mr Thos. Williamson was taken into partnership by his father, and upon the latter's death in 1859 the son continued the business alone. In the following year he commenced the building of iron vessels, and for many years wooden ships were built side by side with those constructed of iron, the average tonnage being about 800. From 1870 to 1880 the average had increased to about 1000 tons register, this being the largest which could be fitted out in Harrington harbour, where 73 vessels were built. In 1880, the Harrington lease having expired, the works were removed to Workington, where there were better facilities for building larger vessels. In 1881 the senior partner retired in favour of his two sons, Mr Richard and Mr R H Williamson, who now control the business.

As already stated, Mr Williamson during a large portion of his life, took an active part in one particular branch of public affairs. His chief concern was for sick and distressed humanity, and his sympathies found scope in the work of poor-law guardians. For many years he was represented Harrington on the Whitehaven Union Board of Guardians. Some years previous to his retirement he left Harrington to take up residence at Oakhurst, Cockermouth, and in 1898 he was elected a member of the Cockermouth Board of Guardians, a position he held up to a few months ago, with one short break. At the last triennial election Mr Williamson did not offer himself as a candidate, but on the death of the Rev G. Kennedy he fought and won the vacant seat. Failing health compelled his resignation in February last, a decision which was received with much regret by his fellow members of the Board.

Mr Williamson was best known and will be long remembered for his acts of kindness and charity. Generous to a degree, he never turned a deaf ear to an appeal by or for a person in adversity when the case was a genuine one. To his thought for the sick and suffering Cockermouth has a lasting memorial in its well-equipped Nursing Home, an institution whose usefulness will always cause the community to think with gratefulness of its founder. It was in 1902 that Mr Williamson conceived the idea that a Nursing Home would be a useful adjunct to the Cockermouth District Nurse Fund. He placed his views before the officials, and as the result of a public meeting the scheme was accorded the hearty support of the townspeople. Liberal as



were the subscriptions to the scheme, however, it was only by the large-hearted generosity and the handsome gifts of suitable premises by Mr Williamson that its success was assured. Mr Williamson's gift consisted of the double-fronted house (adjoining Dr Mitchell's residence) in Crown Street, which was converted into a nursing institution, and the three adjacent cottages in Low Sand Lane, the rents from which form part of the income of the home. The three years' experiment which the founder desired should be tried amply justified the establishment of the home, and at the end of that period the property was handed over by Mr Williamson and vested in trustees for the benefit of the present and future generations.

Mr Williamson's life was pervaded by a deep religious fervour, which seemed to dominate all his actions and caused an earnest solicitude for the spiritual well-being of those around him. For many years he conducted religious services at Oakhurst on Sunday evenings.

Mr Williamson was a widower, his wife having died in 1882. He leaves in addition to the two sons already mentioned, two daughters – Mrs Ellison, of Holmewood, and Miss Williamson, who resided with her father – and these and other relatives have the greatest sympathy of those who knew and revered one whose life was devoted to good work.

RUSSELL v GARNETT AND WIFE - Jury Case

This was an action brought by the plaintiff, who resides in Whitehaven, to recover £41 8s 6d from the defendant, who lives in Lorton . . .

Mr Musgrave, in addressing the jury, observed that the plaintiff in this case was Mr Russell and the defendants were John Garnett and wife of Lorton, who were administrator and administratrix of the late Roger Williamson of Whitehaven. For some time Mr Williamson resided in Whitehaven with his mother and grandmother, before he went to Australia. Whilst at Australia his mother and grandmother both died, and left Mr Williamson a considerable amount of real and personal property, to the value, he believed, of some thousands of pounds, and Mr Williamson, hearing of this, came to Whitehaven from Australia to look after it. When Mr Williamson came into possession of this large amount of money, he led a life of idleness and indolence - he did not mean idleness in an improper sense, but he meant that he had no occupation, and that being the case he had much difficulty in spending his time; consequently he gave himself up to amusement and enjoyment. Sometimes he returned home to his lodgings in such a state as some of them would not like to be seen in. The plaintiff, Mr Russell, took charge of him, and he did not prove a very agreeable lodger to him, for he frequently came home at night in a state of intoxication, and Mr Russell had frequently to go to the public houses he frequented to seek him, he being in such a state of intoxication sometimes as to be unable to come home himself. They could very easily picture to themselves the scenes which would often take place in Mr Russell's house in consequence of his having such a lodger. Mr Russell had 14s per week for his lodgings; and in the course of last year Mr Williamson's health failed, and he requested Mr Russell and his wife, who was cousin to the deceased, to attend upon him, and they did so. During the latter part of his life he became so stout that he felt afraid of attacks of apoplexy, and he frequently requested Mr Russell to sit up all night to attend upon him, for which attendance he promised to give him 10s per night. Mr Russell did so on many occasions, and that gentleman would tell them that his health had suffered from it. Mr Williamson appreciated that kindness on the part of his client, and promised that he would give him £30, and 10s a night when he sat up with him. It was his (Mr Musgrave's) painful and disagreeable duty to tell them that when Mr Williamson came home at night in a state of intoxications, he made Mr Russell's bed room and bed, from his evacuations, in such a filthy state that it was perfectly disagreeable for him (Mr Musgrave) to mention in that court. . . He considered that his client

was fairly entitled to £30 as compensation for his trouble. . . Mr Williamson never gave him one farthing of the money he had promised him, he having been cut off suddenly. He died without a will, and Mrs Garnett, being aunt to the deceased, came in for a very large portion of his property. Defendants had, however, refused to accede to Mr Russell's claim; but he had no doubt the jury would take a rational view of the case, and consider that he was fairly entitled to the amount claimed. . . (The jury returned a verdict for the plaintiff for the full amount claimed.)

It is our painful duty this morning to announce the death of Mr John Bateman Wilson, surgeon, of this town, which event took place about half past ten o'clock last evening, at his residence, Scotch-street. Mr Wilson, to the deep regret of his family connexions and numerous friends, had, for some considerable time past been in failing state of health; and latterly had shown unmistakable symptoms of decline.

As a public man Mr Wilson was widely known and universally respected. His aptitude for public business was equalled only by his energy and willingness to work in the public service. From the earliest period of his settlement in Whitehaven, in his professional capacity, he exhibited a disposition to devote much of his time and talents in the interests of the institutions of his native town, and of the inhabitants generally, who were not slow to appreciate his merit. A Conservative in politics, he never allowed political feeling to interfere with a proper discharge of public duty. Accordingly, we find him from time to time occupying various important and honourable posts. For many years he sat as Trustee of the Town and Harbour, having been a member under the old Act, and subsequently, ever since the division of the town into wards, as one of the representatives of St Nicholas. As a Trustee he was a diligent promoter of the waterworks scheme, and an active sanitary reformer; in which latter capacity he likewise occupied a prominent position as a member of the Board of Guardians. Mr Wilson was also an original member of the Whitehaven and Preston Quarter Burial Board; a member of the Whitehaven Turnpike Trust; a governor of the Whitehaven and West Cumberland Infirmary; and of the Whitehaven Savings Bank; Honorary Surgeon to the Whitehaven Artillery Corps; and a generous supporter of every other good movement. No man, in fact, could be said to take a more lively interest in the welfare and prosperity of the town and harbour than the deceased gentleman.

As one who enjoyed the friendship and confidence of the deceased for the long period of 18 years - unchequered at any time even by the slightest difference - we may be pardoned for saying that in the social circle - as husband, father and friend - Mr Wilson's loss will enlist the sympathy of all classes with his sorrowing family and relatives. Mr Wilson, we believe, at the time of his death, was in the 54<sup>th</sup> year of his age.

**LOSS OF THE DUSTY MILLER**

A paragraph has appeared intimating the loss of the "Dusty Miller" of Newcastle on Ireland's Eye, on the 28<sup>th</sup> ult. There is too much reason (Says the Whitehaven Herald) to fear that the vessel in question is the Dusty Miller of Whitehaven. No vessel of that name belonging to Newcastle, or any other English port than this, is registered at Lloyds' and as regards the Whitehaven Ship, we have seen a letter to Captain Waddle, one of the owners, which states that the main boom has been washed up at Howth, and the stern of the long boat at Boldoyle, there being on the latter a copperplate with the master's name (Captain Corlett) painted on one side, and the vessel's name on the other. It is feared that all hands have perished. The crew consisted of the following, viz: - John Corlett, master; Isaac Mossop, mate; James Taggart and Robert Reid, seamen; and John Wood and James Aitken, boys - all belonging to Whitehaven, except Reid, who was a native of Douglas, Isle of Man. Subsequent accounts place the loss of this ill-fated vessel beyond doubt.
